





He who is in full possession of his health should enjoy sound refreshing sleep.

The waste products of bodily activity, that is, the daily elimination of all cell and tissue changes thrown off by respiration and the processes of renewal and repair appear to be the real factors which cause sleep. On these waste products in a large measure depends the distribution of the blood.

The lessening of the blood supply the brain is no longer regarded as a factor of great importance in producing sleep. While the blood pressure is not materially changed, the heart action may be said to enjoy a slight decrease during the sleep.

ENGLAND HAS MANY UNIQUE CAVES AND SHAFTS IN CITIES

Considering the small size of England and the number of shafts and caves, artificial and natural is remarkable,

and many of them are unsurpassed for interest and beauty.
Ingleforough, in North West Yorkshire, contains some splendid examples, of which Gaping Ghyll, Rowton Pot, and Alum Pot are the deepest.
The first named goes down 360 feet, and opens out into a great cavern, described by its first explorer, M. Martel, as "an immense cathedral."
This "cathedral" is 500 feet long by about 100 feet high, and is one of the largest caves in the world. Out of it run passages and crevasses in which the inexperienced adventurer could easily get lost.
Rowten Pot is 365 feet deep, going

easily get lost.

Rowten Pot is 365 feet deep, going sheer deep, and Alum Pot cakes two strides to reach 200 feet.

Few old cities do not possess legends concerning underground passages, the scenes of deeds of darkness in historical times; but fact provides Nottingham with the best example. Beneath this city a river flows, passing on its mysterious journey vast caverns and burrowedout hiding places of the early Baxons. It passes beneath the market place, and has been navigated for a considerable distance in a small boat.

Surrey contains great numbers of subterranean workings, the best known of which are the Chiselburst Caves, said to be the home of early Christian worship in the country, and to have had much the same use as the Catecombs

ship in the country, and to have had much the same use as the Catecombs of Rome.

Godstone, in Surrey, is honeycombed with caves and passages, and in one known instance a small boy wander-ed into the underworld to vanish for-

The caves of Derbyshire are famous and deservedly so, the most interesting being the Peak Cavern and Thro's cave. The latter is an almost inaccessible spot in the hillside, 50 feet above the Maniford river, and has many sinster legends attached to it. Its grim surrounding and dark twisting give every feeling of truth to these tales.





Presented in this day of revived fop-pishness, the pictured romance of the Beau, authenticated as well as may be from historic and legendary sources, should find a particularly receptive

audience.

Barrymore is soundly supported by the cast. Willard Louis, as the Prince Regent, is hardly second to him. Irene Rich, Marry Astor, Carmel Myers, Alec Francis, William Humphries and Richard Tucker, to single out a few others, contribute vitally to the drama cunningly woven by Director Beaumont.

The common impression of Brummel is vague beyond the fact that he was the pink of dress and manner. That his capitalization of elegance came as a result of a tragic love affair, and that he subsequently fell to rags and madness when royal favor waned, is the illuminating gist of the story as filmed.

In ludicrous, tense and pathetic episode is unrecled the progress of the dandy who, to avenge himself for broken romance, deliberately sets out to use his charm and wit in a game against that snobbish society which wounded him. He toys mockingly with the prince, finding wry pleasure in dalliance with court women, dominance of the dull regent and his retainers, the jealousies of his impotent enemies, the vanities indulged at expense of his cowed creditors. Too sure of his power, finally, he offends Wales and sinks quickly into that oblivion whence he arose.

Despite the general excellence of the

Despite the general excellence of the film and the brilliant acting of Barrymore, I feel he has missed a truly great performance by a narrow margin. I think it lies in his failure quite to exploit the deep, warm undertones of character, the tender romanticism below the veneer of bitterness, which "Beau Brummel" ascribes to the title role.

role.

But if Barrymore misses shades of characterization in the earlier passages, he rises to superb heights of artistry at the close when, doddering in a prison asylum and musing with wraiths, his Brummel is found by the lost sweetheart, Lady Margery, now widowed, and by his faithful retainer. Here the shriveled soul of the Beau peers forth pathetically, the restraints of pose gone.
