

WATER FOR HORSES.

One of the greatest difficulties we

have to con end with is when horses are on a journey and lave to be put

into strange stables. Your average nostier will never water a horse while het, and consequently the animal gets corn first, and water after ward. This is a very likely way to cause indigestion and colic. The best way to meet this difficulty is to water before getting in, and while the horse has still a mile or two to go.
