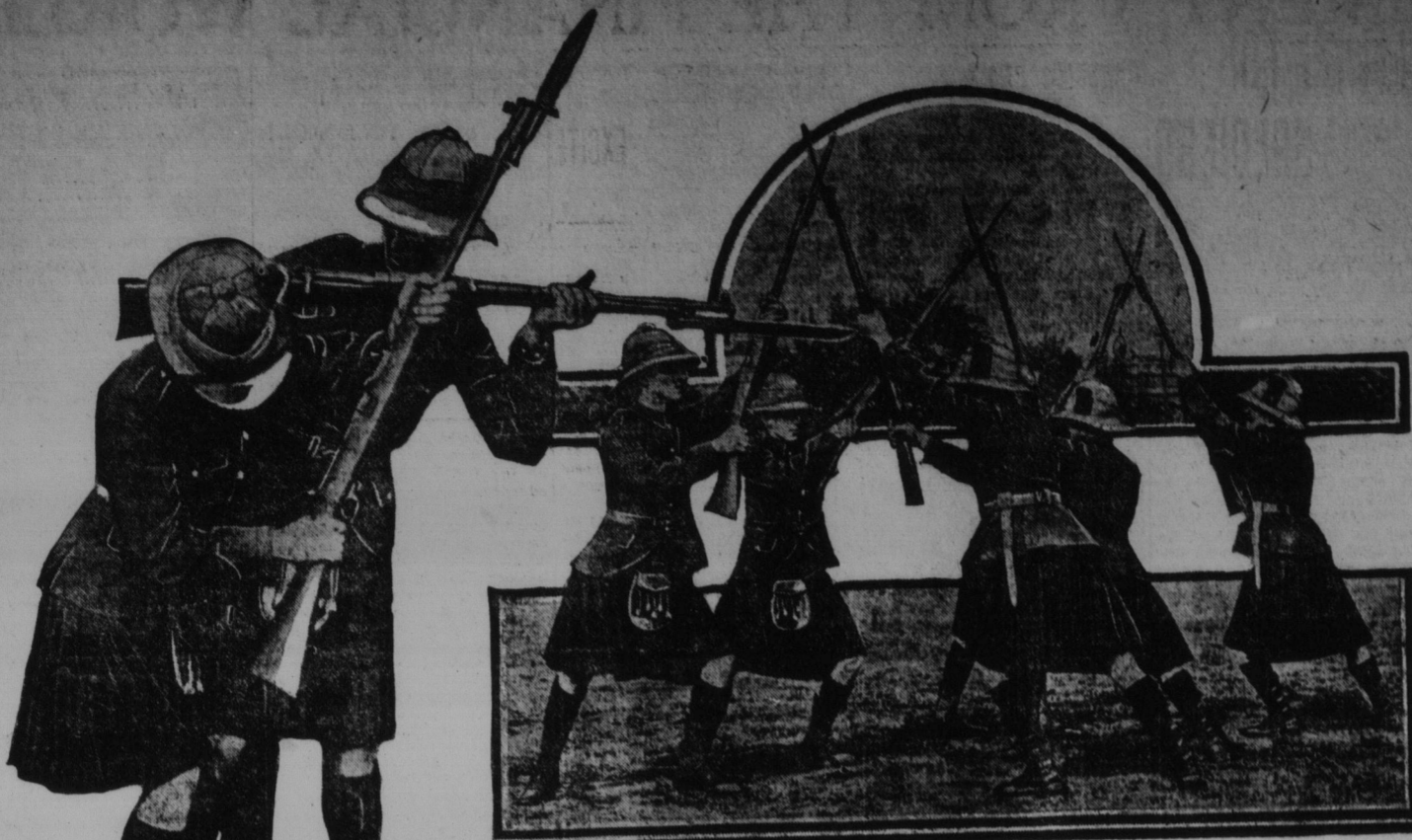

MABEL TRASK ADDS ONE MORE TO LIST OF WINS

Driven by Walter Cox Defeats St. Frisco in Race for \$2,500 Purse at Atlanta.

Atlanta, Ga., Oct. 20.—Mabel Trask, owned and driven by Walter R. Cox, added to her wins over her harness rival, St. Frisco, when in straight heats in the Grand Circuit races here today she won the Georgia Railway and Power Company cup and the big end of a \$2,500 purse. Her best time was 2:07 1-4, in the third heat.

The two favorites trotted consistently, St. Frisco, with his owner, Geers, driving, finished each heat in second place, and in neither more than a neck behind. The race was for the 2:08 class, trotting, with a field of five.

The Real Lady, driven by Murphy, and Mary Coburn were the only starters in the two-year-old class trotting event, and Mary Coburn won.

The 2:11 class, pacing, was won by Little Frank D. in straight heats.

Three heats of the 2:07 class, trot, were staged, but at least one more will be necessary to decide the event.

Lee Axworthy, the world's champion trotting stallion, with B. F. White at the reins, broke the Georgia track record of 2:05. He reeled off the mile in 1:59 3-4.

Peter Mac, piloted by M. McDevitt, trotted an exhibition mile in 2:04 1-2.

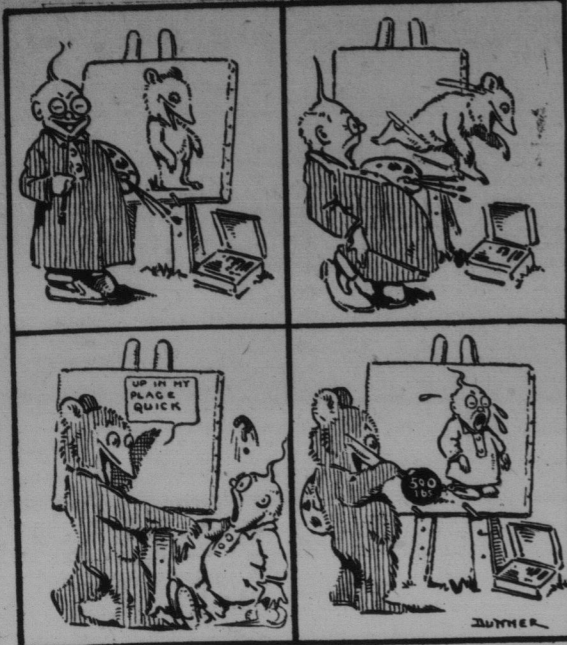
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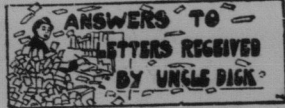

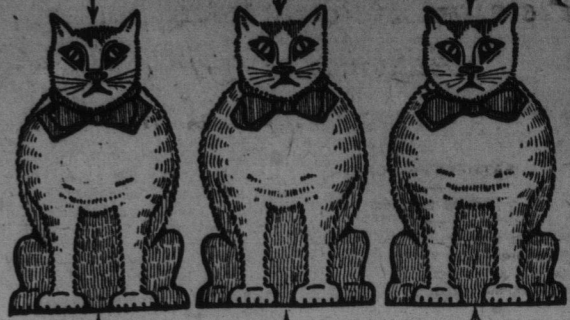

Ingredients: 3 teaspoonfuls of butter, 1/2 cup of flour, 1/3 cup of rice flour, 1/2 cup of castor sugar, 3 teaspoonfuls of grated chocolate, the yolk of 1 egg, and a few drops of vanilla.
Sieve the flour, and stir them lightly with your hands; rub in the butter; add the chocolate; beat up the yolk, and put it in, with all the other ingredients. The mixture must be stiff, when mixed, or the chocolate will melt too much. Drop it in little heaps on a greased tin, and bake in a quick oven about 15 minutes.
