Gladstone on British Rule in India.

London, Jan. 14.—Herbert Gladstone de-livered a lecture on India at Hawarden yesterday, and Mr. Gladstone, in seconding a vote of thanks to the lecturer, dwelt upon a vote of thanks to the lecturer, dwelf upon the heavy responsibility Englishmen in-curred for the happiness of between 200,-000,000 and 300,000,000 of the people of India. He rejoiced to think it is now im-possible to hold India by the sword alone. "We are unable," he said, "to dispense with the military power, but we depend upon it only as it aids the constant exten-sion of enlightened principles of governs ment. Could they hope to make the Indian Government permanent and the people happy Government permanent and the people happy under it?" He believed the mass of the people acquiesced in British domination, and it is unquestionable that no portion of them would desire to dislodge the British in order to bring in some other power. Enormous as was the field for enterprise and wealth, it pened a field yet more remarkable for examples of courage, virtue and the development and application of Christian precepts.

Cabinet. There is a movement for the formation of a patriotic league to put into operation an international "boycott" against English commerce. Especial demonstrations of good will were made at the Spanish, French and Austrian embassies. The papers generally give the highest praise to the support received from France, Spain and Austria.

ber of Peers yesterday made a full statement of the recent negotiations with England. He expressed regret that he had been unable to consult the Cortes in consequence of the rapid and sudden development of events. He declared he had always sought to maintain an agreeable understanding with England, and hoped the divergent views of the two countries might yet be reconciled. He had done all that I ay in his power to maintain the dignity of Portugal without compromising its interests. Senhor Gomes has personally expressed to the British Minister his regret at the insults offered to him. The Government officially assured the Minister that the escutcheon would be replaced, all damage repaired, and all persons concerned in the outrage punished.

It was about 30 feet high and brought down a portion of the wall with it. Signs were blown down in all directions, some plate glass windows were blown in and one barn in the city was unrored.

THE WORST FOR MANY YEARS.

GODERICH, Jan. 14.—A severe wind storm struck this town this morning. The velocity of the wind was about 75 miles per hour. It unroofed several old buildings and leveled fences in exposed places. A new G. T. R. freight car, standing at the station, was unroofed and the roof carried over the bank. The wires are badly used up.

A TARIN RLOWN FROM THE TRACK.

MONTREAL, Jan. 14.—A heavy gale of wind struck the city yesterday morning, and appears to have been general throughout this part of the Province. Word was received at the Grand Trunk general office that the local train from Actonvale for Montreal had been blown off the track by a gale of wind near St. Hilaire. The accident took place while the train was passing the curve a couple of miles south of St. Hilaire station. The first-class car and the engine remained partly on the track, but the baggage car, second-class car and smoking car were rolled over into the ditch. Several of the passengers sustained minor injuries, and three were seriously injured and had to be removed to a farm house. The conductor, trainmen and mail clerk were also injured. The wind threw the rear cars completely on their sides, and the baggage car as it fell wrenched the tender over. It in turn threw the engine over the track, and the shock and wind together threw the weighty mass over on its side. Some of the over-turned cars caught fire and were consumed.

The Bark British Monarch Blown to Atoms-Part of the Crew Rescued,

New Bedford, Mass., Jan. 14.—A letter received in this city from Capt. Howland, of the whaling bark Canton, dated at sea, Dec. 5, gives an account of the loss by fire of the bark British Monarch, 1,262 tons, Liverpool, bound from Hamburg to Sydney with a general cargo. Capt. Howland says: 41 am on my wav to Cape Town. Cape of

Liverpool, bound from Hamburg to Sydney with a general cargo. Capt. Howland says: "I am on my way to Cape Town, Cape of Good Hope, with part of the crew of the bark British Monarch. On Nov. 29, at 1 p.m., the crew discovered the ship was on fire, and they immediately tried to get at ten tons of dynamite which was near the fire, intending to throw it overboard. Could not get at the dynamite on account of smoke. The boats put off from the ship about 4 p.m., intending to remain about till the next morning, but at 1 a.m. the fire reached the dynamite and exploded it with terrible force, so that next morning nothing of the huge iron vessel was visible except a few pieces of spars and the decks. The second mate's boat got separated from the rest and nothing was seen of them atterwards. The two boats contained the captain, Wm. Morrow, First Officer David Welsh and fourteen others." The saved men say the explosion was terrible, and the Canton's officers, although the bark was 130 miles distant ton the night of the explosion, saw it and thought it was a falling meteor. The British Monarch was owned by Messrs, Henry Terence & Sons, Liverpool, England.

Successful Poultry-Raising. Charles Lyman, a successful raiser of poultry, writes as follows in the Poultry Book:

Book:

In raising poultry or stock of any kind it should be the aim of everyone to keep it healthy and improve it. You can do it very easily by adopting some systematic rules. These may be summed up in brief as follows:

1. Construct your house good and warm, so as to avoid damp floors and afford a flood of sunlight. Sunshine is better than

medicine.

2. Provide a dusting and scratching place, where you can bury wheat and corn, and thus induce the fowls to take the need ful exercise.

3. Provide yourself with some good, healthy chickens, none to be over 3 or 4 years old, giving one cock to every twelve hens. 4. Give plenty of fresh air at all times,

4. Give plenty of fresh air at all times, principally in summer.
5. Give plenty of fresh water daily, and never allow the fowls to gothirsty.
6. Feed them systematically two or three times a day; scatter the food so they can't eat too fast or without proper exercise. Do not feed more than they will eat up clean, or they will get tired of that kind of food.
7. Give them a variety of both dry and cooked food; a mixture of cooked meat and vegetables is an excellent thing for their morning's meal.

norning's meal.

8. Give soft food in the morning and the whole grain at night, except a little wheat or cracked corn placed in the scratch-ing places to give them exercise during the

9. Above all things, keep the house clean 9. Above all things, keep the nouse clean and well ventilated.
10. Do not crowd too many in one houses if you do, look out for disease.
11. Use carbolic powder occasionally in the dusting bins to destroy lice.
12. Wash your roosts and bottoms of laying nests, and whitewash once a week in summer and once a month in winter.

ing nests, and whitewash once a week in summer and once a month in winter.

13. Let the old and young have as large a range as possible—the larger the better.

14. Don't breed too many kinds of fowls the came time.

14. Don't breed too many kinds of fowls at the same time, unless you are going into the business. Three or four will give you your hands full.

15. Introduce some new blood into your track. stock every year or so, by either buying a cockerel or a sitting of eggs from some reliable breeder.

reliable breeder.

15. In buying birds or eggs go to some reliable breeder who has his reputation at stake. You may have to pay a little more for birds, but you can depend upon what you get. Culls are not cheap at any price.

17. Save the best birds for next year's breeding and send the others to market. In shipping fancy poultry to market send it dressed.





If it be objected that such information would give publicity to the circumstances of individuals and thereby injure them in business or any other way, we would say that the value of a statement of the kind we have indicated does not in any sense depend on knowing the individuals concerned. A simple state ment by classes would serve the whole purpose, giving the number of each class and the amounts under each head. In the case of banks with branch offices, a published return for each office would be valuable as serving to some extent to show the local conditions, and the classification might further distinguish between residents of the Province, or other Provinces in the Dominion, and of foreign countries. In a score of ways returns of the kind here outlined, made to the Governments of the Provinces and the Dominion and promptly published in condensed form would be found useful; and not the least of their uses would be the guidance they might afford to Governments and Legislatures in dealing with subjects of an economic character.

CIVIC ASSESSMENT REFORM. Toronto Council has resolved to print the assessment roll of the city in one of the local papers, at a cost of \$4,000. This is quite a sum of money, but it must be remembered that it is a small amount compared with the good which will be done by the thorough revision of the assessment in which such publicity will certainly result. Assessors are not infallible, and we all know that under our system honest and capable men may easily be imposed upon by those anxious to conceal their incomes or the value of their personal property. It is the duty of every citizen to aid the assessors in reaching correct conclusions, and though the mistakes of the past cannot be remedied in the list now in existence, much may be done to secure equality of taxation in next assessment if every citizen takes the trouble, as he can readily do, to scan the assessments with which he is familiar. The published lists will enable him to do so, though in the case of a big city, it is a mistake to print any more than one ward at a The full list is apt to prove too time. bulky for ordinary mortals.

Assessments would be very much simpli-

fied if all taxes on incomes and on personal property in manufactories, wholesale warehouses and stores were abolished. At present, the voluntarily honest man alone need pay assessment on his full income un-less it is possible for the assessors to go to his employers and find it out for themselves. If he is his own employer, he can, and often no doubt does, much under-state his income. It is the same with the personal tax. How much better would it e if all these taxes were thrown off, and the revenue of the city raised on real estate alone. By collecting the taxes in such a way, it could not be laid to the charge of the assessment law that it imposed taxes to cripple industry, and discourage the employment of labor. Whatever else is done, all machinery shou'd be left untaxed, on the ground that taxation tends to make the article taxed scarce, and scarcity means less employment for labor, and as matter of course every citizen is affected prejudicially by the system. I believe that if they were obliged to masticate their corn more thoroughly there would be no such trouble. Corn ensitage is eaten too greedily to be properly masticated, and I have adopted the practice of feeding it whole. The ears are left upon the stalks, which are packed in the silo without outting. The ensitage proves sweet and every kernel of corn is seemingly thoroughly digested. I have found ears of ensilaged sweet corn almost as perfect in March as when first put in the silo. There is a great difference in the cost of packing out and uncut ensilage, and it doesn't take one man more than twenty minutes longer twice a day to feed 75 cows with whole ensilage than with cut feed. To balance this loss I save the time of two extra men in the silo at the time of packing, and a complement of men and teams to keep the machine in motion. For northern latitudes the Southern Dent corn, which requires a long season to mature, is not best either for fodder or enmature, is not best either for fodder or ensilage.
