BAUER CABINET SAID TO HAVE RESIGNED

Message From Berlin to Paris Says So

Bauer Said to Have Withdrawn Money From Swiss Bank and It is Reported to Have Been Sent to Germany Before Revolt—The Wesel Situation.

Paris, March 26.—(Havas)—The German cabinet, headed by Premier Bauer, has resigned, according to a message received here from Berlin today.

Geneva, March 26.—Former Emperor William of Germany withdrew deposits amounting to 250,000 Swiss francs from a Zurich bank early in March. It is learned here, and the money is said to have been sent to Berlin just before the attempted revolutionary revolt led by Dr. Kapp and General Lüttwitz.

The German mark is now quoted at ten centimes and the sum withdrawn from the bank would represent quite a snug fortune in Germany.

Wesel, March 26.—(By the Associated Press)—The fighting at Wesel, which ended ten o'clock Wednesday night, began again yesterday morning at ten o'clock and lasted for an hour and a half. Both forces then took a long and comfortable luncheon and hostilities were renewed at two o'clock. They were virtually finished at 4:30.

Traffic across the Rhine is still at a standstill, because the workmen on Wednesday night directed their fire toward the eastern end of the bridge at Wesel and continued yesterday.

The city is quiet. Not more than five persons are allowed to gather in the streets in groups. Buses are going on normally and there is plenty of food, although no trains have arrived here for three days from the north because of unsettled conditions between Wesel and Munster.

Rotterdam, March 26.—The Spartacist movement in the Rhine districts has long been organized by those who are in favor of Russian aid and the offensive against Poland with the joint object that Trotsky, Russian Bolshevik leader, would be at the gates of Berlin at the beginning of July, according to a Munster despatch to the Courant.

Russian Red army officers, says the correspondent, are already disbanding the German Spartacist whose army is being rapidly organized and armed on the exact model of Trotsky's.

The revolution was originally planned for May 1, but the leaders believed that the Kapp movement gave them an opportunity to hasten their plans, which included the capture of Munster and Wesel. According to the Telegram, the Dutch government is taking steps to prevent Red activity.

MONTREAL WARD FLOODED; THEY ARE USING BOATS

Montreal, March 26.—The situation in Turcot ward, this city, where floods are much in evidence, is reported serious, it being estimated that during the last twenty-four hours the water has increased in depth by seven and a half inches. Nine row boat firms are now in use in the district, and it is thought that the present rate of rise will probably stop only means of conveyance today. Firemen are patrolling the district in boats loaded with buckets as a precaution against fire.

COAL DEARER IN TORONTO AFTER FIRST OF APRIL

Toronto, March 26.—Instead of a drop in the price of coal in April, as had been hoped for by householders in this city, the price is to be boosted still higher. The present price is \$18.50 a ton, but after April 1 it will be at least \$14.75 or possibly \$15.

MONCALM MEN SAY MAINE AGENT WRONG

Quebec, March 26.—When shown a statement issued yesterday at Halifax by C. H. Harvey, agent of the marine and fisheries department, who said that the Montcalm was out to sea again, although eleven of her firemen and others had quit, some of these men said the Montcalm was still at Shelburne on Wednesday and had been there since Monday morning waiting for a new crew of firemen.

B., March 26.—A convention of the Liberals of New Brunswick will be called to be held in Moncton in June, according to an announcement made today by a committee to which arrangements for the gathering had been entrusted at the time of the visit of Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King to St. John during the winter.

Moncton was selected as the place of meeting on the grounds that it was easily accessible from all parts of the province, that adequate hotel accommodations would be available, and would give the delegates an opportunity to see what this thriving community has been accomplishing in recent years.

The convention will be some time in June, but the exact date has not yet been fixed, as the committee wishes to avoid conflict with the second annual conference of the New Brunswick Tourist, Game and Recreation Association which will meet in Moncton in June.

Among the matters which will come up at the convention are the large questions of organization and policy, and the appointment of two organizers for the province and a secretary for the provincial association.

DOES NOT SOUND LIKE DIVISION

Britain's Generous Promise of Coal Supply for France Is Announced.

Paris, March 26.—In the chamber of deputies yesterday, Yves Le Troquer, deputy minister of public works, announced that Great Britain had promised to France 10,000,000 tons of coal yearly, or sixty per cent of her stock for disposal, instead of twenty per cent given previously. At a special price of seventy-five shillings a ton, instead of the market price of 115 or 125 shillings.

SAYS TARTARS HAVE KILLED 17,000 ARMENIANS

London, March 26.—Tartars recently massacred 17,000 Armenians within the boundaries of the Armenian state, according to the Armenian minister of the Young Turks in the Azerbaijan government according to Archbishop Khachaturian, an Armenian from Erivan, who has arrived in London to confer on behalf of the Armenian public with British authorities regarding the situation in Armenia.

PROHIBITION

Manchester Guardian Editor's Views After Part Tour of Canada.

Toronto, March 26.—Arthur H. Wallace, associate editor of the Manchester Guardian, who is making a five weeks' tour of Canada preparatory to the publication of a Canada number of the Guardian, in an interview here, said with reference to prohibition:

"So far as I can see, east of Toronto prohibition is farcical, west across to Hull when I was in Ottawa and, believe me, I found in the shops of even the smallest liquor vendors there, samples of more varieties of Scotch liquor than could be found in the big shops in England or Scotland."

"NOT GUILTY" IN DOCTOR'S CASE; PEOPLE CHEER

Montreal, March 26.—Dr. Zenon Malo was yesterday found "not guilty" of the charge of murder against him, and the jury's verdict was the signal for such an outburst of applause and cheers that the court criers could not quell the uproar for some minutes. The charge was in connection with the death of Beatrice Chisoline following an alleged illegal operation. Dr. Malo still has to face trial on this count, and so was liberated on bail for which his counsel's word was taken, as the doctor had no bondsman to offer.

QUESTION TIME IN OTTAWA COMMONS

Mr. Copp Hears of Payments on Parliament Buildings—Cost of the Siberian Expedition.

Ottawa, March 26.—Mr. Copp of Westmoreland was informed in the House yesterday afternoon that contractors for construction of the new parliament buildings have been paid \$814,805 on the percentage basis. No payment had been made since March 17, 1919. Under the terms of the agreement \$75,194 was still due the contractors. Payments to architects up to April 29, 1919, were \$4,000. The sum of \$19,654 was still owing to the architect.

Ransom of \$25,000 Is Untouched

Father Had Placed It in Garbage Can as Directed—Boy 'Phoned Home From Hotel Room Where He Was Kept Since Wednesday Night.

Lexington, Ky., March 26.—Paul Little, twelve year old son of E. R. Little, Lexington capitalist, who has been held for ransom by kidnapers, was found this morning locked in a room in a hotel.

Mr. and Mrs. Little first learned the whereabouts of their son when he telephoned his home from the hotel room. He said he had been kept a prisoner there registered as J. C. Cox, of Cincinnati.

The francs paraded, as they were called, were found in a main street garbage can. When he returned a half hour later the package remained intact. Believing the kidnapers failed to show up, for fear of being double-crossed, Little pocketed the money and went home, intending to seek other means today of obtaining his son.

WANT HIGHER PAY ON ESTATES OF KING GEORGE

Employers Demand Eight Hour Day and Three Pounds a Week—Commissioner's Reply.

London, March 26.—The employees on the King's estates in Scotland, including Balmoral Castle, are demanding an eight-hour day and a raise in wages to three pounds weekly. James D. Ramsay, king's commissioner on the Balmoral estates, has given the men the option of working ten hours a day or quitting their jobs. So far as is known he has said nothing to them concerning wages.

An attachment against the property of John Rankin, former proprietor of the Hotel Gerard, was granted in the supreme court yesterday by Justice Newburger in a \$10,000 suit of Nellie O'Rourke, an actress, to recover \$18,000. A tragedy occurred yesterday afternoon in Grand Falls, when Miss Phoebe Bell was shot and killed by Newman Clarke of Four Falls, a rejected suitor. Clarke almost immediately afterwards shot himself and is in a critical condition. Several young people had assembled at the home of Herbert Wood, the two principals among them, and Clarke, without any warning to the young girl, drew a revolver and shot her three times through the abdomen. He then fired two shots into his own breast. Dr. Lorenzo Chapman was called but finding that nothing could be done for Miss Bell he turned his attention toward Clarke. He found two wounds, one of which was proved fatal. Coroner George Ryan will hold an inquest. Clarke is about thirty years of age and it is said the shooting was caused by her refusal to marry him. Miss Bell, who is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Bell, is eighteen years of age.

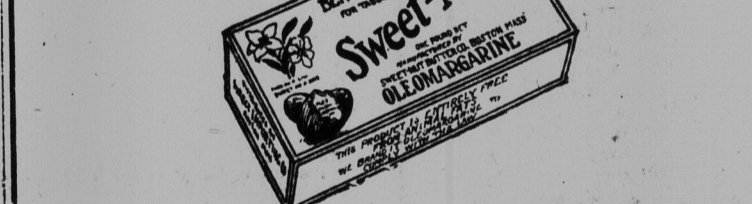

THE BIG ISSUE

St. John must look to its interests as a national port. The big thing, so far as this city is concerned, is still harbor improvement. As the case stands there is a proposal to spend many millions more in building national steamships with as yet no evidence that there will be a proportional expenditure to provide those steamships with docking facilities in winter at the Canadian ports.

They were fully developed they would provide the power for one-eighth of all the manufacturing carried on in the United States in 1912. 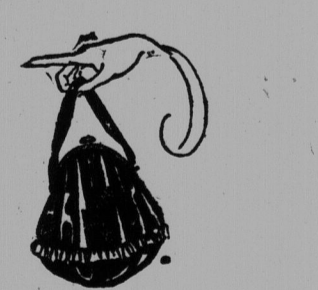

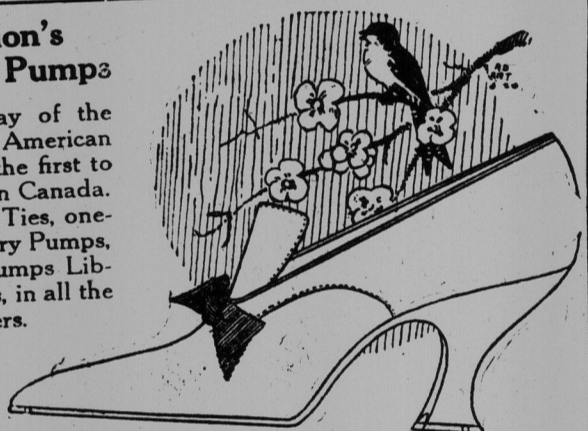

## PROLONG LIFE TO 1900 YEARS

Dr. Fisk Bases Possibility on Experiments With Fruit Flies.

New York, March 26—Announcement of the establishment of the National Radium Bank, which has \$275,000 worth of radium to lend to hospitals and physicians for therapeutic use all over the country free of charge, was made at the annual meeting of the Medical Society of the state of New York, says the Sun and New York Herald. The bank is at 85 Liberty street, and the Post-Graduate Hospital already has received from it without charge \$40,000 worth of the material for use in its research work and its cancer experiments.

Further interest was given to the proceedings by the possibility—advanced by Dr. Eugene J. Fisk of the Life Extension Institute in a paper read before a joint meeting of the section on medicine and the section on public health, hygiene and sanitation—that human life might be prolonged for as much as 1,900 years. Dr. Fisk admitted that such a thing would be "terrible" but said that if the life cycle of men and women was lengthened to the proportionate extent that science has already stretched the life of the fruit fly, it was entirely possible.

Dr. S. A. V. Sobocky exhibited the three grams of radium which will constitute the National Radium Bank's capital to the assembled physicians at the Waldorf. It was contained in two lead cylinders eight inches in diameter, in which holes had been bored for the small glass tubes which enclosed the pure radium. It is the largest collection of American-mined radium in existence, and represents the most valuable individual mass of the precious mineral in the world. The cylinders were watched closely by private detectives during the time they were on view, although it was declared that the radium would be quite useless to the ordinary thief.

The radium came from Colorado, and the United States is no longer dependent upon outside countries for the supply of this element. The founders of the bank are T. Coleman du Pont, Allen W. Everts, Redmond Cross and F. W. Bliss.

**How to Postpone Senility.**  
Dr. Fisk's suggestion regarding the prolongation of human life came in a paper he delivered on "Preventative Diseases of Adult Life." He declared that senility was always premature and that youth is a hyacinth state and not a function of time.

"To postpone middle and old age has seemed a quixotic and fantastic proposition," said he. "But even to double or triple it is a simple thing compared with communicating with the spirits of the dead. Some persons believe it irrelevant to talk of changing the life cycle and not a wish by God, but old age is always premature, just as death from typhoid or tuberculosis is premature. Physical collapse is a result of the cumulative effect of antagonistic conditions. We find an analogy in changing the life cycle of other living organisms. That of the fruit fly has been increased 900 per cent and the same proportionate increase would make man capable of living for 1,900 years."

It is possible, Dr. Fisk said, to make a category of conditions antagonistic to human life. Included among them are hereditary, infectious, poison, food deficiency, food excess, fear, grief, emotional excess and psychic apathy due to lack of life interest.

"The life cycle of every organism is limited by some fault in structure, cause, or self-poisoning," went on Dr. Fisk. "The turtle lives to be 200 years old and the California redwoods are practically immortal. Of course, we have to consider that changed conditions may abolish all life on the earth, and my mind is open to that extent."

A resolution was passed by the doctors declaring the organization opposed to compulsory health insurance because "it undermines the firm ethical foundation upon which medicine now rests," and would make us "subservient to politically appointed commissioners."

Dr. Robert T. Morris of New York city told the physicians there is imperative need of establishing a home for aged physicians who are unable to support themselves.

He said he had been in the employ of the C. P. O. S. for thirteen years and he knew the regulations and had never broken them regarding selling goods on board ship. Capparet and Bassene also denied the charge. The case was postponed until this afternoon. C. F. Inches appeared for the prosecution and W. R. Scott for the defence.

A fruit steward named Fisher, on the S. S. Scotlan, was before the police magistrate on a charge of being absent from the ship without leave. He was remanded.

## FREDERICTON NEWS

Fredericton, March 25.—Representatives of Smith and Athey are now in Boston inspecting machinery to be purchased for the provincial government lime rock crushing plant at Torreyburn. They will operate the plant, but arrangements with them have not been entirely completed.

Col. O. W. Wetmore of Clifton, Kings county, is president, and A. G. Turney, provincial horticulturist, is secretary-treasurer. Among those who will address the association are G. E. Sanders, Dominion entomological laboratory of Annapolis, N. S., and C. W. Baxter, Dominion fruit commissioner of Ottawa.

The Fredericton Housing board, recently appointed by the city council, organized last night. A notice has been issued to the public that applications should be made as soon as possible so that the board may know what expenditure may be required. Inclusive of land and local improvements are placed as follows: For frame-stucco or brick veneer, \$2,000 to \$3,500; for brick, hollow tile or concrete, with fireproof roofing, \$4,000 to \$4,500.

## THE CAILLAUX CASE

Paris, March 25.—The high court of the senate held a private sitting yesterday to hear the defence of Joseph Caillaux, former premier. The testimony was to rebut evidence given by William Martin, former French ambassador to Madrid, who declared that King Alfonso of Spain had told him in 1912 that Caillaux threatened him with death at the time of the Agadir incident in 1911.

Every member of the staff in Ottawa, with perhaps the exception of the deputy minister and his assistants, received notice that his or her services would be dispensed with on May 15.

Doherty recalled the old days of Montreal as a fur centre and said that history was now repeating itself.

At a meeting of the executive of the Sackville Local Council of Women last week Mrs. H. M. Wood and Mrs. Peters were appointed a committee to interview the town council and discuss with them the possibility of providing supervised playgrounds for Sackville during the coming summer. Mrs. Peters, who is enthusiastic in child welfare work, was also appointed a delegate to a possible provincial playgrounds convention.

SAYS THE GOLD IS IN OTTAWA

From England and Intended for New York

Millions Brought to Halifax and Taken to Ottawa—Expected in New York Very Soon.

New York, March 26.—The Sun and New York Herald, which last week printed a report that a large amount of British gold was being shipped to New York via Halifax, today declared the gold has been temporarily stored in Ottawa and is to be shipped here from the dominion capital in the near future.

The Sun story says: "For the first time since the publication of news that British gold was about to be sent to New York via Canada, the Bank of England's weekly statement, issued yesterday, showed a loss in gold holdings of £2,500,000, equivalent at normal rates of exchange to \$12,500,000. This is a reduction in the visible amount of gold at disposal of the British government. There is no way of checking up on the movement of the invisible holdings, which are not in the custody of the Bank of England.

It was said in authoritative circles yesterday that a large amount of gold had been carried to Ottawa, having been brought to Halifax in British warships, and yesterday's Bank of England statement was the first intimation that gold might be on the way from Ottawa to New York. In official circles no statement would be made other than the assertion that a gold import movement would not be announced until the yellow metal actually reached New York.

## DIVISION IN THE OPPOSITION RANKS

Referred to by Mr. Tilley Yesterday—Commends Report of Workmen's Compensation Board.

Fredericton, March 25.—The members of the province are disposed to act fairly, honestly and generously with any government which may be in control of the crown lands; and, should conditions in the lumber business continue as they are at present, the operators would not object to an increase in the stumpage rates, said Hon. J. P. Burchill, in his address to the budget debate this afternoon, commenting on the sudden anxiety of the opposition to have the stumpage rates increased, he pointed out that the order-in-council, passed by the old government and only rescinded after the Flemming revolutions, fixing the rate at \$1.50 for ten years, would have cost the province half a million dollars this year and a larger sum each year as the rates are increased.

The debate was opened by Mr. Tilley, whose remarks were moderate in tone, and whose speech was chiefly remarkable for the scarcity of material for criticism which he found in the government record. In his opening remarks he spoke quite frankly of the division in the opposition ranks and of the fact that he was one of the minority which had opposed the re-election of Mr. Murray as their leader. In several matters Mr. Tilley, with equal frankness, expressed his approval of the present administration. He had found the report of the workmen's compensation board one of the best ever presented to the legislature. He approved the securities in which the reserve had been invested, and the auditor selected by the government for the audit of the public accounts, and expressed admiration for the open manner in which the deficit had been shown.

The few criticisms which Mr. Tilley directed against the government were fully answered by Mr. Burchill, who followed. When this veteran of the legislature arose to speak he received the unusual tribute of applause of equal generosity from both sides of the house. No man possesses more thoroughly the respect and admiration of the entire house, and he always is assured of an attentive hearing. The dignity and good humor which always mark his utterances do not lessen the force of his blows, when he considers hard hitting necessary. His clear exposition of the circumstances surrounding the government's sale of bonds of the Valley Railway securities in the English market left no grounds on which to base further criticism of that transaction.

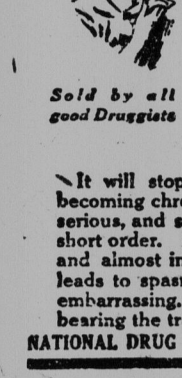
"The true test of good business," he said, "is the ability to see a favorable opportunity and to take advantage of it."

Mr. Guphill, in a short speech, discussed provincial affairs in the same tone which had marked the other addresses of the afternoon, and made the practical suggestion that the house might save much valuable time by cutting down the debate on the reply to the speech from the throne.

The adjournment of the debate was moved by Hon. Dr. Smith, minister of lands and mines, who will be the next speaker when the discussion is resumed. This will be on Tuesday next, as the premier announced that this arrangement had been made at the request of the opposition.

The evening session was devoted chiefly to consideration of the amendments to the registry act in committee of the whole. The section providing that the St. John registry office should open half an hour earlier than the others and be closed on Saturday afternoon, started some discussion, but a motion that the section be struck out was voted down. It is expected that the house will adjourn on Tuesday.

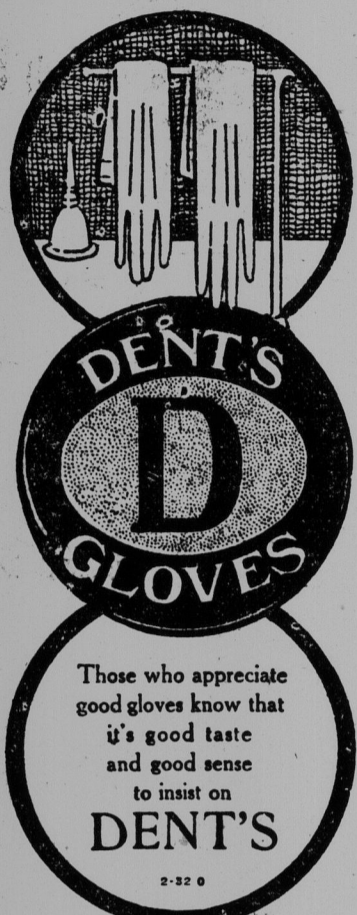
## EASTERN MEN ARE PROMINENT IN G. W. V. A. COUNCIL

### Discussion and Decision of Convention in Montreal on Matter of Bonus to Soldiers.

(Special to Times.)  
Montreal, March 26.—The maritime provinces stood out prominently yesterday at the G. W. V. A. convention on the question of re-establishment for the returned soldier. With the exception of a few sections of Nova Scotia, they lifted a united voice in favor of the scheme adopted by the parliamentary committee last fall—a body which had spent some months in deliberation of the various proposals for re-establishment and had argued the matter before members appointed by parliament. It was largely a case of east vs. west. Delegates from the west went on record as in favor of a cash bonus—delegates from the east supported the idea of the committee—a definite programme of re-establishment.

When the Calgary resolution was put an amendment was moved by J. L. Heston of Halifax, late commander of the 8th Battalion, in favor of the original G. W. V. A. scheme. He advanced strong arguments, appealing for unanimity, saying that all returned men were not in absolute need of a cash gift, that the dominion executive had given months of careful and studious deliberation to the question and had arrived at a solution which he thought the convention should sustain.

His amendment was seconded by J. B. Dever of St. John, who said that while he believed re-establishment to be necessary with the majority of returned men, he did not believe in the principle of a cash bonus which, in his case, according to the Calgary scheme, would mean a "quit claim" to the government "for services rendered." Its acceptance at once meant that the government was finished with the returned man. He

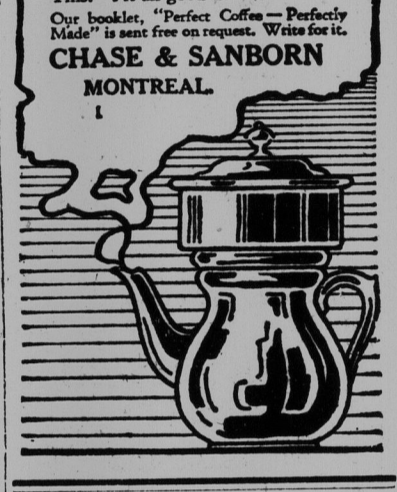

## NOT THIS YEAR, SAYS RICKARD

New York, March 26.—There is no chance for a world's championship bout in 1920 between Dempsey and Carpenter, according to Tex Rickard, one of the foremost promoters for the contest. The French champion probably will not extend his present visit to the United States, Rickard said today, and he must return to Paris for a bout scheduled in August.

This is sufficient to prevent his appearance against Dempsey in any year, the promoter added, explaining that for the international bout to be a financial success it would have to be held in the open, and as Carpenter would be busy until July he would not have enough time to train before the arrival of cold weather.

## YESTERDAY AT OTTAWA

### Canadian Navy Will Be Reorganized on Pre-War Basis — The Franchise Bill.

Ottawa, March 26.—(Canadian Press) Yesterday in parliament Hon. C. C. Ballantyne announced that the government will conduct the Canadian naval reorganization of the force. Admiral Kingsmill retires. A light cruiser and two torpedo boat destroyers are accepted from the British admiralty.

Hugh Guthrie moved the second reading of the new dominion franchise bill, precipitating a stormy discussion. He explained that the object of the bill was to provide a uniform franchise throughout Canada for both sexes.

Hon. W. L. MacKenzie King replied in a conciliatory spirit, stating that the opposition would endeavor to assist in framing a fair and profitable act.

At the evening sitting Dr. Edwards, Frontenac, precipitated a dispute by Mr. Pardee that persons of alien enemy origin should be allowed to vote. He declared that "there was never a country which prospered by sucking traitors."

Dr. Michael Clark appealed to the government to call a cabinet meeting and cut the disenfranchising clause wholly from the bill. This would be setting an example to the world of the only big way for dealing with reconstruction problems.

### TWELVE DOLLARS A DAY FOR PLUMBERS

Birmingham, Ala., March 26.—Journeymen plumbers on April 1 will demand \$12 a day, with double pay for overtime, Sundays and holidays. The master plumbers say the demand will meet and the additional cost passed on to the public.

### QUEBEC TO HAVE DAYLIGHT SAVING

At a meeting of the city council to Quebec, March 26.—(Canadian Press) night Alderman Mercier will move for the city to adopt daylight saving time on May 2.

London, March 26.—(Canadian Press) Notable deaths yesterday include Bishop Diggle of Carlisle; Bishop Jacob of St. Albans; Prof. Speelman, a noted Blackpool musician; Sir John Glover, ship-owner.

### POST ON COMMITTEE FOR PERMANENT COURT

London, March 26.—Elhu Root has accepted an invitation to become a member of a committee agreed upon at the London meeting of the council of the League of Nations to work out the details for the constitution of a permanent court of international justice.

### HERD CARIBOU FROM AIR, IS PLAN OF W. H. F. JARVIS

Manipulation of the countless thousands of barren lands caribou and sheep by use of airplanes is the scheme of W. H. F. Jarvis of Toronto, in planning the best means of herding these animals. It is Jarvis' theory that aviators act as drovers, and as the herds come down in the autumn drive them against the shores of the Hudson Bay and down along the coast and behind a strong fence built from a point above Port Nelson, the tidewater terminal of the Hudson Bay Railway. Once they are jammed between the sea and the fence, he expects to segregate the sexes, and the does could be let through gateway and given their freedom, while the fat bucks could be driven to the Hudson Bay Railway, and there slaughtered and shipped out to the Canadian and United States markets. The scheme provides for airplanes at Fort Churchill, Lake Athabasca and Chesterfield Inlet. The aviators would be expected to go scouting with machine guns for wolves and destroy them, in order to preserve the caribou.

## AFRICA HAS GREAT PURCHASING POWER

### Three Millions Worth of Pleasure Cars From U. S. in Eleven Months.

Based on its per capita of white population, South Africa has the greatest purchasing power of any country in the world, according to figures compiled by the National Foreign Trade Council, which has just been made public by O. K. Davis of New York, secretary of that organization, who says that this fact is not realized by many American manufacturers.

With a population of only 1,280,000

whites," says Secretary Davis, "3,056,821 worth of pleasure cars were sent to the Union of South Africa from the United States during the eleven months ending November, 1919. Without special effort we have increased our exports from \$14,884,874 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1914, to \$40,349,624 in the eleven months ending November, 1919.

The possibilities of developing American trade throughout the union are very great, as there is an insistent demand for American goods in almost every part. Perhaps the best opportunities are to be found in the supplying of specialized machinery and labor-saving devices for factory and farm use.

Under the stress of war conditions, great increase in factory production has taken place throughout South Africa and manufacturers desire information about the latest and best machinery that will decrease the cost and increase the output. The trade of the country districts,

however, is of a very backward character. The farmer does not take kindly to drastic innovations or changes in design or character of goods he uses or wears. Price, to a certain extent, is an important factor, but continuity of supply is of even greater importance than mere price.

### British Loan to Belgium.

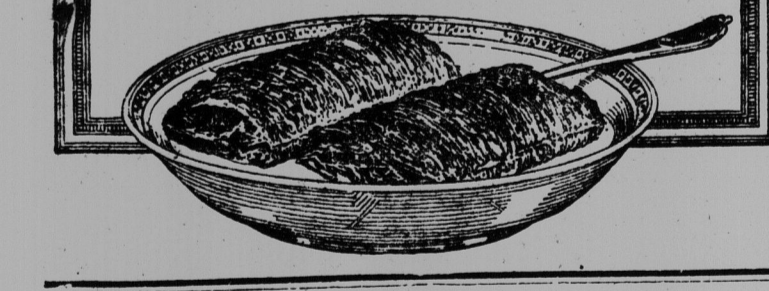

**LLOYD GEORGE MAKES READY**

(Toronto Globe.)  
The return to parliament of Mr. Asquith may make for a reconciliation between the Liberals who follow him and the less radical elements in the Labor party. Such a combination would be a serious threat against the coalition. Lloyd George, who is a great political strategist, may be planning against the possibility of an offensive of that nature. The falling off in the vote for the coalition in many of the by-elections will not be lost sight of by a campaigner of his calibre.

Here are a few illuminating comparisons between the coalition votes in the general elections of December, 1918, and subsequent by-elections:

A drop of nearly 33,000 in the coalition vote in these contests shows a trend that Lloyd George is not likely to view with equanimity. Another general election in Britain does not appear to be far distant.

**GET MORE FARMERS BY RURAL CREDITS**

Hon. Mr. Doherty Outlines Scheme at Stratford Meeting.

Hon. Manning Doherty, minister of agriculture, addressed a meeting of the agricultural section of the Chamber of Commerce in Stratford, Ont., last week. Mr. Doherty spoke on rural problems and told how he proposed to try and improve conditions in the country and keep the people there. One plan, he stated, he intended to try was a system of rural credits by which it would be possible for farmers' sons or farm laborers to get a start for themselves. He said that in his opinion, with better educational facilities, a better chance for community life would make life more attractive and keep the young people on the farm and increase production, which was the only real remedy for the high cost of living.

Pointing out that there are now 50,000 fewer farmers in Ontario than in 1872, and that the production of people living in the country and in towns and cities had exactly reversed themselves in thirty years. Mr. Doherty said that it was quite necessary that there must be more production if the cost of living is to decrease. Thirty per cent cannot go on feeding themselves and the other 70 per cent, and provide for export for an indefinite period. Mr. Doherty expressed himself as heartily in accord with the plan of having an agricultural section of the Board of Trade and urged the farmers to join.

**PRICES CLIMB**

Another marked increase in prices of the necessities of life in Canada during February is noted in the Labor Gazette for March. Practically every one of the essentials of domestic life, including building materials, metals, fuel and rent shows a movement in price "steeply upward," says The Gazette.

The family food budget in some sixty cities averaged \$15.70 at the middle of January, \$18.41 in February a year ago, and \$7.75 in February, 1914.

Wholesale prices are also on the increase, as compared with \$15.20 in February, the index number in the Gazette rising to 848.5 for February, as compared with 836.4 for January, 279.8 for February a year ago, and 186.5 for February, 1914.
