## ROSEBERY IS PREMIER.

The Grand Old Man Hands His Resignation to the Queen.

CHANGES IN THE CABINET.  
Sir William Vernon Harcourt Will Lead  
the Liberals in the Commons—  
General Review of the Situation  
as a result of the  
Current Events.

LONDON, March 5.—The Queen accepted Mr. Gladstone's resignation on Saturday afternoon, and offered the premiership to Lord Rosebery. Rosebery has accepted. Sir Henry Ponsonby, the Queen's private secretary, called upon Lord Rosebery in London Saturday afternoon and told him of the Queen's wish that he accept the premiership. Lord Rosebery was unwilling to give an immediate decision. He conferred at length with his colleagues in the Cabinet and delayed his acceptance until evening.

William Vernon Harcourt, Chancellor of the Exchequer, Earl Spencer, First Lord of the Admiralty, and Herbert Asquith, Home Secretary, called upon Lord Rosebery yesterday. Mr. Gladstone declined the premiership, and Mr. Gladstone's withdrawal from the premiership opens a most complex situation in domestic politics. The consequences will be it is now impossible to foretell, although these and the columns of the newspapers are filled with surmise, advice and warnings. Difficulties will not cease finally with the cessation of Lord Rosebery to the premiership of the two or three other Cabinet changes which are contemplated. The career of the reconstituted Ministry will proceed for some time probably on the lines hitherto followed.

Mr. Gladstone's name will be deemed of the greatest use to clear the way of the Cabinet as long as he shall remain in or near the arena of politics, but it is remembered that the Government majority is small and that Lord Rosebery is a heavy man to have to carry. It is likely to have trouble with the Irish members after the withdrawal of the old Premier's influence. Henry Labouchere, the fighting leader of the Radicals, and most of the supporters of the Government are not reconciled to a peer in the premiership even under Mr. Gladstone's influence, especially in view of the fact that a final declaration against the House of Lords is in the hands of Mr. Gladstone's followers who will not be chosen until further notice.

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## ONTARIO PARLIAMENT.

After the new bills have been introduced the members were preparing to leave the chamber, expecting that the House would adjourn, Sir Oliver Mowat rose, however, and in a feeling address, announced the resignation of Mr. Fraser, touching on the great regret he experienced in losing one of his most active and valuable Ministers.

Mr. Oliver expressed the hope that Mr. Fraser would regain his health and probably return to public life. He mentioned that the Commission of Public Works had had differences of opinion at times with his colleagues on matters, but they were buried in the regret at his withdrawal. Mr. Wood (Hastings) moved for a return of copies of all correspondence in connection with the application for a supply of timber for a sawmill in the township of Tyendinaga, in the county of Hastings, by Mr. Fraser Chairman of the said township.

Mr. Harcourt laid the estimates for the current year on the table yesterday. They amount to \$481,492 less than last year. Government Cattle as usual.

Mr. Harcourt in reply said there was no objection to give any of the particulars asked for in the motion. The Government had no wish to keep back information connected with the discovery of this disease in the dairy department at the Agricultural College. The discovery having been made, it was manifestly the Government's duty to pursue the investigation further in order to find all possible information for the benefit of this country. All the noise and difficulty that had taken place occurred simply because instructions were given for the matter to be investigated. The disease having been definitely ascertained to exist, orders were given to Mr. Dryden, veterinary surgeon at the college, to make experiments with Koch's lymph. He (Mr. Dryden) did not know whether or not the most expert veterinary surgeon, to whom the matter was referred, was present in these animals, except in the earlier stages and by the use of the fluid he had mentioned. It is wonderful that neither Mr. Reel or any of the persons connected with the college had knowledge of the existence of the disease. The experiments had been going on ever since the disease had been discovered, and there had been considerable progress made, but not sufficient in some cases to be able to arrive at any definite conclusion. He was glad to say, however, that when the results were reached they would be published in a bulletin and distributed throughout the country. The college at Guelph was not the only institution of the kind at which outbreaks of tuberculosis had occurred. In Ohio, Maine, Vermont, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, where similar institutions existed, there had been outbreaks, and most of the cases the whole of the herds had been slaughtered. There, at the experimental farm at Ottawa, there was last year an outbreak of the same character. It would appear, however, that the outbreak at Ottawa was much more severe than that which had been discovered at Guelph. Several of the animals at Ottawa, he believed, died from the effects of the disease, whilst at Guelph none of the animals had done that far.

Women's suffrage. Toronto, March 5.—Yesterday's sitting of the House was comparatively quiet after the spirited debate of Thursday, although a good deal of importance was transferred. A deputation waited upon the Government and requested that an Act should be passed providing for— "A Saturday half-holiday from about one o'clock in the afternoon for all employees with such exceptions and limitations as may be found necessary."

"Such a reasonable limitation of the number of hours of work per week, in cases covered by the Act as will prevent its provisions from being indirectly violated."

"The Act should apply to establishments having as many as three employees." It is desired that the Act should apply in the first instance to cities only and that councils of other municipalities should have the power of making its provisions applicable therein.

A large deputation of ladies waited upon Sir Oliver Mowat yesterday afternoon for the purpose of urging the Government to extend the franchise to women. Several gentlemen also accompanied the party.

The Charlottetown Riots. CHARLOTTETOWN, N.S., March 5.—There is practically no change in the situation at Charlottetown. Fourteen rioters were arrested at Montserrat yesterday and taken to the P. & C. County Jail.

Dairymen's Association. SHELBURNE, Ont., March 5.—A convention was held here yesterday under the auspices of the Dairymen's Association of Western Ontario. A large number of farmers and other interested in cheese and butter making were present. The meeting was addressed by Mr. W. Whelan, secretary of the association; Mr. A. Bradick, superintendent of dairy stations in Ontario; Mr. S. Sprague, instructor in butter making at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph; and Mr. R. A. Robertson, cheese dealer, London. The address was of an exceedingly practical nature and well appreciated and should be productive of great good. A social meeting was held in the evening, at which Mr. R. A. Robertson presided.

Colonial Trade Relations. LONDON, March 5.—Sir Thomas McCallum has arrived here. He, with the Hon. Robert Balfour, ex-Minister of the Colonies, will interview the British Cabinet Ministers. The Australians are being hurried to the prospects for an all-British world's fair between Canada and Australia and also of trade between these two countries in the near future.

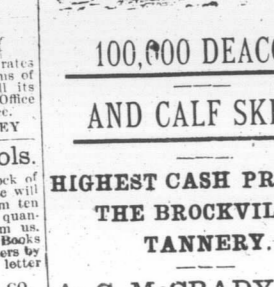
