

British Sailors Wept as the Squadron

New York, Nov. 21.-About 200 sailors from the British squadron, commanded by Prince Louis of Battenberg were missing from their ships when the squadron made ready to sall yes-terday. Several of those who had overstaved their leave were turned away stayed their leave were turned away when they tried to board their ships. As it was within a few hours of the fleet's sailing time when they made their belated appearance, the officers treated them as deserters. The officers said that they were willing to lose these men, on the principle that they are worthless and their loss a good riddance. Many of the rejected sailors

The most interesting thing about crocodiles and alligators, declares the author of "The Romance of the Animal World," is the way they get their food. This they do mostly and by preference in the water, but they have also a habit of lying in wait upon the mud of river banks until some animal approaches sufficiently near to be within their

Lying sunk in the mud and of the color of mud themselves, they may well be mistaken for a log. A wild pig or some other animal fond of rooting in the mud sees the long, shapeless object, but is not disturbed by it as he roots happily among the reed beds. He looks up suddenly to find that the log has moved. One end of it, the longest, thinnest end, the tail, is gliding away in a curve; but, like an arrow loosed it flies back and meets the body of the pig with a tremendous sidewise blow, and the poor pig falls in a heap.

With a sudden swift rush the alligator is upon him, and, seizing the body by the skin, which it holds puckered up between its front teeth, it shakes it furiously, as a terrier would a rat, and then half drags, half pushes, it before it as it crawls through the mud to the

water's edge.
There is only one wild animal, says the author, that will purposely attack an alligator, and that is the jaguar of South America. The jaguar springs on the back of the alligator and with all his might tears at the roots of the reptile's tail. This possibly is with the idea of paralyzing that member, thus rendering it incapable of those mighty sweeps from side to side which are more to be feared than even the

great armed jaws.

The fear of both these weapons may deter the jaguar from clawing the throat of the saurian, for were he to be shaken off in the latter struggles he would be more exposed to either than if he fell farther back.

Dog Tried, Convicted and Hanged. William Chambers, the famous English publisher, once related an extraordinary story of a sheep thief hanged at Peebles and buried at crossroads with a stake through his body. The remarkable feature of the case was that the thief's dog was tried for aiding and abetting in the crime, convicted, hanged and buried along with its master. It was proved at the trial that the man when out with the animal used to indicate to it some particular flock of sheep he wanted. After reaching home the dog returned to the place, rounded up the sheep and by devious ways, and only after dark, drove them home. There they were kept for some days and their owners' marks destroy-ed or "faked." They were then graded with others legitimately purchased and driven to the English markets.

Why the Ocean Doesn't Freeze If the ocean did not have salt it yould freeze somewhat more readily than it does now, but there would be no very marked difference.

The ocean is prevented from freezing not so much by its salt as by its size and by its commotion. 

Citizens of the old Devonshire town of Honiton are immune from arrest until sunset one evening, for while the horse fair is in progress the arm of the law is powerless. This is in continuation of a quaint and picturesque ceremonial which has been handed down from the time of Henry III. When the horse fair begins the town crier, in the gorgeous dress of a headle crier. crier, in the gorgeous dress of a beadle of the last century, appears, carrying a pole, at the end of which is a large gilt glove, decked with flowers. Having rung his hand-bell three times, the crier, in his three-cornered hat, announces, "Oyez, oyez, oyez! The fair is begun; the glove is up; no man can be arrested till the glove is down. God save the King." Each sentence is chorused by the children standing chorused by the children standing round, and at the conclusion they scramble for nuts. The glove is taken down at sunset.



SHIPPING A SEA.

The Scooping Up Is the Heart of the Giant Wave Myth.

When a steamer as large as the Campania is boarded in weather not for her to be called severe by a wave that sweeps from reasonably assumed security some passengers to death and others to injury, the episode necessitates a new examination of the que tion whether in any given "sea" there is sometimes one billow many times greater than any of its millions of fellows. Belief in the existence of such waves is almost universal on land and not uncommon afloat, for many ships have been swept as was the Campania and not a few of them have been over whelmed on days when there seemed nothing to be feared. This is adequate excuse for the existence of the "giant wave" assumption, and yet we do not find even in the experience of the co-lossal Cunarder proof that it is founded on fact, proof that the sizes of the waves raised by one wind differ enormously among themselves. Differ they do to some extent beyond any question, and when any sequence of waves is made up of waves larger and smaller one of them must be the biggest of all. But it will be noticed that of the Cam-But it will be nonced that of the Campania it is said, probably without any thought of this problem, that "suddenly the big ship lurched to port and scooped up an enormous wave." Why so enormous? Any stalwart wave on a day when, to quote again, "a heavy quartering sea was running" would be quite big enough to do all that this wave did if "scooped up" by a ship moving at the Campania's speed, especially when the pottion. pecially when the motion of the ship is opposite to that of the wave itself and must be added to it in explaining the consequences. We remain convinced that on that disastrous Wednesday the Campania safely rode hundreds of waves nearly or quite as big as was the one that ravaged her steerage deck and drenched deep the deck above. Not impossibly bigger ones were passed without attracting any attention from her passengers. The "scooping up" is the heart of the myth, and the "giant wave" is a wave that comes just when the ship is in a position to take it

Long Joseph, Seven Feet Ten Frederick the Great's father, Frederick William, the creator of the Prussian army, whose special mania was the collection of giants from all parts of the earth, would have given something like a king's ransom for "Long Joseph," who has just joined the First Foot guards at Potsdam at the age (twenty, with a weight of about eighteen stone and a stature of 7 feet 10 inches, an ugly man, decidedly, to meet in a bayonet melee. Frederick William had a whole regiment of such colossi, known as the Riesengarde, among the tallest of them being one Kirkman, a Scoto-Hibernian, or Ulster Irishman, whose portrait may still be seen in the palace at Charlottenburg. One of Frederick's first sovereign acts was to disband this preposterous bri gade of giants, which had cost the Prussian state about as much as all the rest of its army.—London Chron-

Turkey's Bad Forestry.

Forestry is neglected by the Turkish government, as witness the following emarks by an explorer: "The mos carked feature of all this eastern district is the entire absence of wood, no rom any natural condition, as trees yould evidently grow in most parts, but owing to willful destruction and neglect to replant. Firewood nov comes four and more days' journey to Erzerum and is in that city the most expensive household necessity, while the border, on the Russian side there are magnificent pine forests. This regrettable destruction extends all over Asiatic Turkey, square miles of forest being burned where as many square miles of clearing near some villages are desired. Around villages great walls of magnificent logs rise up, and around fields also, so that soon no forests will remain except in the most in accessible mountains."

Why Dubois Gets a Statue. Nice is to raise a monument to a cook -a Provencal chef, one Urbain Dubois. It is not for his soups, his entrees, his roasts or his pastry that Dubois is to be honored in stone. Provencals chiefly love his memory for his patriotism What Dubois sacrificed on the altar of his country was what some would de scribe as a "mighty good berth." He was chef to the king of Prussia when that sovereign went to war with France. Immediately on the news reaching him the chief of the kitchen marked his disagreement with the chie of the state by resigning. Considering that he lost \$12,000 a year, it was a hard step to take. And that is why Dubois is to have his statue.

Moscow, Nov. 23.—At the end of four days' debate the executive committee of the Zemstvo Congress yesterday brought in the following resolution in favor of supporting the Government, the reading of which was greeted with termendous applicable. remendous applause:
"Considering that the Imperial mani

festo satisfies all the demands voiced since the Zemstvo Congress of a year ago, and that the liberties accorded by the manifesto are indispensible to the

the manifesto are indispensible to the tranquilization of the country, the congress declares itself in complete solidarity with this constitutional basis.

"The responsibility for the realization of the program rests upon the Cabinet. The congress is convinced that the Cabinet can count on the support of the great majority of the Zemstvos and municipalities so long as it follows the path for the accomplishment of the liberties promised by the ment of the liberties promised by the

manifesto, but every deviation will en-counter decisive opposition. "The congress believes that the sole neans of guaranteeing the authority of the Government, the pacification o of the Government, the pacification of the country and the support of the people's representatives are the im-mediate promulgation of universal suf-frage in elections to the Douma, the transformation of the first Douma into a constituent assembly for the elabor-ation with the approbation of the Em-peror of a constitution for the Russian Empire and the organization of terri-torial reform.

"But measures for the realization of the liberties granted by the manifeste are regarded as immediately impera-

"It must devolve on the Doums to establish a fundamental basis for land reform and to decide any momentous question in the domain of labor legis-

The resolution concludes by enumerating various measures which it says must be carried out before the Douma meets. These include investigations into the recent occurrences in various parts of the country, the trial of local officials and police who became culpomiciais and police who became culp-ably involved in the disorders, the maintenance of public security, the pro-clamation of full amnesty for political and religious offences up to the date of the Imperial manifesto and the abo-

lition of capital punishment.
