DEAF MUTES.

We have received the twenty-ninth annual report of the Institution of the Deaf and Dumb, for the year just closed.

The just popularity of the Principal, Mr Hutton, and the faithful and efficient services of the several teachers should be cause of profound gratitude on the part of all parents of deafmutes.

Referring to the Principal's report, we find the following under the heading of Begging Deafmutes:

"Before closing this report I feel constrained again to call attention to this serious evil, which seems to show no signs of abatement. Deafmutes are constantly travelling over this province, and the neighboring provinces and states, ostensibly 'collecting' for some plausible object or other, but really living by systematic begging.

Wolville has had its quota of begging deafmutes who have doubtless been successful in collecting quite an amount of money from our people under the supposition that they were giving to some charitable institution.

THE PROVINCIAL BLUE BOOKS.

Owing to a pressure on our space last week we were unable to call attention to the provincial blue-books. The house being later in meeting this year than usual the Government was enabled to have their returns before the people at an earlier stage of the Legislature than in former years.

Total \$583,413. By this table it will be seen that \$583,413 has been spent of the \$750,000 total amount of which the act of 1883 covers. Kings County, as will be seen, has had her share and all of the amount has been expended, with the exception of \$1010 which is under contract for the London Bridge (so called), near Haztport, and \$100 for Kentville Bridge.

In the annual report of the Superintendent of Education, Dr Allison has succeeded in getting a vast amount of interesting information in his 64 pages of report. We can only review its contents briefly. The total number of pupils in the Province attending the public schools for the year 1886 was 105,410, an increase of 34,351 in twenty years and an increase of 2,122 over 1885.

The Commissioners of Crown Land-report shows that 36,796 acres of land was granted during the year 1886, the sale of which amounted to \$11,675. There still exists in the Province 2,116,811 acres of crown lands. King's, with the exception of Antigonish Co., has the least amount of crown lands of any county in the province. Only 11,653 acres are yet undisposed of. Victoria Co. has the largest acreage of crown lands in the Province, viz, 475,228 acres.

Good Templars.

King's Co. Lodge, I. O. G. T., met in quarterly session with "Star of Hope" Lodge, at Morristown, on Tuesday the 8th inst. The morning sitting opened at 10 o'clock, Bro. W. A. Burlage, P. C. C. T., in the chair. A goodly number of representatives were present from the various Lodges in the county and the reports they gave of the condition of their Lodges were highly encouraging.

The afternoon sitting was taken up in conferring degrees, receiving and discussing reports of committees, and discussing the various phases of the Temperance movement. The discussions were taken part in by a number of members and were quite interesting. Among the subjects discussed was the action of the Municipal Council in refusing to appoint an Inspector to enforce the Scott Act when largely petitioned to do so.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted:— RESOLVED that this County Lodge through its secretary, request all the clergymen in the county to preach a Temperance Sermon within the next four weeks; and also, that all the Temperance organizations in the county be requested, by petition and delegation to urge upon the Municipal Council, at the April term, the importance of granting the prayer of the petitions already before that body, to appoint an Inspector to carry out the provisions of the Canada Temperance Act.

A public Temperance meeting was held in the evening when the hall was well filled with an attentive audience. Striking practical addresses were made by Rev. J. L. Read and several others, besides several well rendered dialogues and recitations and a choice selection of music by the members of "Star of Hope" Lodge. SHIPPING.—The spring has far enough advanced for the commencement of potato shipments. Prices are quoted low with not much prospect of advance. Quite a number of farmers, Grangers and otherwise, are shipping their potatoes rather than sell at the present quotations altho' it is admitted that the U. S. markets will not admit of a higher price. Schr Flora B., Bentley, cleared for Boston on Saturday last with a cargo consisting of 3,700 bushels of potatoes loaded by the Poreaux Grange. Schr Windsor Packet, Wynman master, arrived from St John on Monday. She is chartered to load potatoes by Sheffield & Wickwire. Schr E. B. Ketchum, Green master, arrived from Boston the same day and has been chartered by Jonathan Rand, et al to load for Boston. Schr J. P. Blake, Durant master, also arrived the same day and will be loaded for New York market by the Lower Canada Street farmers. They will also load the Ocynd on her arrival. The large quantity of potatoes must be got out of the country price or no price. Schr Byron M., Dexter master, arrived from New York on Tuesday also schr Jeanie D.

PERSONAL.—John H. Clarke, Esq., has been quite ill of late, causing much anxiety to his friends. Fletcher Hennegan has cleared his store of the stock of goods he has had on hand and will soon leave for Kingston where he has bought a farm close by the station.

Mr Porter and Mr White, of Acadia College, have recently preached in the Baptist church to large congregations and with much acceptance. It is voted by all that they are able young men and will in the future be "bright" lights in the Baptist denomination. They are sure of large congregations whenever they preach in this village.

I. O. G. T.—The order of Good Templars is still enjoying an extended "boom," there being new accessions nightly, the order now numbering well on to 150 members. Very enjoyable evenings are spent by the members on their night of meeting. Mr Lane is the "giant" in the cause and will be greatly missed when he leaves next June.

ARMY.—The Salvation Army will storm this town about the first of May. How many will be slain it will be hard to tell—I will not predict. Rooms are now being fitted for them.

DISORDER ON OUR STREETS.

To the Editors of the ACADIAN:

SIR:—Every individual is under obligation to recognize, and not to interfere with the rights of others. It matters little in what kind of business he may be employed, or of what profession he may be a representative, or whether he belongs to that large class known as "do-nothings and stick to it," there is nevertheless incumbent upon each and every individual, regardless of his calling or position in society, a duty and an obligation not to interfere in any way with the acknowledged rights of his neighbor. And further that society is duty bound to see that when the rights and peace of its members are troubled by those who would act the part of the lawless, justice be dealt out to the injured and that he who has violated the peace shall receive his just deserts.

There are some who make a practice of tramping about the streets of the village during the evenings and persist in annoying and insulting people as they chance to be passing up or down the streets on errands of business or pleasure. In some cases the offence is hardly sufficient to warrant an arrest, nevertheless such actions are a great annoyance and should not be overlooked, while in others they are sufficient and should not and will not be passed by if this sort of conduct is continued. In many cases the cause of such riots can be attributed to bad liquor or old cider, which if it was the cause of a disturbance in the streets a few evenings ago, should be investigated by the authorities appointed under the Scott Act. Surely the residents of the village do not wish to have it appear that they are disinterested and care nothing concerning the order and respectability of their community. Still the fact that those who practise this sort of thing are allowed to continue insulting people by following them about the streets and indulging in the most offensive and disgusting language, and not infrequently confronting on the sidewalks, is evidence to that effect. In fact, it is quite evident that a policeman as is necessary in Wolville to maintain good order, as in our notable shiretown.

In conclusion it is to be hoped that if such rioting continues, the authorities will take it in hand and deal with the matter as it justly deserves. HALLET.

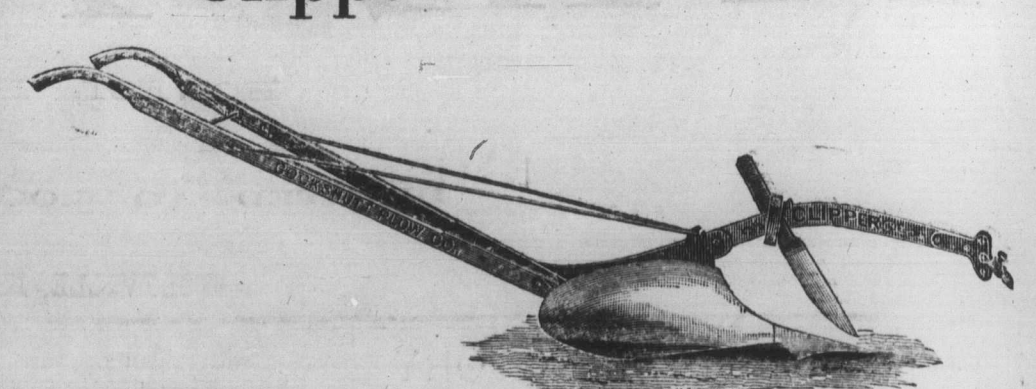

Strikes. Those who rush rashly into a strike have generally no idea of how expensive it may become both to the strikers and their friends as well as to the community in general. A committee of the House of Representatives appointed to investigate the causes and extent of the railroad strike in the South-Western States estimate the loss to the strikers in that strike at \$500,000, and the loss to men who did not strike but who were thrown out of employment by the strike at \$500,000. Here is the immense sum of \$1,000,000 directly lost to the working men alone by a single strike. The loss to the Missouri Pacific railroad is calculated at \$3,500,000. This makes the total ascertainable loss by the strike \$4,500,000. The loss to the public through the stoppage and derangement of business could not be ascertained, but it is estimated by the committee at "millions of dollars."

Neither are the sums contributed by labor organization for the support of the men on strike taken into the calculation. The worst of the business is that there is nothing to be placed on the credit side of the account to any of the parties concerned. It was all loss and no gain. Irons, the master spirit of the strike and the author of all the mischief, is now said to be literally a drunken vagabond.—Montreal Star.
