ployment Last Year, But Is Optimistic.

Seventy-three years of age, withwork last summer, Charles Thornley, 74 Oak street, still lives on the sunny side of life and says "It's a pretty good old world and the most of the people in it are kind at heart." 'We haven't any room to grumble," said Mrs. Thornley, his wife, one year his junior, "but if people hadn't been good to us, it would have been

a hard winter for us." Mr. and Mrs. Thornley came to London in 1871 from Lancashire, near Manchester, in England. Mr. Thornley worked on the Great Western Railway. He was a carbuilder and worked in the old carshops and even before the old carshops were built he helped to build cars here.

Only Six Weeks' Work. Of late years he has worked at the trade, of carpentry but last summer he was only able to obtain four weeks' work at that. For two weeks he worked for the Street Railway at street construction work. Despite his years, he is not afraid to tackle a pick and shovel but he complains that the Sicilians and other foreigners get the preference at this class of work. He owns the plot of ground and unpainted frame cottage that he lives in, but the taxes are nearly \$20 a year and the clover that he raises on the lot behind the cottage only pays part of

As might be expected from his age, he is unable to use the land for gardening. While out of work he busies himself making kites for the boys of the neighborhood, often receiving little presents in return. The flying prowess of his kites is well known in the Ealing district but the possibilities of kite-making on a commercial scale have not occurred to him.



### FIFTY FIRES DROVE HUNDREDS TO STREETS

Greater New York Firemen Had Busy Night-Extreme Cold Caused Suffering.

Greater New York between the hours of 7 Relatives Seek Investigation of New York, Feb. 13 .- Fifty fires in p.m. and 4 a.m. drove hundreds of people to the strets and gave firemen one of the busiest nights in the history of the city No lives were lost, but hundreds of persons are suffering from exposure in their people dashed out into the cold without waiting to dress or find out whether there was any danger. Fire in a 6-story house containing a Turkish bath and 30 families drove 200 slightly-clad in the streets. The fire itself was trivial.

MISTAKE IN THE ALARM

It Was First Thought a Guest Was Trapped, But He Was Out-Loss \$25,000.

(Special to The Advertiser.)

St. Thomas, Feb. 13.-Fighting a flerce fire from 5:30 until 10 o'clock this morning, with the thermometer flirting around twenty below zero, was the terrible experience of the St Thomas fire brigade when the Arlington Hotel at the corner of Talbot and Wortley road subways under the St. Catherines streets was totally destroyed. The guests escaped in their night clothes. Loss \$25,000; insurance, about \$10,000. The hostlery was entirely remodeled a year ago, was owned by Albert and James Con-

The fire evidently started in kitchen. Through a mistake in sending in the alarm, the fire brigade ran about a mile to another hotel, and by the time returned to the scene of the fire, the blaze was past control.

It was at first feared that a stranger

who arived late last night had perished in the flames, as he was not seen after all others were out, but later it was found he had left on an early train as he had intended.

The proprietor, A. P. Conley, had just returned from attending a large military ball at the Armories and this morning stood about watching the burning ruins an overcoat. The loss is estimated at about \$35,000.

### GOES BACK FOR MONEY IS BURNED TO DEATH

Sad End of Mrs. Haskin While Visiting Her Son at Brockville.

WABASH PURCHASE HELPS

Absorption of the Gould Line Means Much For This Division If Consummated.

GIVES SECOND COAST LINE

Canadian Pacific Would Have Two Direct Routes to Vancouver.

London will be made the middle division headquarters of the Canadian Pacific, if the pending purchase of the Wabash is consummated, according to information received from an authen-

Little has been said officially of these rumored mprovements and the natural infernce is that the company officials have been "laying low" pending the purchase of the financially-involved Gould road. 

The telegram of the commissioner to the mayor and health officials was in reply to one received, stating that committee representing the ployees of various industries had presented a petition of formal protest against the action of the municipal authorities in ordering factories, hotels and places of employment of any kind closed against unvaccinated persons. Niagara Falls, N. Y., Feb. 13 .- The health departments daily report issued last night gave the number of smallpox cases in the city as 101, a decrease of 27 cases in a week. Seventy-eight at present are quarantined in their homes and there are 23 patients at the quarantine hospital.

### Coming Season to See Heaviest Hitting Known In Modern Baseball---Pitching Getting Weaker; Batting Getting Stronger

This coming baseball season promises to be the heaviest-hitting season known in modern baseball. This for two reasons: First, because the pitching, on an average, is certain to be weaker than it has been in the last decade. Second, and more important, the batters are at last gaining on the pitchers. The result of constant batting and the modern theory in Southern Ohio about the middle of that scientific batting is a possibility, and that batters can be made, is improving the hitting. Beyond that the fact that the sacrifice and the hit-and-run are being largely discarded by the most up-to-date managers, tends to make for freer hitting. Whether it is possible, by practice, to develop ability to hit a baseball near a selected spot is doubtful, Frank Isbell, when one of the best hitters, declared on the witness-stand that he had no idea where a ball was going when it was hit. Wagner has told me that he had only a general idea, although able to hit certain kinds of balls in a certain direction.

Beyond doubt no man can hit a ball pitched with great speed, such as that of Walter Johnson, Joe Wood, Tex. Russell, Bender or Plank, toward any given spot. It is doubtful whether they even try. They are lucky to hit it squarely at all. Yet I am firmly convinced that against slow pitching, or a mixed delivery, players may by practice learn to hit a ball either to right or to left field. Further, I believe a number of the Athletics know this and

practice it. There was an incident that happened n the world's series last fall that causes this belief. Collins came to the bat. As he stepped to the plate he remarked to Umpire Zeke Rigler:

"Mr. Rigler, I have been trying to hit the ball into that right field stand. I don't think I can hit the ball quite that far against this slow pitching, unless it goes right on the foul line. Will you please



2.—The said Greene-Swift, Limited, shall not lay any pipe along any portion of the said streets, but shall only cross the said streets under the surface there-of, at such depth or depths, and in such place or places as may be approved of by the City Engineer and the Council of the Corporation in writing, as hereinbefore provided. 3 -That the said Greene-Swift, Lim-

ited, shall perform all the work which they shall do in or under any of the said streets under the supervision and to the satisfaction of the City Engineer, and shall lay their pipes and do their work in the portions of the said streets in such manner and at such time or times and etherwise as the City Engineer may deem necessary or expedient in order to prevent unnecessary injury to the said streets or danger to the public, and shall not in any way interfere with any sewer or drain, water, gas or other pipes which may be laid therein. ther pipes which may be laid therein.

4.—That the said Greene-Swift, Limited, shall not break, dig up or keep open more of the said streets at any one time than the City Engineer shall deem it expedient to be so broken, dug up or opened at one time, and shall not keep the same open for a longer period than is absolutely necessary to perform the work which is being performed, and not after the lapse of such period as the City Engineer shall by any notice in writing direct. writing direct.

5 .- That the said Greene-Swift, Limted, shall, while any work is in progress in any of the said streets, keep and maintain such barriers, watchmen and lights, and take such other care and precautions as may be necessary, or the City Engineer may require for the protection and safety of the public and of property.

6.—That the said Greene-Swift, Limited, shall, without any delay, and to the satisfaction of the City Engineer, repair and make good the said streets which they shall break, dig up, or open for any of the purposes aforesaid, or injure in so doing.

7.—That the said Greene-Swift, Limited, shall make good to any person who shall be injured, either in person or property, by or through the pegligence of Greene-Swift, Limited, in the placing, repair or maintenance of their said pipes, or in the operation of any of their works in so doing or otherwise, the loss and damage sustained by him, and shall indemnify and save harmless the Corporation from all actions, suits, claims, damages, costs and demands which may be brought or prosecuted against the Corporation, or which the Corporation may sustain, suffer, or be put to, in consequence of any act, default or omission of the Greene-Swift, Limited, or of the exercise by Greene-Swift, Limited, of any of the rights conferred by said bylaw No.

8.—That if Greene-Swift, Limited, shall neglect to repair or make good any of the said streets which shall be .-That the said Greene-Swift, Lim-

10.—That the said pipes shall be used only for the purpose of conducting steam from the premises of Greene-Swift, Limited, situated on the corner switt, Liffited, situated of the corner of Carling and Talbot streets, in the said City of London, and not from any other place, to supply heat to the in-habitants of the municipality, and not for any other purpose; and the said Greene-Swift, Limited, shall not, during the term of this agreement, sell electric light or power to any person in the said City of London, other than to the tenants and occupants of their said buildings.

11 .- That the said Greene-Swift, Limited, shall cover with insulating packed with asbestos all pipes laid them in the said streets under agreement. 12.—That Greene-Swift, Limited, shall pay to the Corporation on or before the 31st day of December in each year, after

the passing of the said bylaw, and dur-ing the continuance of this agreement, the sum of one hundred dollars per innum. 13.—That any notice required to be erved upon the said Greene-Swift, Limited may be served by mailing the same at London Postoffice, addressed to the said Greene-Swift, Limited, or by

leaving the same at the office or place of business of the said Greene-Swift,

Limited. 14.-That Greene-Swift, Limited, shall at all times, upon request, make out and deliver to the Corpora-tion, or any of the officers who may be tion, or any of the officers who may be authorized by it to demand the same, a statement in writing of the names and residences of the several stockholders of the said Greene-Swift, Limited, the amount of stock held by them respectively, and the amount paid thereon.

15.—In the event of a breach by Greene-Swift, Limited, of any of the provisions of this agreement the Council of the Corporation may declare that provisions of this agreement the Council of the Corporation may declare that all rights and privileges hereby granted to them shall cease, determine and be at an end, and thereupon all rights and privileges granted shall immediately cease, determine and be at an end.



#### STILL AT DEADLOCK







Practical Meaning of Conservative Govt. Commission's Report on Transcontinental.

NO MENTION OF GRAFT

Steeper Grades, Sharper Curves and Wooden Trestes Might Have Been Economical

Ottawa, Feb. 12.—The long-heralded report of the investigation of the Transcontinental Railway was laid before Parliament today. It is a formidable document in bulk, running to fifteen hundred typewritten pages. For forty millions less a line could have been laid that would later have had to be improved, as the C. P. R; is now improving its line at great cost.

The alleged "waste" of forty million dollars is largely attributed to the construction of the road, on what the commission evidently considered was too high a standard. When it was proposed by the late Government to build a Transcontinental Railway across Canada of the highest possible standard, the proposal was indorsed by the people of Canada. But the commissioners believe that great sayng could have been obtained by a lower standard of excellence than that
