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**PROCEEDINGS**

OF THE

**THIRTY-FOURTH ANNUAL MEETING**

OF THE

**Wesleyan Methodist Missionary Auxiliary Society,**

**For Nova Scotia, Cape Breton, and P. E. Island.**

*Held in Oakland Chapel, Newport, June 10th, 1851.*

JOHN ALLISON Esq. in the Chair.

The meeting was opened by the Rev. RICHARD WILLIAMS by singing and prayer.

The Report was read by the Rev. J. McMURRAY.

Moved by the Rev. WM. BENNETT, seconded by the Rev. R. MORTON.

I. That the progress made by the Wesleyan Missionary Society, and by other Protestant Institutions, in their scriptural efforts to evangelize the world, has been such as should excite devout gratitude to ALMIGHTY GOD, for his past direction and blessing, and encourage to persevering and believing exertion for the universal triumph of "the truth as it is in Jesus."

Moved by the Rev. W. WILSON, seconded by the Rev. R. WEDDALL.

II. That this Meeting, deeply deploring the state of those portions of mankind, who destitute of the blessings which a pure Christianity only can confer, are misled and degraded by various forms of superstition and sin, humbly resolves, in dependence upon the Divine promises, to renew and increase its exertions to sustain the Parent Institution in the maintenance and extension of its benevolent operations.

III. That this meeting impressed by a conviction of the impotence of all merely human appliances to rescue the world from the dominion of error and vice, calls upon the lovers of the Saviour to unite in more frequent and fervent prayer for the more copious effusion of the Holy Spirit upon the Church at large, and especially upon the labours of Christian Missionaries.

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## REPORT.

THE Committee of the Nova Scotia Auxiliary Wesleyan Missionary Society in presenting their annual Report, deem it unnecessary to occupy the attention of their friends and supporters by lengthened preliminary observations upon the philosophy of Christian Missions, the principles upon which the missionary enterprise is based, or the operation of those principles in the different ages of the church. To dilate upon the various branches of this great subject would fill volumes, and yet the whole scheme rests upon a few simple truths familiar to the most unlettered disciple of Christ.

Every enlightened christian of the present day delights to recognise the claims of Christ to universal dominion, and views with deep interest the state and prospects of mankind in relation to the Gospel of Christ, gladly remembering His high behest, uttered among the last intimations of His will, and when, having completed His mission to the world, He was returning in triumph as the King of glory to the right hand of the majesty on high—"Go ye into all the world, and preach the Gospel to every creature."

Regarding this authoritative direction, accompanied as it is by the assurance of His effectual presence with his obedient people, as plainly announcing both the duty and privilege of the church through all time, we rejoice that we are in any measure engaged in carrying out the gracious purposes of our Redeeming and glorified Lord; and esteem it our distinguished honour to be employed by the court of Heaven on this high embassy, involving, as it does, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will to men."

We now proceed to lay before you, in as condensed a form as our extended materials will admit, a statement of the operations of the Parent Society during the past year, and the present state of our widely extended Missions, as compiled from the General Report, and other authentic information recently received.

In the order usually observed we first present a statement of the

The state and prospects of the Society's Missions will now be reviewed in the usual order.

## IRELAND.

The Society's Missions in Ireland embrace many counties of the Kingdom. In some places considerable congregations attend the public ordinances of religion; at other Stations the people are few and scattered, to whom the Missionaries preach the word of life. In these Mission Circuits, the Missionaries have to travel long journeys, in order to impart instruction to the Protestants, and to others willing to receive their teaching. But although called to endure hardship, and contend with various difficulties, they zealously persevere in their hallowed toil; and are comforted by many proofs that their "labour is not in vain in the Lord."

## GERMANY.

The Society's Agent and his assistants in Wirtemberg, are prosecuting their work in the midst of many difficulties. Much political excitement continues, and opposition is offered in various ways, to the spread of pure evangelical truth; but the spirit of religious inquiry extends, and many experience the saving effects of the Gospel. Mr. Muller has Sixteen fellow-labourers, who read and expound the Scriptures, and conduct public worship in the several congregations. He and his associates, and their interesting work, are earnestly commended to the sympathies and prayers of the friends of this Society.

## FRANCE AND SWITZERLAND.

In the English congregation at Paris, the regular administration of the Word and Sacraments has been accompanied during the year with the promised blessing of Almighty God.

The Mission at Calais is maintained in a state of efficiency amongst both the French and English inhabitants. The spirit of Christian union prevails, and a few converts have been added to the Church. The Sabbath-School is in a state of prosperity. It contains upwards of One Hundred and Seventy Children, many of whom have no other means of Christian instruction. Several of the Children have received serious religious impressions. The Mission cause at Boulogne is hopeful.

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SSIONS.

Openings for usefulness present themselves in the Town of *St. Omer*, containing upwards of thirty thousand inhabitants, and in several neighbouring villages.

Among the FRENCH WALDENSES in the *Upper Alps*, Mr. Massot continues his arduous labours with undiminished influence and usefulness.

In SWITZERLAND, during the last year, there have been some painful as well as gratifying circumstances in the state of the Society's Mission. It has lost, by death and emigration, some of its oldest and most devoted members. It has also continued to feel the effects of prohibitory laws against religious assemblies, which almost baffle all attempts to extend the work in the Canton.

The Missionaries write to the following effect—"While we feel bound in all fairness, distinctly to state the adverse circumstances under which we labour, we are far from being discouraged. Why should we? We have been often wonderfully preserved during the year, not have our meetings been once seriously disturbed either by the police or the populace, notwithstanding our fears to the contrary. As to the state of our Societies, not only have the departed members been replaced by new converts, but we are enabled to report a small increase; while at Aigle especially, a good degree of those gracious influences which we mentioned in our last Report has been continued to us during the year. And besides all this, we have been enabled to extend our labours to 'regions beyond,' and Switzerland is likely to become, as we intimated three years ago, a stepping-stone to Missionary labours in Italy.—We therefore firmly believe that we are here at the post of duty, nor dare we flinch or fly."

In answer to a unanimous invitation, Mr. Ogier has taken up his residence at *La Tour*, in the *Val Luserne*. He has laboured with great zeal and a degree of success. The meetings everywhere are large and attentive, the Sacramental and other private means of grace are seasons of rejoicing, conversions to God take place not unfrequently, while persecution attests the reality of the fact that the good cause is advancing.

#### SPAIN.

The Mission at Gibraltar continues to encourage the long cherished hopes of the Committee. The English department has been supplied by the appointment of Mr. Cheesbrough; who had previously been employed for several years, with much success, in the West Indies. It is confidently anticipated that this Mission will, by the blessing of God, reap much advantage from his ministerial labours and general superintendence. Relieved from the pressure of the English work, Mr. Alton is again devoting his attention to the Spanish department, for which he was originally selected, and in which his diligent endeavours have been already attended with an encouraging measure of success.

The number of children attending the Schools shows a pleasing increase upon the year proceeding. Great pains are taken to establish on the most effective plan the moral and religious part of our training system.

#### CEYLON AND CONTINENTAL INDIA.

The importance of the Society's Missions in South Ceylon can hardly be estimated. The interest they possess is both present and prospective. Buddhism is the most gigantic form of error with which the Society has to contend. But the Southern District of Ceylon is at once its cradle and its strength. Strike it here, the wound will be felt to its very centre. Buddhism is a connected system; its doings in other lands are reported here, and occurrences in this land are told in the courts of Kings in Siam and Burmah, and travel wherever its connected machinery is found. The progress and triumph of

Christianity here would tell in every part of the system, and be a prelude to its entire downfall. Prospectively also this Mission has an interest—it is the first-fruits to all future Missions, of the Society in Buddhist lands. The Buddhism of China is only a reflection of that of Ceylon, which was its source.—And therefore the destinies of the future confirm the demand that the Society's only existing Mission to the Buddhists should be well sustained in all the means necessary to secure its present and permanent efficiency.

The TAMUL District embraces the provinces of the north and eastern portion of the island of Ceylon. To quote the language of the Bishop of Colombo, in his Visitation Journal, in 1846, "The Wesleyans found it an unoccupied field, and they entered in to save it, in their own way, of course;—but well have they done their work." "Heathenism is continually losing its hold on the native mind in these districts. There are many indications of it. Instead of five hundred, not fifty temples are kept up as they were."

The Missionaries in the NORTH part of CEYLON have addressed themselves very successfully to the work of education. The results of Mr. Percival's long-continued efforts in this department are described by the Bishop in gratifying terms.

At Jaffna in North Ceylon, the truth is winning an entrance into the minds of both old and young. At Trincomalee the efforts of the Missionary have been directed to awakening a more earnest feeling among the Society and Congregation in behalf of their heathen and ignorant neighbours, and his efforts have happily proved successful to a considerable extent. They have, of their own accord, commenced Social Prayer-meetings, and meetings for the reading of the Holy Scriptures: to these the more serious of their neighbours have been invited. Some of the heathen have begun to attend our public services, and encourage the hopes of the Missionary.

The Mission at Batticaloa presents a field inviting additional labourers, could the means be found for their support. According to the returns last received, "the present number of Church-Members is One Hundred and Fifty-two. The general attendance at the Classes is good, and the conduct of the larger portion is most exemplary. This Mission extends its care to the Veddahs, or aboriginal inhabitants, who dwell in the forests and almost inaccessible mountains of the interior, subsisting upon wild fruits and animals, and making the branches of large trees their resting places. The Veddahs of Narsivantevo and Patale are far in advance of the Rock-Veddahs of Bintenne; having more frequent intercourse with their civilized neighbours, and being engaged in agricultural pursuits. They seem fully disposed to obey the Gospel, and are most industrious and intelligent. God grant that they may soon be favoured with regular pastoral care and instruction!

The Missionaries on the CONTINENT of INDIA have the task of contending with heathenism in its most subtle and injurious forms. Its idolatry puerile and filthy, its science and philosophy erroneous and misleading, but pretending to divine authority and origin, its caste system, arraying classes against each other, but combining them all against the teaching of the revealed truth, are constantly in their view. Missionaries among the Hindus have frequently to begin their work anew, and again to teach and enlarge upon the first principles of the doctrine of Christ. But they are not discouraged nor weary. They regard the Gospel as the only remedy for the moral and spiritual degradation and wretchedness, which they behold; and they are satisfied that it is sufficient and divinely appointed. They request the prayers of the Church at home that the Holy Spirit may be given largely to render their labours successful to the salvation of many.

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## AUSTRALASIA AND POLYNESIA.

The state of the work in **NEW SOUTH WALES, AUSTRALIA FELIX**, and **SOUTH AUSTRALIA** is highly encouraging—new Circuits have been formed—a number of Chapels have been erected during the year, and several others have been enlarged to meet the wants of enlarging congregations. The Societies are increasing in number and spirituality. The members removed by death have exemplified the saving power of the Gospel.

The cheering fact is mentioned that a goodly number of pious youths have been raised up, who take an active part in promoting the interests of the Mission among the widely scattered inhabitants.

The financial affairs of the Mission in South Australia are prosperous.—The expense of supporting the Missionaries is met by the contributions of the people, and it is expected that two additional Missionaries will be supported without cost to the Society.

The English department of the Mission-work at *Auckland*, in the New Zealand District, “wears, on the whole, a cheering aspect.”

The *Native Institution at Three Kings* is making satisfactory progress. The moral character of the students, their thirst for knowledge, and especially the deep interest which they take in the exposition of the Scriptures, are very gratifying.

The work of God has advanced at *Kawhia*, to an extent which calls for gratitude, and affords much encouragement. Several of our principal people, under the gracious influence of the Holy Spirit, have yielded themselves up more fully unto the service of God, and exhibit more of the spirit and power of Christianity. During the year, “nearly the whole of the influential Chiefs have publicly embraced Christianity, and been received into the Church by baptism.”

In one of the despatches of the Governor of New Zealand to the Colonial Secretary, His Excellency remarks, that there can be no doubt that the present tranquillity and prosperity of the country, and the rapid advances which the Native population are making, are in a great degree to be attributed to the exertions of the various religious bodies in New Zealand.

The Missionaries in the *Friendly Islands* District advert to the obstacles to improvement which the character of the native mind presents, but they are not without manifest tokens of the presence and blessing of the Saviour in their labours. At *Habai*, “the general attendance at the house of God is pleasing, and the greater number listen with attention, while, on many occasions, powerful effects have been produced by the preaching of the word.”—From *Vavau* the Missionaries write in a similar strain.

The Missionaries in *Feejee* have “abundant cause for gratitude and encouragement in the extension and depth of the work of religion among the Native Feejeeans.” A brother of the King has renounced heathenism, and opened his house for meetings for prayer.

The Christian natives highly prize such portions of the Holy Scriptures as they possess. “One of the young men,” write the Missionaries, “to whom we gave a copy of the New Testament, pressed the blessed treasure to his heart, and literally danced for joy.”

The Mission in *Feejee* is evidently full of encouragement. Enough has been done to show that, were adequate means employed, Christianity would destroy the reign of idolatry throughout the entire group. May God hasten the day.



## SOUTHERN AFRICA.

The *Cape Town* Circuit has been favoured with a very gracious outpouring of the Holy Spirit, resulting in the conversion of very many, and their union with the Church of God. The three Sunday Schools containing nearly Five Hundred Scholars, shared in the gracious influence vouchsafed to the Societies and Congregations. "It is no unusual thing in the prayer-meetings, to see many of the teachers and children melted into tears, earnestly imploring the pardoning mercy of God. Such moving scenes cannot soon be forgotten. We have the satisfaction of seeing a goodly number of our young people becoming, as we trust, 'established, strengthened, and settled' in the faith."

In the *Graham's Town* Circuit, the past has been a year of great prosperity. The *English* Congregation is large and continues to increase. The public ordinances of religion, and the more private meetings for Christian fellowship and prayer, are attended with a gracious influence.

Before the breaking out of the Kafir war a very encouraging state of things prevailed in the *Albany* and *Kaffraria* District. Intelligence received up to a recent time communicates the gratifying information that, though the Kafir war had extended along the boundaries of the colony, our Missionaries and their families, the people of their charge, and the stations on which they are labouring had hitherto remained uninjured. One only of the stations, Fort Beaufort, had been the actual scene of war; and here, the Missionary had nobly remained at the post of duty; while of the rest, each had furnished a band of Kaffirs and Flingoes, for the defence of the colony, "whose conduct had called forth the public commendation of the Governor, Sir Harry Smith."—While cherishing gratitude to Almighty God for the display of his special and protecting goodness extended towards his servants, the Committee earnestly commend these faithful men and their flocks thus exposed to peril, to the prayers and sympathies of all the friends of Christian Missions.

In the *D'Urban* Circuit the number of church members has more than doubled.

## WESTERN AFRICA.

There has been a net increase during the year of Four Hundred and Fifty Church-members at *Sierra Leone*, with a similar number now remaining on trial for membership. On the 12th of February last, the foundation stone of a large and handsome place of worship, to be called "*Buxton Chapel*," was laid, at New Town West, by the Chief Justice of the Colony, the Hon. John Carr. The occasion was one of deep interest, which was evinced by the unusually liberal character of the contributions, exceeding in amount any sum ever collected on a similar occasion in *Sierra Leone*.

Progress is made in the Education Department. The class of teachers now employed are superior to any we have before had in the service of the Mission. The Native Training Institution at *King Tom's Point*, continues to answer very satisfactorily, the end for which it was established.

At *McCarthy's Island* Mr. May has been assiduous in his endeavours, and a corresponding measure of success has been his reward. He reports that although many of the members are poor, yet they are diligent in business, and fervent in spirit serving the Lord. Many who had been unconcerned about religion, and had not been in a place of worship for years, are now found regularly worshipping in the House of God, and receiving instruction in the Sabbath Schools.

"In the *Gold Coast* and *Ashanti* District," writes one of the Missionaries, "God is at work in our behalf. We see it in the new and encouraging spheres of usefulness opening before us; in the increasing moral influence which this

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Mission is diffusing in every direction; in the large and attentive congregations which listen to our ministry; in the prosperous state of our Schools; in the earnest prayers of our Church-members for a larger outpouring of the Holy Spirit; in the giving way of Fetish prejudices and customs; and we feel it, too, in our own hearts, in that burning love for the souls of our perishing fellow-men which only God can inspire and sustain."

At *Domonasi* the public Religious Services, and the Class-Meetings, are well attended, "and there is that gradual breaking down of heathen prejudices which affords strong ground of hope for an extensive abandonment of the superstitions of Paganism." This Circuit has never exhibited so pleasing an aspect as at present; and there is every reason to hope that the word of God will mightily prevail among the Tens of Thousands of Natives in the interior of the *Fanti* Country."

#### WEST INDIES.

The Society's Missions in the British West Indies continue to feel the injurious consequences of the altered temporal circumstances of these Islands.—The poverty and increased worldly cares of many, have induced negligence as to their spiritual interests, while the efficiency of the Missions have been cramped by diminished resources.

In several Districts there is, however, much that is encouraging. In many places there is a gracious work in progress, and the efficacy of the Gospel Ministry in the conversion of sinners from the error of their ways is delightfully apparent.

Respecting *Morant-Bay*, in the Jamaica District, Mr. Fraser remarks—"God has a people in this Circuit, whom he has taken out of the Gentiles for his Name. Their light, indeed, is feeble; their power small. But we recollect that they received the word in affliction, and we have seen them hold to it in prosperity. We therefore give them credit for some sincerity. Many changes have passed over this people. Captivity was theirs, and glad release has been theirs; and now again they are suffering in the common lot of their country, which has fallen into poverty. Yet are they a people still held together in the ties of Christian fellowship, attending the word and ordinances of Christ, and contributing to the support of his cause.

At *Hayti* the brethren can rejoice that their harmonious labours are crowned with God's blessing, so that in all parts of the District they have been favoured with success, whilst God is raising up promising Natives, who are recommended by the Missionaries as suitable candidates for the work of the Ministry.

#### BRITISH NORTH AMERICA.

The state of the Missions in the various Districts of *British North America* is of a very gratifying character. The field of labour is extensive. The number of Missionaries and Assistant Missionaries amounts to one hundred and thirteen. With these pastors and teachers of the Word, there are associated forty-two Catechists and salaried Instructors, exclusive of one thousand eight hundred and seventy unpaid agents. The success with which these efforts for the benefit of the Indians and Colonists have been crowned may be read in the cheering facts that 21,427 persons are united in religious fellowship—that the aggregate number of regular hearers of the Word is not less than one hundred and five thousand, many of whom reside in remote settlements, visited by no other preachers of the Word of Life than the Missionaries of this Society,—and that the Day and Sunday-schools are attended by no fewer than

thirteen thousand children of both sexes, who are instructed in these seminaries, in the way of truth and righteousness. The most interesting department of this service is that in which are included the aboriginal tribes belonging to Canada West and the territories of the Hudson's Bay Company, because there is to be found that class of our fellow creatures which has the strongest claims upon our Christian sympathies, as well as our Christian exertions; and who present, in the new and happy condition into which the Gospel has instrumentally introduced them, clear and resistless evidence of the fitness, power, and utility of the Missionary enterprise.

The Missions in Western Canada are divided into two classes—Domestic, embracing the New-Settlements; and Indian, established for the benefit of the Aboriginal Tribes. The Domestic Missions are Twenty-seven in number, covering a wide field. The Indian work is calculated to excite great interest among the friends of Missions. The Committee are deeply impressed with the desirableness and utility of gathering these tribes of our red brethren together in larger communities, as being productive both of their secular and spiritual welfare. The Society has Twelve Indian Stations; Thirteen Missionaries; Twelve Interpreters; Twelve Day-Schools, Twelve Day-School Teachers; and Thirty Local Preachers.

At the *Muncey* Mission, during the past year, a few conversions have taken place from the Pagan ranks, and several backsliders have been reclaimed.—Five Prayer-Meetings have been established amongst the Ojebways, during each week, which are well attended. The Munceys and Oneidas have each Two Weekly Prayer-Meetings. The Members find Class-Meetings very profitable, and attend them regularly when at home. These Meetings are admirably suited to the Indian Converts.

In the EASTERN CANADA, NOVA SCOTIA, NEW BRUNSWICK, and NEW-FOUNDLAND DISTRICTS, some of which rank among the oldest portions of the field occupied by the Society, much spiritual fruit has been secured by the blessing of God on the labours of his servants. Our fathers laboured in their Master's work with zeal and self-denial befitting their office and character; and we who have entered into their labours, have not been left without frequent and abundant tokens of the Divine presence and blessing. Much of the religious knowledge and influence possessed by the people in many portions of these Districts, may be ascribed, under the blessing of God, to the Agents of this Society. Many inviting openings could be entered in these Provinces, with immediate prospect of success, had we the means available for their supply. "The fields are white already to the harvest;" may we not confidently hope and believe that the Great Master will dispose His people to give liberally of the means required, and that He will "thrust out labourers into His harvest."

#### CONCLUSION.

The position now occupied by the Wesleyan Missionary Society, it is evident from the preceding survey, is a subject which demands the most thoughtful and prayerful consideration of all its friends and supporters. The Society does not appear employed in an extensive preparation for some novel and arduous enterprise. It is theirs rather to point to an already-occupied sphere of effort, which not merely brightens with the promise of hope, but stimulates to persevering effort by the encouragement of a large amount of realized success. It would be desirable to enter other openings for usefulness among

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heathen people which the Society's Agents have not yet approached, but to support prosperous existing Missions until they may be able to sustain themselves and extend and perpetuate Christianity in the countries where they have been respectively founded, is obviously the first care of a Missionary Society; and any plans which it may contemplate for the enlargement of its sphere of operations should be considered with due regard to the obligations which it has already incurred. Opportunity ought to be taken of the present favourable crisis in the affairs of our South African Missions to strengthen those Missions, and thus enable the Society to secure the vantage ground which it has won. The glorious openings in Western Africa, and in countries leading into the central regions of that vast Continent, cannot be neglected without criminality. The extraordinary work of Christianity and civilization in recently savage and cannibal New Zealand, must not at this interesting juncture be left without adequate support. The importunate cry from dark and sanguinary Fecjee, where a noble band of self-denying Missionaries are sinking beneath the burden and heat of the day, and dropping into a premature grave, cannot be disregarded. The peculiar and touching appeal of the West Indian Missions in this the season of their deep suffering, surely will not be made in vain. And what can the Society advance as its justification, if it do not greatly strengthen its Missions in Ceylon and India, and take its proportionate share of the work of imparting Christianity to the Two Hundred Millions of Idolaters in that still-extending portion of the British Empire, all accessible to Missionary effort? The Society's path of duty, at present, appears too obvious to admit of mistake. Strenuous and persevering exertions to augment the Annual Income are required, that the remaining debt may be liquidated, and the existing Missions be strengthened. Then will the way be clear to enter upon new and inviting fields; and the Society will advance with unfaltering step, sustained by the conviction that it is following the guidance of that gracious providence which has hitherto directed its onward course, and honoured its practical responses to the calls of duty, with the encouraging sanction ever indicated by ultimate success.
