Benefits. IMPROVED CONDITIONS

Steady Growth in Business As Result of Prompt Deliveries.

U. S. Investigator Declares **Industry Dominated** Monopolistic System.

Scranton, Pa., July 7.—A charge that the United States anthracite coal integration of the coming referendum, with the following officers: dustry is dominated by a monopolistic President, Rev. C. R. Durrant; vicedustry is dominated by a monopolistic system that "presses up to squeeze the consumer and down to squeeze the wage-earner, by diverting profits at points where neither can see them through the screen of book-keeping and legal devices," was made today before the anthracite coal commission by W. J. Lauck, in urging the admissiblity of exhibits on profiteering and monopoly, which he submitted in behalf of the United Mine Workers of America and to which the representatives of the operators interposed objections. Mr. Lauck also declared that the real profits of the anthracite industry were at least seven times the apparent profits.

The commission was appointed by The commission was appointed by President Wilson to arbitrate the differences between the miners and

operators.

"The point which we wish to make is that a well-defined process exists by which profits of the anthracite industry are successfully concealed the high prices being explained by apparent high costs," says the report. "The losses of the railroad coal companies are written into the cost of transportation through advances without interest and through the funding operations, which impose large fixed charges upon the railroad department. The high freight rates which inflated transportation costs seem to justify are written according to the Master Barbers' Association.





HYDRO PROJECT WILL BE DELAYED UNTIL INVESTIGATION MADE

Drury Government Will Appoint Special Commission For Purpose.

Government has decided to hold up Sir Adam Beck's hydro-electric railway project until a special Government commission which is yet to be appointed, can inquire into and report thereon. The ultimate fate of the radial project apparently is still a matter of doubt.

The official statement mentions the provincial debt as one of the deciding factors in the Government delaying the radial project. It is pointed out that radial project. It is pointed out that the province has advanced approximately \$56,000,000 to the hydro-electric commission, and in connection with the Central Ontario system. In addition the province had guaranteed bonds, bringing its obligations to practically \$65,000,000, or 52 per cent of Ontario's present debt.
