

A two-inch chain with links eleven by seven inches runs through the centre from sem to stern. From this cross chains of one and a quarter inch extend laterally every seven feet, not opposite each other, but alternately. Arranged near the bow and stern are three bride chains of one and a half inches, extending from the central chain in herringbone form at distances of 20 feet apart. When the raft is completed the projecting ends of all these lateral chains will be made fast to chains which are to encircle the whole fabric, binding together the whole mass. The breaking strain of the main chain is 80 tons, and of the encircling chains twenty-four tons, Admirality test. The chains will weigh about fiftyfour tons. Hard wood saplings, laid across the timbers at each tier, also act as binders.

The Pitch-Pine Industry.

The Pitch-Pine Industry.

That curious industry—the extraction of oil and turpentine from pine by distillation—is represented in Augusta, Me. F.ve cords of fat pine are used in the kiln er oven at a single charge. This charge is smothered, the same as if intended for charcoal. The first result is a quality of turpentine as clear as crystal. The second is turpentine oil, pure and unadulterated. The third is a liquor resembling tar, but thinner and having a pleanant odor. Three or four drops of this on a bit of sugar will cure an ordinary sore throat in an hour, and instantly relieve hoarseness or tickling in the throat. It is largely used South for both man and beast, and most people regard it as a sure cure for everything except a broken neck. The fourth result is a mixture largely used by gravel roofers, and to some extent by painters. It is not only waterproof, but a great preservative. MAXWELL ENDEAVORS TO EXPLAIN THE ST. LOUIS TRUNK MYSTERY. Sr. Louis, May 26.-In the Maxwell murder trial, to-day, the defendent was placed on the stand in his own behalf. He said his real name was Hugh M. Brooks; that he was born in Chester, England, and that he was 25 years old. He was a lawyer by profession and had studied medicine, but was not licensed to practice it. He first met Prellar in a hotel at Liverpool and after on the steamer Cephalonia bound fer Boston. They be. came fast friends, and after their arrival in Boston they agreed to meet in St. Louis and go to Auckland together. Both went to St. Louis at separate times and met as agreed. Preliar was suffering from a stricture and he treated him for it. Prellar agreed that the operation should be performed and Brooks administer ed chlor oform to Prellar. Soon he discovered that the patient was breathing heavily and that he was dying. Brooks did all in his power to revive his friend, but his in his power to revive his friend, but his efforts were without avail. Even after Prellar was dead Brooks kept up his efforts to revive him. When all hope was gone Brooks was ozerome with horror at his situation.
