An Interesting Debate on Mr. Tarte's Resolution,

Which is Fully Indorsed by D'Alton McCarthy.

Government Charged With Restoring the "Star Chamber."

"A Plaintiff Sitting as a Judge Trying His Own Case."

Costigan Comes in for a Sever Overhauling-Government Supporters Make a Lame

[Specially reported for the ADVERTISER by our editorial representative at the Capital.] OTTAWA, March 7.—The Manitoba school question again occupied the attention of

the House to-day to the exclusion of everything else. The dav's debate was marked by an able argument by Mr. D'Alton Mc-Carthy condemning the course of the Government and indorsing every word of Mr. Tarte's resolution. Messrs. Langevin, Curran, Devlin, Costigan, Beausoleil and Craig took part in the debate. Mr. Amyot moved the adjournment which was carried.

"This House desires to express its dissatisfaction at the action of the Government in dealing with the Manitoba school question and in assuming to be possessed of judicial functions conflicting with their duty as constitutional advisers of the crown, which assumption is wholly unknown to the law and if now acquiesced in would be entirely subversive of the principle of Ministerial responsibility."

Mr. McCarthy resumed the debate on Mi. Tarte's resolution given above. He reminded the House that the educational clauses of the British North America Act were somewhat altered when being trans ferred to the Manitoba Act of Union. The ferred to the Manitoba Act of Union. The period for the disallowance of the school acts in question expired in April, 1891. The power of disallowance was not exercised and no actin was taken on the petitions against the acts by the Cabinet until March, 1891. The Barrett litigation against the acts was not only not promoted by Barrett, but was actually incited and carried through by the Dominion Government. This lact was important. It would not naturally inspire confidence in the Manitoba Government in the judicial character of the Dominion Cabinet in this appeal to the Governor-General in council if it had a judicial character. He found the Governor-General in council if it had a judicial character. He found no great fault with the report of the Minister of Justice in declining to vero the act, except that there was an implied promise in it that, failing a legal remedy for the minority in the courts, the Federal power would afford protection and redress. He referred to the terms of Sir John Macdonald's report on the New Brunswick School Act, as showing that it was for the minority to appeal the New Brunswick School Act, as showing that it was for the minority to appeal to the Provincial Legislature, which had the sole power of redress. Mr. McCarthy proceeded to show, by documentary evidence, that Barrett was a nominal plaintiff in the suit to upset the Manitoba School Acts—the mere nominee of the Dominion Government—and all the bills of costs in the matter were sent in to and paid by the Dominion Government. They paid Hon. S. H. Blake \$600 as counsel for Barrett before the judicial committee in England

the judicial committee in England. Coming down to a later date, Mr. Mc-Carthy pointed out that the pending proceedings at Ottawa were designed to destroy the legislation of Manitoba in question. He asked the House to bear this in mind. It seemed strange to him that although the First Minister held out in 1891 hopes of redress, the Government did not know for certain that they had any power. (Hear, hear.) This must be disappointing to those who received private pledges. In his opinion private pledges were given. He did not find fault with admitting the right of appeal to the Governor-General in council, but what enabled him to concur in the first part of the resolution was his opinion that the Government ought to have refused to entertain the appeal on the ground that the exclusive right of the Province to pass the legislation in question having been settled by the ludgment of the English Privy Council, it was unwise to prolong the agitation. Mr. McCarthy denounced as unseemly he course of the Ministry in assailing in he courts the constitutionality of a Pro-incial act. They had enough to do to deend the constitutionality of the acts of the Dominion Parliament. "Sir," exclaimed Mr. McCarthy, "they propose to restore the star chamber in Canada. The star chamber was a body Canada. The star chamber was a body which arrogated to itself judicial functions. The case came before the whole Privy Council with Mr. Ives presiding and the Attorney-General acting as an accessory. (Laughter.) It was described by the chief Government organ as 'an historic scene.''! He read from Dicey to show the functions assumed and discharged by the old council, or Star Chamber, abolished by the Long Parliament shortly before the time of Cromwell. If the present Dominion Privy Council had judicial functions they ought to be prohibited from exercising them. He asked the House to picture a Cabinet which asked the House to picture a Cabinet which stirred up the legal proceedings to upset the Manitoba school legislation, and were defeated in the highest court in the empire now sitting in a judicial capacity as a court of appeal on the same issue. The Cabinet could hardly be said to be fit to try the case. McCarthy and Tarte were sailing in one boat, but under two flags. He argued that if they legislated now on this subject in excess of their authority, and the courts upset the Federal Act, they would be in a humiliating position. In conclusion Mr. Curran pitched into Mr. Mercier for pleading for the life of Riel.

Mr. Devlin followed. He retorted on the Solicitor-General's closing words by saying that Mr. Curran, whom he described saying that Air. Mr. Tarte had joined hands with Mr. McCarthy, he said, and each dressed up the resolution as they would a skeleton to suit the divergent views of divergent parties in this House. Mr. skeiston to suit the divergent views of divergent parties in this House. Mr. Tarte had played second fiddle to Mr. McCarthy. Mr. Costigan warmly resented Mr. Devlin's aspersions on his conduct, and spont a great deal of time over his personal course and his attitude on the New Brunswick school question.

Mr. Beausoleil denied that there was any collusion between Mr. Tarte and Mr. McCarthy in the framing of the resolution under discussion. He delivered a long and actarty in the framing of the resolution speech in French, giving a full history of the whole case. Mr. Craig, of East Durham (Conservative), said that if the tamendment had been moved by Mr. McCarthy and supported by his speech of total day he might have hesitated about opposing it, but as Mr. Tarte's object was to embarrass the Government he intended to vote against it. The Government had declined to disallow the School Act, and he approved of that. He did not understand the alleged violation of Ministerial responsibility set forth in the resolution because of the assumption by the Cabinet of judicial tunctions. He was not afraid of a reference at this stage to the Supreme Court. He did not think the Government could evade Ministerial responsibility. He believed in national schools—purely secular schools. He¹ indorsed a recent utterance of the legate of the Pope on this subject. Mr. Amyot moved the adjournment of the debate, which will be continued to-morrow as a special order.

Notes.

The Government to-day submitted to Parliament the formal report of the delegates who visited Washington last year to negotiate a treaty of reciprocity with the United States Government. The report is substantially a repetition of the account of the proceedings given to Parliament by the Finance Minister last year. Notwith standing statements to the contrary made by Secretary Blaine and Mr. Foster U. S. Secretary of State, whose reports are independently by the British Minister at Washington, the report declares that Mr. Blaine refused consideration of any proposition short of complete free trade between Canada and the United States, with a like customs tariff for the two countries against the rest of the world, and especially against Great Britain. They report that Mr. Blaine said: "We should expect to have Canadians to compete with in manufacturing, but no one else; and that," he added, "we experienced the peculiar difficulty a short time ago of negotiating a treaty with a country which has a foreign arm extended over her." Mr. Blaine is also credited with stating that smuggling could only be prevented by making the tariff uniform for both countries and equalizing the Canadian tariff to that of the United States. The Canadian delegates stated that they were unable to consider the proposal to grant free fishing privileges in Canadian waters in return for the free admission of Canadian fish into the United States markets.

It was, he said, without question the best offer before them, and then it was not in the interests of the citizens of London that there should be two telephone services here at the present time. In the four years that the Automatic Telephone Company have been in existence they had not placed a single telephone service in Ontario. Then if there were two services and the Boll Company controlled the trunk lines they might raise the trunk rates. Referring to the petition against granting the exclusive rights, he said that of the 180 signatures on the petition 78 of them were either duplicate or counterfeits. When it was understood that 700 of the Bell Company's 800 subscribers would not sign the petition it was clear that they were getting efficient service.

Mr. Hellmuth spoke for the Automatic Telephone Company. They did not admit for one moment the right or power of the council to grant a monopoly. They could not do so under the statutes and if necessary they would test the matter in the courts. This was a decided age of electrical advancement and the Scientific American approved of the automatic system. Everyone knew that there were many defects in the Bell Telephone Company's service, and yet they were wanting exclusive rights. The Automatic Company offered to pay quarterly to the corporation of the city of London 5 per cent. of the gross receipts, and promised not to charge a higher rate than that charged by the Bell Telephone Company. They guaranteed to pay a percentage on 200 telephones the first year, with a gradual increase up to 450 the fifth year. That meant a revenue to the city of only \$500 less than they would receive from the Bell Company, and no monopoly was asked for. The system that gave the best service would survive and the other would sink, and if the automatic company would be thrown out after a brief trial, why were the Bell Company so anxious to oppose them?

Mr. Judd addressed the council in favor

Mr. Judd addressed the council in favor of the Bell offer. He compared the offers of the two companies. The Bell Company offered a clear thousand dollars. While the automatic company only offered a percentage of receipts and would guarantee 200 telephones the first year. They said nothing about the rate they would charge. Taking the basis of rates charged now by the Bell Company, 5 per cent. on 200 instruments would only amount to \$2,500 in five years, while their offer was \$5,000. In Laporte, Indiana, the automatic system had only been in use twelve weeks and the only other place on the continent where it was used was at Turboun, Quebec, and there were only eighteen or twenty subscribers there.

The motion to adopt the clause relating to this matter was then put.

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HON. EDWARD BLAKE.

His First Appearance in the Imperial Parliament.

Complimented and Congratulated on All Sides.

The ADVERTISER has already given extracts from various British papers speaking in high terms of Mr. Blake's first appearance in the Imperial Parliament. To Canadians cognizant of Mr. Blake's splendid abilities, this success will not be surprising; but it is always pleasant to see one's own estimate confirmed by competent outside authorities, and especially by the most critical legislative body in the world. It is interesting to observe in Macaulay how he lingers over history-making debates in the British Parliament. When the historian comes to picture the home rule epoch of 1893, Edward Blake will take a prominent

"Mr. Chamberlain was followed by Mr. Blake, the eminent Irish-Canadian statesman whose efforts in the great work of establishing federation in the Dominion has procured him a world-wide reputation. He stood at the very place from which Mr. Parnell so often spoke, with Mr. Justin McCarthy and Mr. Sexton at his side. Mr. Blake was heavily weighted. Mr. Chamberlain had but just concluded a most brilliant performance. Mr. Blake had won a great name outside the House of Commons—a House which is jealous of reputations made outside its walls. The great colonial statesman is 67 years of age. Before he uttered a word he glanced through his gold-rimmed spectacles at the treasury bench, and there he saw the Premier, who had during Mr. Chamberlain's oration preserved a demeanor of undisturbed repose, with his hand on his ear and outstretched head eager to catch every word that fell from his lips. Mr. Blake was equal to a situation which would be trying to anyone who had not nerves of steel. The first three sentences sealed the verdict of the House in his favor. He proved himself a perfect master in the study of Mr. Chamberlain's speeches. He absolutely pelted him with fragments of his former utterances. Mr. Chamberlain showed that lack of tact in small things which launches him at times into such grievous tactical errors. bim with fragments oh his former uterances. He conversed first with his son Austen, to whom he gave his quotations to be transferred to the Press, and then he entered into an earnest conversation with his brother-in-law, Mr. Powell Williams, and at last, when Mr. Blake had been handling him for about a quarter of an hour, and, encouraged by the cheers of a densely-crowded House, was warming to his subject, Mr. Chamberlain walked down the gangway with a very easy gait and on to the floor with the intention of crossing the House. Loud and derisive cheers greeted this retreat, whereupon Mr. Chamberlain returned, bowed to the chair, and sat down on the first bench below the gangway, between Sir Charles Dilke and Mr. Lloyd-George, the latter of whom, quite undisturbed by his proximity, continued loudly to cheer Mr. Blake's skillful thrusts. Mr. Blake answered Mr. Chamberlain's arguments in detail with the adroitness of a practiced debator, and it is no secret that a distinguished member of the Cabinet pronounced his speech to be one of the best ever heard within the walls of Parliament. With all the disedvantages of a first appearance in the House of Commens to contend against, weighted by anticipation with a great reputation, Mr. Blake delivered a speech which either from no natorical or a debating point of view could scarcely be excelled by any English statesman on either side of the House. It was the promptness and tremendous power of crushing reply he displayed that especially excited the admiration of the House, and that stamped him at once as a Parliastatesman on either side of the House. Everyone was saying complimentary things of the speech. Sir William Harcourt declared that 'it conclusively answered every point made by Mr. Chamberlain, and was a magnificent effort,' and Mr. Asquith, who is not by any means a gentleman prone to enthusiastic means a gentleman prone to enthusiastic outbursts about anything, said that it 'was one of the finest debating speeches I have ever heard."

The same journal, speaking editorially. says that Mr. Blake's powerful speech placed him at once in the front rank of Parliamentary debaters.

Equally favorable was the impression created by Mr. Blake on the special Parliamentary correspondent of the Dublin Inde pendent (the Parnellite newspaper), who

"Two speeches made to-night by unofficial members will remain as landmarks in this home rule contention. One was a new man, Mr. Blake, who by one effort placed himself among the front rank of English politicians. It was no light effort for the Canadian statesman to follow a debater of the deadly skill of Mr. Chamberlain, and to follow him not alone successfully, but triumphantly, is a feat which, performed by a new man, marks him as one destined to achieve high success in the councils of Parliament. Whatever we trish may have to allege against the men who sit in Westminster, there is one quality we cannot deny them. They know a strong man when they meet him. There was much in Mr. Blake's method and delivery which must have grated on the nerves, if not the feelings of the English House of Commons, which is the privileged home of dullness and impassivity. Mr. Blake on the other hand is distinctly American in his style of oratory, fluent, compendious and clear, but still having at Westminster a distinctly foreign accent in his speech, and a broad note in his argument suggestive of the wide plains of the country to which he owes his political education. There is a character of massiveness about the personality of Mr. Blake which is quite Napoleonic. As he sat among his colleagues one was irresistibly attracted by the massive head and firm jaw, which told that the soul within was of no ordinary caliber. Without knowing who the man was, this distinguished head, among so many heads by no means distinguished, has for days attracted my notice. Only to-night when Mr. Blake rose to reply to Mr. Chamberlain was I aware to whom the distinguished head belonged."



This is the bane of republican institutions and the constant peril of our Government by the people. It degrades to the purposes of wily craft the plan of rule our fathers established. It undermines the self-reliance of our people and substitutes in its place dependence upon Governmental favoritism. It stiffs the spirit of true Americanism and stupelies every ennobling trait of American citizenship.

"Under our scheme of Government the

ship.

"Under our scheme of Government the waste of public money is a crime against the citizens, and the contempt of our people for economy and frugality in their personal affairs deplorably saps the strength and sturdiness of our national character. It is a plain dictate of honesty and good government that public expenditure should be limited by public necessity and that this should be measured by the rules of strict economy, and it is equally clear that frugality among the people is the best guarantee of a contented and strong support of free institutions.

"The people of the United States have decreed that on this day the control of their Government in its legislative and executive branches shall be given to a political party pledged in the most positive terms to the accomplishment of tariff reform. They have thus determined in favor of a more just and equitable system of ideard axation. While there should be no surrender of principle, our task must be undertaken wisely and without vindictiveness. Our mission is not punishment, but the rectification of wrongs. If in lifting burdens from the daily life of our people we reduce inordinate and unequal advantages too long enjoyed this is but a necessary incident of our return to right and justice."

Edward Heneage (Liberal-Unionist), was elected by 4,427 votes to 3,463 votes cast for Mr. Henry Broadhurst (Liberal.) Josse (Liberal) was elected in July by a vote of 4,201 to 3,565 for Heneage (Liberal-Unionist). Seeing the Show From a Revolving Wheel 250 Feet in Diameter.

Methodists Apply for More Space a the World's Fair.

Queen Victoria Will Loan Windsor Castle Tapestries to Chicago-Programme of the Congress of Missions.

(From Our Special Correspondent.)

Chicago, March 3.—Two hundred men are now employed on the foundations that are to support the 4,300 tons weight of the Ferris wheel, one of the World's Fair attractions in Midway Plaisance. Imagine a wheel 250 feet in diameter, and around it, suspended between the two crowns, 36 passenger cars, each larger than an ordinary passenger coach, and with a seating capacity of 60 persons each. Imagine this great wheel, with its living freight, amounting to a total of 2,160 persons, slowly revolving. Imagine the sentation of being carried up 250 feet on one side and being lowered on the other, and of gaining during the trip a complete view of the grounds and of a large portion of Lake Michigan to boot. That is the idea of the Ferris wheel in a nutshell.

The entire structure is of steel, and somewhat resembles a huge bicycle wheel revolving between two towers. The wheel practically consists of two wheels on the same axle, a distance of 28½ feet apart, and held together by bars of steel. Between the two wheels, and suspended from steel trunnion pins, are the 36 passenger cars. These cars are constructed of wood and steel, upholstered, and have a weight of nineteen tons each. The cars are so fastened to the wheel that at whatever height if remains in a horizontal position. In groups on the rods around the crown of the wheel will be alternately extinguished and relighted at night as the wheel revolves, thus producing a spectacle calculated to excite envy in the mind of a pyrotechnic. The platforms are located on both sides of the lower part of the wheel, and six cars can be loaded and unloaded at once. The time required for one complete trip will be twenty minutes, and this will give the passengers two complete revolutions of the wheel will reach \$400,000. The inventer is G. W. G. Ferris, an engineer and bridge builder of Pittsburg.

C., March 7.—The present roll call of the Senate shows 44 Democrats, 38 Republicans, 1 Populist, 1 Independent, 1 Farmers' Alliance and 3 vacancies. Two of the vacancies have been temporarily filled by the appointment of Beckwith (Dem.) from Wyoming, and Leemantle (Rep.) from Montana, but should all three vacancies be evantually filled by the election of Republicans, which is barely possible, the Senate (even with the combined forces of the Populists) would still be a tic, with Vice-President Stevenson holding the controlling vote.

The composition of the House as shown by unofficial returns is: Democrats 217. Republicans 128, Third party 8 and vacancies 2. The Democrate thus have a majority of 80 over all.

The first meeting of Mr. Cleveland's Cabinet was held this afternoon and lasted something more than two hours. All the members were present. The Hawaiian annexation and the financial situation were touched upon, but the greater part of the time was taken up with a consideration of the question of appointments, particularly those of assistants to the various Cabinet officers.

### CANADA AND FRANCE.

Provisions of the Treaty Between the Two.

Canadian Articles that Get the Ad vantage of the French Minimum Tariff—Canadian Concensions.

Ottawa, March 7.—Just before the adjournment of the House last night Hon. Mr. Foster laid on the table the text of the new trade treaty with France. The agreement between the two countries is as fol-

ARTICLE I.

Wines, sparkling and non-sparkling, common soaps, savons de Marseille (castile soaps), and nuts, almonds, prunes and plums of French origin entering Canada shall enjoy the following advantages:

1. Non-sparkling wines gauging 15° by the centessimal alcohol meter or less, or according to the Canadian system of testing containing 28 per cent., or less, of alcohol, and all sparkling wines shall be exempted from the surtax or ad valorem duty of 30 per cent.

ARTICLE II.

Aprilia. II.

Any commercial advantage granted by Canada to any third power, especially in tariff matters, shall be enjoyed fully by France, Algeria and the French colonies. The following articles of Canadian origin

It shall come into operation immediately after this formality has been accomplished, and shall continue in force until the expiration of twelve months after either of the contracting parties shall have given notice of their intention of terminating the
