A. W. Covey Makes Announcement of Action By Canadian Amateur Athletic Union-Fairville Practically Same

All the players of the East End League are under the ban. This was the uitimatum handed out by A. W. Covey, local representative of the Maritime Province Branch of the Canadian Amateur Athletic Union yesterday. The East End League, Mr. Covey said, had been warned that they were not operating as prescribed by the amateur organization and as their time limit for coming into the fold had expired, he saw nothing else to do but suspend them. They are therefore outlaws until they make application for and receive reinstatement from the union and have their players registered and their league is sanctioned.

The Fairville League is sailing under practically the same colors. They too have failed to look after registration and sanction, their case has been reported and action will be taken to have them suspended immediately.

It is regarded as unfortunate that these two leagues which are the back-bone of amateur baseball in the city, should fall into disfavor and the lovers of clean amateur sport are in hopes that the matter will be straightened out and the teams soon restored to their old basis.




