

Goderich Captures the Gold Medal for Classics - Other Honors for Our High

There was a flutter in educational circles when the University of Tozonto class list for the academical year just closed was published, on Wednesday. It was then seen that our boys at the University had done well, and kept up the reputation of the Goderich High

School J. C. Robertson, son of W. R. Robertson, at the early age of nineteen wins his B. A., and the gold medal in classics. Mr. Robertson's career has been very promising. At twelve years of age he passed the intermediate examination, and three years later matriculated at Toronto University, taking the 3rd scholarship for general proficiency \$80). 




