Goderich Township.

Holmesville, May 28th, 1883. Council met to-day at Court of Revision. The members having qualified per statute, the Court opened. The clerk stated that no appeals against the assessment were entered. However the roll was carefully gone over, and any changes which had occurred since the assessment was taken were rectified. Moved by John Beacom, seconded by John Cox, that the assessment roll as now revised and corrected be passed. Carried. The Court of Revision being closed the minutes of last meeting were read and passed. The clerk read a letter from Mr. Jos. Whiteley, P. M., asking for a grant of some \$45 for road repairs. After considering the matter the conclusion was arrived at that as the surplus funds of the township were already appropriated to the different sub-divisions, the state of the finances would not admit of any special grants being made unless in extreme cases, thus the application could not be granted.

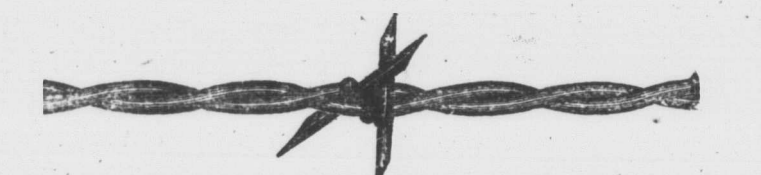
