### Lloyd George Interviewed

Lloyd George Interviewed Mr. Lloyd-George has been interviewed by the London correspondent of the "Neue Frie Press," and a long communication sent by the journalist covers practically every point in the chancellor's political faith. He explained to his interviewer that the glory of the Liberal party con-sists in its being able to unite the wealthy middle, and working classes in the service of democratic progress. He sounds again the note of alarm regarding the demands for armaments, and says that, unless the nations of the world take care, there will soon be no money for social reform, for state finance is being invested in guns and warships.

warships. He is reported to have exclaimed "Since I, a radical democrat, have beer chancellor, the navy budget has risen by 560,000,000. The largest part of the Brit sh nation, irrespective of party, is, like nyself, horrified at that all-devouring its."
