

of his sons, and was now returning penniless, after suffering much poverty and having to mortgage his farm to pay his way back. There were many who would also return if they only could afford to do so.

WINDSOR, Ont., Aug. 18.—A number of fishermen were in Windsor today having affidavits prepared respecting the United States fish companies doing business in Canada. They claim that fish caught by United States companies with their own nets and boats, and allowed free entry into the United States, and affidavits which were forwarded to the department at Washington to verify the fact that these companies take a full of the fish and goods owned by their employees and thereby evade the duty. They claim that fishermen who work on their own account as well as the small dealers, must pay duty on their fish and are thereby placed at a disadvantage. A statement of the case is being prepared and a request is made that the Government investigate into it.

Toronto, Ks., Aug. 17.—Telegram received here from Goodland show the hailstorm which visited that place Monday afternoon was the most destructive in the history of the state, and that the scope of country covered. The area of the storm was three miles square, and the town of Goodland was the centre. The hailstones averaged the size of baseballs, many of them weighing two pounds. Twenty-five buildings were badly damaged, many wood and a few tin roofs being entirely ruined. The monster hail stones were through corncries, the centre of many buildings were ruined, much board being torn into splinters. Several hundred feet of sidewalk was broken into splinters. The Rock Island railroad suffered heavy loss. Twelve hundred roof lights in the shops were killed. Reports state that the damage in the country was heavy, many houses and cattle having been killed. One farmer lost a dozen fine steers that were caught in the field and beaten to death. A man named Wood and two boys were caught in the field and frightfully mangled by the hail stones. All three are in a serious condition and will probably die. In many places the hail lay on the ground to a depth of 10 inches.
