"All three of the Austro-German advances toward Warsaw are suffering heavy losses in the south. Field Marshal Von Mackensen again has been compelled to change his front. He is now directing his main move near Travniki, twenty miles west of Cholm. Every stop costs him dear. He has found it necessary to excercise extreme caution and literally is feeling his way in the hope of finding a weak spot where he may be able to find the Russians unpre-

THE SITUATION IN

Petrograd, via London, July 23, 10.45 p.m.—Field Marshal Von Mackensen, operating between the Bug and the Vistula, continues his wild sledge hammer blows against the Lublin-Chom line of the Russians, directing them now particularly against the city of Lublin. His immediate objectives are Belzyce, Travniki, Vosslavitze and Grubechow. Belzyce is twelce miles southwest of Lublin.

Of only slightly less importance in this region are the battles on the Bug, between Krylow and Dobrotovra.

West of Warsaw the Russians have moved back to their second line of defenses at Blonie and Nadazzyn and their positions in front of Invangorod. The latter positions are regarded the strongest in the Russian line, as is indicated by the fact that the Germans assaulted them furiously in their two former campaigns against Warsaw and were unable to breach them.



The Germans appear to be more closely co-ordinating these separate movements. The resulting general battle on the three fronts protecting Warsaw is regarded by the Russian military critics as the most important of any struggle heretofore in the eastern theatre. They compare the entire circumscribed region to a great fortress.

The central idea of the German campaign is assumed to be to secure control of the Vistula line. With this strong natural barrier adequately fortified, the military critics say Germany might hope to keep Russia in check with comparatively small forces and then throw her entire weight against France.





The imperial German government will readily understand that the government of the United States cannot discuss the policy of the government of Great Britain with regard to neutral trade except with that government itself, and that it must regard the conduct of other belligerent governments as irrelevant to any discussion with the imperial German government of what this government regards as grave and unjustifiable violations of the rights of American citizens by German naval commanders. Illegal and inhuman acts, however justifiable they may be thought to be against an enemy who is believed to have acted in contravention of law and humanity, are manifestly indefensible when they deprive neutrals of their acknowledged rights, particularly when they violate the right to life itself. If a belligerent cannot retaliate against an enemy without injuring the lives of neutrals, as well as their property, humanity, as well as justice and a due regard for the dignity of neutral powers, should dictate that the practice be discontinued.







STORY OF FATEFUL NIGHT

Ex Police Lieutenant's Report of His Movements on Night When Gambler Was Shot-Denial by Mrs. Rosenthal

What the Informers Said

Jack Rose testified that he telephoned the lieutenant at three on the morning of the murder, and asked Becker if he had heard the news.

Bridgie Webber declared Becker nodded to him at the conclusion of the fights in Madison Square Garden, and that he did not see him again until four in the morning, when he came to the doorway of his place with Jack Rose and James Sullivan.

"Becker congratulated Rose," said Webber on the stand and asked me to give the boys \$1000. He added that he had passed the Metropole in a cab and said if he had seen Rosenthal he would have shot him."





'There Are Enough Chaplanis Already," They Explain When They Come to Enlist

Milan, July 24—One characteristic of Italy's war is the intense enthusiasm of the priests for the national cause. Many who a week ago were saying mass in Alpine villages under the watchful eye of the Austrian government, have come in to the camps to volunteer for Italy. They want to fight in the ranks.

"There are enough chaplains already," they tell the officers.

Others are marching with the troops for spiritual comfort. Going with them over the high Alpine peaks setting up the small portable altars, they say mass in those cold regions, often with the enemy's bullets whistling around them; but they take no notice of the danger. Mass over, and a few words of comfort and encouragement said to the men, they continue the march against the enemy.

Those "priests and friars" arrested for spying are mostly laymen who have disguised themselves in clerical dress to escape detection.

Austria's efforts to widen the breach between church and state in Italy have failed. The war is fast binding church and state together.

Bogus charity thrives in Italy owing to lack of police supervision. Committees, sub-committees, commissions, patrons and associations with high-flown titles send out appeals for charity for the soldiers' benefit. Nobody seems to know how they begin, whence they come or who controls them. But their messengers pace the streets and visit cafes, restaurants, theatres and private houses begging for some soldiers' fund.

Instead of collectors being required to have bags issued by the police, as in Russia, these charity mongers, often well dressed women, go unmolested. They must have collected hundreds of thousands of dollars within the past week or two. Milan is more victimized than any other city.

two. Milan is more victimized than any other city.

It is different in Turin. There rich mill owners and other employers of labor have not even contributed generously to the legitimate forms of charity, such as the Red Cross and Soldiers' Families' Sustenance Funds. Their stinginess has raised great indignation among the poor, because Turin manufacturers have made large fortunes out of the way. The Societist and Labor parties threaten Turin millionaires with painful exposure if they don't disgorge in proportion to their wealth.

The society women who don becoming Red Cross uniforms and pose as benefactresses in hospitals almost entirely kept up by poor men's subscriptions are also denounced and scorned. The fashionable "nurses" know nothing about nursing, scorn to do the only useful work they might do—that is scrub floors and wash dishes—but ask their friends in to see them and send the staff off their heads by demanding afternoon teafor themselves and visitors.

One Turin woman, wife of a prominent manufacturer, turned up as a Red Cross nurse, and when asked to hold a basin and towel for real workers who were washing patients, refused, saying: "I didn't come to wash their dirty faces."
