Petrograd, Oct. 19 .--The Government has definitely determined to move to Moscow in the very near

EVACUATE REVAL.

Petrograd, Oct. 19.—The newspapers publish an official announcement that the evacuation of the fortified port of Reval, on the Baltic at the entrance to the Gulf of Finland, has begun. The schools at Reval have been closed. The inhabitants of the city are being sent to the interior of Russia.

Announcement that the Government will move to Moscow was made today by M. Kishkin, minister of public welfare.

WAS EXPECTED.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 19.—Russian officials here had no dispatches today on the removal of the Russian Provisional Government from Petrograd to Moscow, but said that the plan of moving the seat of Government, conceived some time ago, undoubtedly had been hastened by the German advance in the Riga territory. Ever since the removal of the capital was first discussed Russian officials here have reliterated that the Kerensky Government felt it could work with fewer hampering influences in Moscow than Petrograd, which is the centre of opposition. The German advance, Russian officials here say, undoubtedly has strengthened the extreme radicals in the Council of Soldiers' and Workmen's Delegates.

THE OLD PRISON FARM IS NOW DOING ITS BIT AS CONVALESCENT HOME

Guelph, Ont., Oct 19.—The old provincial prison farm at Guelph is no more. Everything that made the place look like a jail or a place of detention has been removed. Today fifty returned soldiers, the first of the invalided men to be treated here, arrived and took up quarters in the Guelph Convalescent Home. They will be quickly followed by more, until 350 are housed here. Everything is ready for the reception of the men, even to a theatre for concerts or movies, and bowling alleys. All the industrial and vocational training that was formerly carried on at the reformatory, will be continued for the use of the returned soldiers.

### MORE ROOM NEEDED FOR SURPLUS GERMANS REQUIRED FOR ZIMMERMAN'S WAIL

Wants Allies To Permit Development in Central Africa.

NOT WORLD CONQUERORS

Former Foreign Secretary Is Trying To Pull Wool Over World's Eyes.

The Hague, Oct. 19.—Emil Zimmermann in the Vossische Zeitung has a long editorial on "German colonial politics in an English-American looking-glass," in which he treats of German Central Africa, as an important long editorial on "German colonial politics in an English-American looking-glass," in which he treats of German Central Africa as an important factor in peace negotiations.

"To facilitate the European situation," he writes, "Central Africa is one of the most vital importance.
"I recognize that our Central African plans would be most painful to the English and Americans. A German Central Africa that develops steady would be the natural ally of the Latin South and Central American states, and together with the Arabian and Turkish powers, would make for a strong influence in the Indian Ocean. Just this would create an enormous modification in Germany's war aims on the European continent, If England and America are honest with their allies, they must support this idea of Comman colonial arranging accounts. allies, they must support this idea of German colonial expansion, even if they object to it."

Wants More Room.

Herr Zimmermann says that if Germany cannot acquire room for its surplus population abroad, it must seize it on the continent.

"In his new book on Central Afric, Zimmermann says he has shown how that region could be defended by a colonial army of fifty thousand, but his ideas have been strongly opposed by the English and by President Lowell of Harvard University. When the Americans and Englishmen get excited over a German colonial army, he says, they should remember that the Belgium Congo army counted 17,000 natives. He asks what is to be attained by "unjustifiable" attacks on German colonial politics.

"Every reasonable being, even abroad," he adds, "must admit that the present conflict can only be settled if the German people are given more room, if not in Europe, then abroad. The English and Americans say they wish to relieve the tension in Europe."

"Certainly the English and American

The question of exemption for farmers caused some discussion. Lieut.
Col. Smith said the opinion of the conference was that each case should be considered on the basis of the namber of acres owned and cultivated by the farmer and the number of members in the family. Women were capable of doing much of the work, he said, as already, without being asked, they had "done a hang-sight more than the men." Men were using the farms as "funk-holes," and there were thousands of them in Ontario, he declared, who should under no circumstances be exempted. Neither should farmers' sons who recently left city positions to go back to the old homestead. He realized that production should be encouraged to the greatest extent, but did not believe in granting exemption to men who did not deserve it. Farm help should be investigated closely, he said, and the length of service with the farmer learned.

Other branches which should not obtain exemption by reason of their work were male domestics, office clerks, automobile mechanics, conductors, no exemption, as women could take their places; brakemen, engineers and railroad firemen, in most cases exempt.





There it is again! The signal of distress from the front! It came a few days ago, and proved to be "Send Our Socks!" Send Our Socks!" And now it comes gain, sounding from every Canadian fospital in France and England, and from every dressing station and field hospital on the battlefield. And this time it says, "Sew Our Shirts!" Yes, actually, there are not enough shirts! And that is not all; there are thousands and thousands of socks and pyjamas and bed jackets needed for our ever-growing hospitals. There are miles and miles of sheets to be hemmed, and there are acres of pillow slips in urgent demand. And the nurses and doctors and officials at our Red Cross headquarters are calling foudly to the women of Canada to send them in ever growing quantities. And it is not right that they should be compelled to call. We have not yet grasped the magnitude of our tremendous work. We have done well in the past, and we are doing nobly now, but merely to do well or even nobly will not suffice. We forget that the wounded in our hospitals are increasing with heart-sickening rapidity; we forget that that fearful stream of maimed and shattered men will continue to pour in off the battlefields for the next few dreadful months. And we forget that to keep pace with the needs of our wounded we women must pile up our work, doubling, trebling, quadrupling.

Perhaps because the country Red Cross circles and auxiliaries have done so magnificently in the past—and just how grandly they have worked only the unpackers and packers at Hyman Hall can tell—perhaps just because they have been such an unfailing bulwark of the Red Cross in the three years of war, the fact that the growth of their work is not keeping pace with the need is a cause of great anxiety. Many circles would willingly double their output if they could double their money. The fault surely does not lie with the women. Their past denies that. But some way must be found of financing each society. Surely an appeal to the men, showing the money.

#### BROUGHT TO THE STATES TO BOOST LIBERTY LOAN

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—A German submarine captured by the British will oon be on view in New York. It arrived in three sections in the hold of an English steamship yesterday and was unloaded today, to be assembled in Central Park as an exhibit to aid the Liberty Loan drive. The Liberty Loan committee announced that the submarine was the UC-5, of the minelaying type, caught laying mines in the North Sea by a British destroyer in April 16. It was obtained by the committee through the courtesy of the British Government and the co-operation of Lord Northcliffe, head of the British war mission in the United States. The craft is 110 feet long, beam 11 feet and has a displacement of 200 tons. She has capacity and machinery for laying twelve mines. She carries no guns or torpedo tubes.

The craft, when placed in Central Park, will be used as a Liberty Loan bond selling booth, and only those who have bought a bond will be allowed to inspect the craft.



### Our Consumers' League

Ever notice when a member of the family is stricken with measles, sore throat, appendicitis, toothache or some such malady, how many more people in the universe seem to be, or to have been, similarly afflicted? It's the same with an idea, meet up with a new one some day, and all its kith and kin and distant relations start bobbing up in the most unexpected ways and places. Just touch upon a subject in this department and, at every turn, new light is thrown upon it. Scarcely had a request come in from a reader a short time ago for recipes in which buttermilk might be used instead of whole or skim milk, when Mrs. McB— told the editor of Our Consumers' League about the bran gems made with either buttermilk or sour milk, which are greatly liked by her family.

Then a few days ago, M. B. said over the telephone, "I see you had a recipe for making bran gems with buttermilk. I make a date graham loaf with buttermilk which my family likes very much. Indeed, as one of your contributors stated some time ago, I get buttermilk all the time, just as I do milk. I have been getting from the same dealer for eight years. We not only drink it, but I use it in many ways in cooking. It is so much less expensive than milk that it constitutes a real saving. Here is my date graham loaf, and I'm sure anyone who tries it will like it:

BUTTERMILK USED IN DATE LOAF

"One large half cup of brown sugar. "Shortening size of an egg. "Half a teaspoonful of salt.

"One teaspoonful of baking sods. "One and one-half cups buttermilk. "Two cups graham flour. "One cup white flour.

"One-half pound dates, chopped, "Bake in a moderately hot oven thirty-five or forty minutes.

"The most economical salad dressing I know about is made with butter-milk, at least, I use buttermilk in it. The recipe as originally given by a former domestic science teacher in this city, called for sweet milk or sour cream with less vinegar. We do not have sour cream in our home, so I tried buttermilk, and found it entirely satisfactory, using with it the same quantity of vinegar l

"This is how I make buttermilk salad dressing: BUTTERMILK SALAD DRESSING.

"Two teaspoonsful of sugar "One teaspoonful of flour.

"One scant teaspoon mustard (we aren't very fond of mustard).

"Salt, pepper, dash of cayenne, and piece of butter the size of a walnut, "Mix with this a good large cup of buttermilk and cook till creamy.

#### "When cooling, add slowly a quarter of a cup of vinegar." ANOTHER "HYGIENIC SINNER."

"There's a hygienic sinner who was missed in the list compiled by that Regina medical officer of health, which you published the other day," said cell-known London man this week.

"Who is he or is it she?" asked the editor. "Well," came the reply, "perhaps I should term this one a variation of one mentioned, "The street car conductor who holds the transfer slip in his mouth." The hygienic sinner to whom I refer is the street car conductor who moistens his thumb with saliva, then proceeds to use it to separate the transfer slip requested from the rest in his possession. This has become such a habit with one 'sinner' that I have seen moisten his thumb before handing out tickets. It isn't just one in particular. I have seen one of these 'sinners' almost cough his head off, then calmiy moisten his thumb, separate a transfer and hand it out. And people wonder how they catch colds! I have thought about writing a letter to the paper for a long time about this disgusting practice. Now, this has given me an opening. It strikes me there is a whole lot more education required along hygienic lines."

#### AND STILL ANOTHER!

There is still another "hygienic sinner," undoubtedly responsible for a lot of sickness and misery, and that one the vestibuled street car. The season of the year is arriving when it is capable of doing its worst. Precious little chance of ventilation as passengers are shot in to "pay as they enter" and shot out to "stand not upon the order of their going, but go at once." Windows are sealed up for hours at a time, and the malignant germ party waxes continually more of a "crush." Ever get into one of these "Pay as You Enter" air-tight ompartments, say on a cold, wet night, when the homeward-bound rush is nearing a close? And didn't you feel dizzy and nauscated from the closeness and odorousness? Weren't you glad to stumble out into the fresh air again, even if it was penetrating and endangered your best clothes?

No wonder the conductor sometimes gets bad coughs, even if he does get an occasional whiff of oxygen from the doors. Surely some method of ventilation might be evolved and used whereby riding on street cars might become less of a risk in cold weather.

Reading over the writer's shoulder, Resourceful Sue says, "Why don't they "When the street car is crowded?" counter questions the writer.

"That would be easy enough," says Practical Sue, "Let them open the windows at the other end. Of course, I wouldn't want the rain and draft to blow in on me. But some people wouldn't mind."

#### "STONE AGEING."

Several months ago, when the increasing cost of living made greater thrift an imperative need for the majority of people, and baking of bread at home was being urged by a number of practical housewives and domestic economists, Jane Wiggins wanted to know if it would be rational for everybody to get back to the stone age and do for themselves. With bacon advancing at the rate of a cent a month since the beginning of war, and most other things sky-larking proportionately, it begins to look as if nothing else but the stone age revival is going to make it possible to live at all. By the way, Jane hasn't put in an appearance for ever so long. "It is understood that she has been gardening and chicken-raising and preserving too strenuously even to think of "lit'r'y" efforts. Would she term this growing what you eat on your own city lot "stone-ageing"?

Anyway after the "every-back-yard-its-own-garden movement of the past summer, another one looms on the horizon.

"Every household its own delivery wagon." A few weeks ago reference was made in this department to grocery stores in large cities in the United States, where two prices were put on commodities, one price when the supplies were charged and ordered to be delivered; another price, an appreciable amount less, when cash was paid and the purchaser carried the goods away.

Some days ago an officer of the local food conservation committee stated

Some days ago an officer of the local food conservation committee stated that interviews with local bakers had revealed the fact that the cost of bread was enhanced by the cost of delivery. One baker who did no delivering was already able to sell a cent a loaf cheaper. Now comes announcement that at least two local butchers have adopted the non-delivery system, and a reduction of 3 cents a pound on every pound of meat will be recorded. It looks as if there would be a run on these establishments. To be sure there are times and occasions when going for everything would be exceedingly awkward for some people, when there is sickness in the house and the housewife has no one to send for example.

"Much Traveled Mary" tells of a new kind of a store which she has come across in her experience, a store which meets the "Stone Agers" half way and at the same time makes concession to those who insist upon "the conveniences of civilization." In this grocery store a set charge of five cents is placed for delivery of any one order. The purchaser with an atom of thrift isn't likely to order a 25-cent purchase to be "sent up" and a 50-cent purchase to the same address a couple of hours later. Such a system encourages "efficient ordering," in other words, keeping track of necessities and lumping orders in order that the one delivery charge may go a long way. Moreover, it does away with the nuisance for the merchant of having small purchases sent here and there and all over the city.

One good thing this high cost of living is accomplishing, it is teaching people to think intelligently about the problems of their every-day lives, and thereby adding some zest as well as anxiety to household problems. Incidentally, it is teaching people to take a little more unselfish interest in those with whom they do business. The day isn't so far distant when a certain type of woman used to think it a thing of which to be proud that she wouldn't even carry a spool of thread home for herself. War conditions, which are in a measure shaped by other conditions, are making a certain kind of pretentiousness look foolish, and bringing to broad daylight the fact that one may be useful without losing caste. The princess so fastidious that she finds her rest and peace disturbed by a crumpled rose leaf is no longer an exalted personage. She is a nuisance under present economic conditions.

Now the grocer is a man, so "Mere Man" surely won't question the accuracy and intelligence of one of his own sex.

By the way, this recipe tried to get in a week ago and was unfortunately squeezed out. It is worth keeping, because those who have tried it state that it is really excellent, and such a simple method.







Question.—A. B. bought a mar-riage license on June 6th, to be married on June 20th. It was post-poned until September 6th, when marriage took place. Does he come within Class 1, of the M. S. A.? If so, does A. B. get an allowance for his wife? A. B. and F. G. M. for his wife? A. B. and F. G. M.

Answer.—Class 1 includes all those
who "were on the 6th day of July,
1917, unmarried," and therefore, includes A. B. It is understood that the
rates of pay and separation allowance
for the drafted men are the same as
for the volunteers, in which case the
wife would get the usual separation
allowance.

Question.—A traveler, married on July 10th, 1917, with a wife and mother to support, and also financial obligations wishes to know if he has any grounds to claim exemption? emption?

Answer.—See answer to A. B. Considered as a single man, the support of his mother, he might apply for exemption on grounds "that serious hardship would ensue" if placed on active service, "owing to his exceptional financial or business obligations or domestic position."

Question.—C's wife died in September, after being married four years, and C is now a widower without children. Is he included in Class 1? Class 1?

Answer.—The M. S. A. states that Class 1 includes those who ARE unmarried and who ARE widowers without children. The proclamation states that those who WERE unmarried on July 6th, and who ARE widowers without children, are called. There is nothing to indicate whether it means those who were widowers without children on July 6th, or on October 13th. You had better make application for exemption, if you wish it, and let the tribunal determine the meaning of the act.

Question—The regulations provide that a man should report for service or claim exemption in the province in which he resides. What if business calls him elsewhere? where?

Answer.—It has been explained that "resides" is not to be taken in the strictly legal sense. For instance, if a man ordinarily resides in Montreal, but owing to his business, or for some other reason, is in Toronto during the whole period of the operation of the proclamation, he may report and claim exemption in either Montreal or Toronto. But no man shuld do so in more than one locality, or confusion will result. A man who wishes to secure exemption should make his claim in the locality where he can most easily at-

Question.—Of three men in a family, one is in France, another is anxious to Join the colors in the spring, on graduating in medicine. Could the remaining one claim exemption, as he would then be the only son jeft with a widowed mother. Answer.—Yes: He might apply on the grounds mentioned in answer to Jack, or on the grounds of physical unfitness. The exemption tribunal would have to decide, however.

Question.—I have three sons, two of whom have been at the front two years. Can the third son claim exemption. Answer.-Anyone can claim exmption, if they think they have suf-icient reason for so doing. Go to the earest postoffice, and read over the easons for which exemption can be imed. The man himself or his rela tives or employer may apply for ex-emption for him.

Question.- is it necessary to sign up at the postoffice for "service" or "exemption" before being examined by the medical board? Must Imployers file claim for exemption before the men have been examined by the medical board?

Answer.—It is not necessary to go before a medical board before filing claim for exemption or reporting for service. But every man in Class I must go to the postoffice and fill out one of the two forms before November 10, whether he has been before the medical board or not. Question.—Is it necessary or compulsory for a person to be medically examined before claiming exemption, or before appearing before an exemption tribunal?

Answer .- See reply to S. P. C. Question.—Could I claim exemption for a young man of military age, against whom I hold a heavy mortgage?

Answer.—The act states that application for exemption may be made by or in respect of any man in the class called up. 

This warrants the obvious deduction regarding the trustworthiness of other details in this telegram."

### **GEN. GURKO ESCAPED** ON ENGLISH VESSEL; REACHES ENGLAND

Russ General, Friend of Deposed Czar, Exiles Himself.

London, Oct. 19.—Gen. Gurko, former commander on the Russian southwestern front, has arrived in England with his wife on board a British ship.

The correspondent of the Daily Express, who traveled on the same boat, says that the ship was lying at the critance to the river outside the port of Archangel awaiting orders to depart for England, when late at night a tug stole sliently alongside and two unidentified passengers walked up the companion ladder. They registered under assumed names, and it was not until several days later that their identity was established by a few of the other passengers.

Gen. Gurko told newspapermen last night that he was given permission to leave Russia as soon as possible after his release from imprisonment in the fortress of St. Peter and St. Paul.

"I was imprisoned," the general said, "because letters which I had written to the former emperor were cited as evidence of my ill feeling toward the republic. After several months' of confinement nothing was found to justify a trial and I was released. My intention is to remain in England until matters in Russia become more settled."

75,000 HOMELESS BY SALONIKI'S GREAT FIRE D Washington, Oct. 19.—According to an official dispatch reaching Washing-ton today from Athens, about 75,000 persons were rendered homeless and destitute by the recent fire in Saloniki of whom some 60,000 are Jews. More than 10,000 of the victim are camp-ing in the environs.

LAKE ONTARIO WHIPPED BY ANOTHER BIG BLOW Kingston, Oct. 19.—Not in many years have mariners out of Kingston experienced such continued rough weather on river and lakes. Another big blow set in last night and the harbor is filled with vessels. The wind is blowing a terrible gale, which is accompanied by a heavy rainfall. The steamer McVettie of the Canadiam Lake Lines went aground near Brockville on her way, light, to Kingston.



end in Your Problems and They Will Be Answered From Official Information by The Advertiser.

Answer.—Questions regarding medi-cal requirements cannot be answered in these columns.

Question.—A. B. bought a marriage license on June 5th, to be married on June 20th. It was postponed until September 6th, when marriage took place. Does he come within Class 1, of the M. S. A.? If so, does A. B. get an allowance for his wife? A. B. and F. G. M. Answer.—Class 1 includes all those who "were on the 6th day of July, 1917, unmarried," and therefore, includes A. B. It is understood that the rates of pay and separation allowance for the drafted men are the same as for the volunteers, in which case the wife would get the usual separation allowance.

Question.—A traveler; married en July 10th, 1917, with a wife and mother to support, and also financial obligations wishes to know if he has any grounds to claim exemption? emption?

JACK.

Answer.—See answer to A. B. Considered as a single man, the support of his mother, he might apply for exemption on grounds "that serious hardship would ensue" if placed on active service, "owing to his exceptional financial or business obligations or domestic position."

Question.—C's wife died in September, after being married four years, and C is now a widower without children. Is he included in Class 1? C. D. K. Class 1?

Answer.—The M. S. A. states that Class 1 includes those who ARE unmarried and who ARE widowers without children. The proclamation states that those who WERE unmarried on July 6th, and who ARE widowers without children, are called. There is nothing to indicate whether it means those who were widowers without children on July 6th, or on October 13th. You had better make application for exemption, if you wish it, and let the tribunal determine the meaning of the act.

Question—The regulations provide that a man should report for service or claim exemption in the province in which he resides. What if business calls him elsewhere? OPEN EVENINGS UNTIL 9 Answer.—It has been explained that Answer.—It has been explained that "resides" is not to be taken in the strictly legal sense. For instance, if a man ordinarily resides in hiontreal, but owing to his business, or for some other reason, is in Toronto during the whole period of the operation of the proclamation, he may report and claim exemption in either Montreal or Toronto. But no man shuld do so in more than one locality, or confusion will result. A man who wishes to secure exemption should make his claim in the locality where he can most easily attend the local tribunals, before which his case will be heard.

Question.—Of three men in a family, one is in France, another is anxious to join the colors in the spring, on graduating in medicine. Could the remaining one claim exemption, as he would then be the only son jeft with a widowed mother.


