SYNOPSIS OF GANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Dom-Inion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatche-Any even numbered section of Dom-lnion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatche-not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter sec-tion of 160 acres, more or less. Entry must be made personally, at the local land office for the district in which the land is situate. The homesteader is required to per-form the conditions connected there-with under one of the following plans: (1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in sach year for three years. (2) If the father (or mother, if the fither is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother. (3) If the settler has his permanent

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of the homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the salv
