TRADE OF THE DOMINION

Canada's Great Trade Expansion Continues Unabated-Increase This Year of Probably Five **Hundred Million Dollars.**

Bombardment by the British artillery of the German lines in the Ypres sector, in Flanders, continues most intense, but there has been no infantry movement in force. An attack on a larger scale than the usual daily raids probably is imminent.

Berlin apparently is much exercised cover the ever-increasing volume of shell from the British big guns. From the Houtholst Wood northeast of Ypres, to the River Lys, on the Belgo-French border, Berlin reports, the British fire has been destructive. Field Marshal Haig's artillery increased its volume of fire to drum, fire several times.

As on the front in Flanders and Artois, there has been no major operation on the French portion of the western front. At several points from the Aisne Valley to Lorraine, the French have carried out raids into the German defenses. Here, too, the expenditure of amunition is great, especially on the Alsne front and northeast of Verdun.

QUEBEC BRIDGE SPAN LIKELY TO BE UP TODAY

THUNDERSTORM ALARMED QUEBEC BRIDGE ENGINEERS

Happily, However, the Tempest Caused No Damage and Great Span Will Probably Be in Place Today-Span is Now 140 Feet Above Stream, and Has Been Actually Raised 120 Feet.

Quebec, Sept. 19.—The central span of the Quebec bridge was raised to such a height today that an ocean god ing vessel was able to pass directly under it in safety. The ship that made the trip is the Lingan, a collier, bound from Sydney, C. B., to Montreal. No other ocean going vessel will be permitted by the marine department to use the channel until the span is firmly bolted in its final position. An exception was made in the case of the Lingan because her cargo is badly needed in Montreal.
