Ottawa, August 31, 05 - The conditons are practic lly unchanged since the uly report. The weather has been on the whole most favorable. A few windstorms have been reported, but the effects have been local and not in the arge commercial orchards Insects are slightly more numerous than last year. specially the Dodlin moth and San lose Scale: fungous diseases have not developed abnormally during the

The feature of the month is the apple. The crop is nov so far advinced that a fair estimate can be made of the crop, the most serious disturbing factor being the usual September windstorms which have yet to be reckoned with. The southern Ontario '(Lake Erie) District will give a very light crop of winter apples. Three-fourths of the orchards have reported a total failure in

he Lake Huron Districts and cenat counties east to York will give a light to a medium crop with very many more than enough for local use, Some fall apples will be available for shipping

The Lake Ontario District will show medium crop of good fruit, Ben Day s Russets and Spys showing in a few cases a full crop. The early and fall apples are relatively a better crop than

The St Lawrence and Ottawa valleys Montreal Island and eastern Townships will yield a medium crop of Fameuse, Alexanders and Wealthys, with a very

light crop of winter fruit. The Nova Scotia crop will be light and somewhat scattered Kings, Russets and Ben Davis are yielding better eveu than the Sellflower and Graven-

Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick both report a Hight crop, and the latter will import winter British Columbia will be the only Province giving a medium to full crop. There is some complaint fungous diseases in certain parts of the Province, but in the main the apples will be bright and clean; the aggregate, however, is too small to

have any effect on the markets. The Dominion, as a whole, will produce about one-third as many apples as last year, but the fruit will be freet from scab but somewhat more infected with Codlin moth. There is also a general consensus of opinion that the present favourable weather conditions and light crop will cause the apples now on the trees to fill out much better than usual. It is also certain that much fruit that would be wasted in years of plenty will this year find its way to the market so that the final result in barrels will be larger than present indications might otherwise justify.

PEARS With the exception of British Columbia, all districts show a light pear crop. No full crops are reported ex-cept in Keiffers—Bartletts and Clapps are better than later varieties.

PLUMS. Plums are reported a medium crop in the Niagara and Georgian Bay districts, with much uncertainty account of rot and scurculio. British Columbia is harvesting a very full crop of plums which with a larger acreage would seriously effect \ the market. The Japans have been a good crop everywhere. PEACHES

#### SEVERE EARTHQUAKE.

Catanzaro, Calabria, Italy. Sept. -A violent earthquake at 3.55 o'clock this morning caused serious loss of life and widespread destruction in Martiran were almost entirely destroyed. At Monteleone di Calabria seven persons were killed outright and many were injured by the collapse of the prison. The Pizzo district is said to be almost entirely destroyed. The walls of the hospital collapsed, injuring

some of the patients. All the houses at Ste Faconi have been wrecked by the earthquake. It is feared that a hundred persons are buried in the ruins. The villages of Piscopio have been destroyed. It was hoped that the district of Nicastro had escaped, but that also has

been seriously affected. -At Martirano all the buildings collapsed, including the barracks of the gendarmes. Six hundred men have thus far been taken from the ruins.

There are other victims. At Ste Faconi, all the houses have fallen and it is feared that a hundred people are under the ruins. The village of Piscopiow, and Triparn are also destroyed.


