Montreal, 8th October, 1878.

EDITORIAL ADVOCATE:—Having returned from the West only a few days ago I was anxious to ascertain if public sentiment in Montreal had changed materially, since the result of the election in Northumberland regarding the status of your late representative the Hon. Peter Mitchell. Being aware of the high estimation in which he had always been held, both socially and politically, he having been solicited by many friends here, to stand for Montreal west at the beginning of the campaign—and knowing also the strenuous efforts made by the *Advance* newspaper of your County to carry and under-rate Mr. Mitchell, I determined to feel the public pulse carefully, and satisfy myself as to the condition of the body political.

After making all due allowance for the effect of the venomous attacks made upon Mr. M. by the organ of Mr. Snowball—leaving at the same time a wide margin for the spleen exhibited by literary adventurers of the D. G. Smith type—coupling this with the able and logical composition given to the Mackenzie Gov't. by Mr. Mitchell, and bearing in mind that Mr. M. was now a defeated Candidate, I must say that I was not prepared for the demonstrations of regret displayed by the people of Montreal at the misfortune of his reverse.

It may have served a purpose in the political exigencies of Mr. Snowball in Northumberland and to have a creature in his employ who could wield a facile pen to malign, mis-represent and abuse a statesman of Mr. Mitchell's known ability and genius, but to the credit of my native city I assert that Montreal knew the man too well to believe the slanders and calumnies, and had too much reason to be true to the credit of the services of the Hon. Peter Mitchell as head of the Marine Department, to glory in his defeat. A few days before his arrival from the scene of his late contest, I took considerable interest in noting the genuine expressions of regret and disappointment indulged in by all classes, but on his arrival I was overjoyed to witness the hearty welcome, the sympathetic demonstrations and the hope for his ultimate success which were extended to him by friends and acquaintances on both sides of the water, his reception must have been quite an ordeal to pass through, and must have touched him deeply as being a gratification and disinterested display of their regard for him under unusual and trying circumstances.

A young gentleman from Mr. Mitchell's constituency was with him upon the first day of his return, and he was one of his supporters as I presume he was from the fact of his being introduced by Mr. M. he must have been gratified at the return, and the nature of Mr. Mitchell's reception; Judges of the Supreme and County Courts, Editors, Merchants, Ship-owners, down to the carmen and the market, all were with each other in doing honor to the statesman who, by his intellect, ability, and brilliant record in the public history of Canada has shown himself to be worthy of such distinction; and to the people of Northumberland let me say that the general opinion is that a burning disgrace attaches to the fair record of your County for rejecting a tried and acknowledged worthy representative for one without any public record to commend him, who by his foolish support of an unjust and most corrupt administration has placed your County again in opposition, and who by his want of the forecast to judge of the signs of the times has shown himself unworthy to be the lowest political rating.

While writing this letter I have just heard that a protest is about being made against Mr. Mitchell. So with one word of advice to Northumberland I will close; Mr. Mitchell is the only one to whom you can turn for any favour or fair play for Northumberland as long as the Mackenzie Ministry remains in power, and this, whether in the House or out of it. So in event of another contest your life is plainly to elect Mr. Mitchell, and if you do not land cannot afford to have its member in opposition. So "go sin no more."

The Farmer's Corner.

A Model Farm.

Why should farming not be scientific? Because the manufacturer labors in a scientific way his profits are greater and surer than those of the agriculturist who has neither machinery nor system; but it is the unreasonable custom of many to sneer at all innovations, and to look at all methods variations upon old usages as the fanciful and unprofitable schemes of visionaries with more money than common sense. It is the people who sneer that are usually most deficient in the latter quality, however; and had they a little more of it they might perceive that careful book-keeping and the adoption of improved methods and implements are as necessary in farming as in any other business.

In a side hollow of that hill from which Litchfield first becomes visible to us several very distinct echoes can be obtained, and this responsiveness of the "purple glen" gave a name to the farm. It is Echo Farm—a pretty and poetically suggestive name, indeed, which conjures up visions of loveliness, and sets one to dreaming of intertwining vines knitting their plant tendrils and sweet-scented leaves through the hospitable porch and open lattice; the garrulous brook that never tires of its own monody; the reverberant hills that appease life's turmoil with their easy undulations; lofty barns mossy with age; and grassy hollows. But, alas! dear reader, model farming is not idyllic or Arcadian; it is indefatigable; it keeps all its buildings in a perfect state of repair; it subordinates the picturesque, if it ever recognizes it; it produces the old mill because that venerable relic of the old mill is the best of the field. Nothing is wasted, nothing done by guessing, and nothing passes uncorded. The implements are of the latest or most approved model. Three sets of "horse" hay-forks are in use, by which hay is unloaded at the rate of a ton in four minutes, including the time of the carriage of the hay 150 feet. The other machines also embody some novel labor-saving principles. No manure or fertilizers are found necessary, except the 1000 loads made upon the farm, and a sort of muck, of which there are several beds.

The history of the farm is interesting. A gentleman of education, intelligence, and wealth came to Litchfield some nine years ago in search of a summer home. He had the most superficial knowledge of farming, and entertained no intention of entering that business. But having purchased six acres, and cleared them, he purchased additional tracts, which became the nucleus of Echo Farm, whose area is now about 400 acres. His interest was enlisted in the raising of choice stock, and beginning with a herd of five, he has gradually increased the number to 100, all the herd being pure Jersey, with authentic and valuable pedigrees. The rocky fields were cleared, laid out, and inclosed by massive stone walls. Old and inadequate buildings on the consolidated land were demolished, and new ones of improved pattern erected. In 1873 a barn 66 feet by 25 was built; an addition, 100 feet by 40, was made, of 191 by 35 feet. These three buildings form three sides of the barn-yard. They are built of pine upon massive granite foundations about two feet wide, which are laid in cement. All the wood-work is painted a soft drab color, even the proprietor's residence, and the telegraph poles that line the roadway. A desire for simplicity and durability in preference to ornamentation or show is visible everywhere; there is no litter, and there are no gaps in the fences or walls, which are from eighteen inches to 24 in thickness, every crevice being filled like a mosaic with a stone that exactly fits it. Care, thrift, and ingenuity have acted like three charms. When the fields were being cleared, such large quantities of stones were gathered that some perplexity arose as to where they should be put. Many hundreds of loads were used in the foundations of the buildings, in the

fences, and in filling ravines, but more remained, and these were deposited upon several sterile hillocks of no value, where masses of swamp grass were laid over them, and it took well, soon transforming the barren heaps to verdant knolls, whose blades are remarkably hardy. It was not so much for the sake of the land gained that the stones were thus disposed of, but it was rather to prevent the formation of nurseries for weeds, shrubs, and brambles, which the heaps would have quickly become.

Two and a half acres are planted with beets, which are the only roots fed to the cattle, the crop averaging 1000 bushels an acre, and more than 2000 tons have been housed a year.
