Mr. Fowler M. P.

TELLS HIS STORY.

Of the C. P. R. Land Deal and the Shuswap and Kamloops Purchases.

Bulletin Special. Ottawa, Nov. 7.—The insurance commission examined Geo. W. Fowler, M.P., today, respecting the purchase of C. P. R. lands, the Okanagan Lumber Co. and Kamloops Lumber Co. It came out during the examination that Mr. Fowler got \$4,000 out of the Shuswap deal, \$22,000 out of the Okanagan deal, and about \$55,000 out of the Kamloops lumber deals, \$2,500 of which was received from the Shuswap transaction he said he credited against part of the Kamloops \$55,000 and which was not paid him by Peter Ryan. There were two options held by Fowler on the property of the Kamloops Lumber Co. one for \$55,000 more than the other. He unloaded on the Union Trust Co. at the higher figure and paid Ryan at the lower price, so that there was coming to him from Ryan \$55,000. In purchasing the Okanagan Lumber Co. Fowler was interested as vendor and vendee, but his explanation of this was that it did not in any way affect the sale as he was only carrying out the bargain as arranged for by the others. He was vendor, he said, in the Kamloops sale. Of the \$55,000 he gave \$12,000 to Irwin, \$1,000 to McCormick and \$7,000 to Foster. Mr. Foster stated in Toronto that this was a loan.

Paving Men Here

WILL ADDRESS THE COUNCIL.

Representatives of the Warren Bitulithic Paving Co. Will Address the Council Tomorrow Night.

D. G. Mackendrick and W. M. McPhail, both of Toronto, representing the Warren Bitulithic Paving Co. are in the city today and spent the morning at the city offices illustrating the merits of their pavement to the commissioners. Bitulithic pavement, they claim, is coming into great favor in the east. It is a mixture of crushed rock and bitumen, a by-product of petroleum, on a basis of 10 to 1. The patent of the process is on the proportions in which the rock is mixed. Ordinary crushed rock gives interstices of 40 per cent. They mix the rock from coarse down to very fine, so that the apertures in the mixture do not represent more than 8 to 10 per cent, and these apertures are filled with a bituminous cement presenting a wearing surface of 90 to 92 per cent. crushed rock. The bitulithic is laid two inches thick on a concrete base.

Messrs. McPhail and Mackendrick intend to address the council tomorrow night.

ORGANIZATION PERFECTED.

Bruce Robinson Elected President of Western Canada Baseball League.

Bulletin Special. Calgary, Nov. 7.—Bruce Robinson, of Calgary, was elected first president of the Western Canada Baseball league at Lethbridge meeting today. He will temporarily act as secretary and treasurer as well. A. E. Humphreys, of Lethbridge, is vice-president. Four clubs are in as charter members, Calgary, Edmonton, Lethbridge and Medicine Hat. The forfeit to guarantee that the clubs will finish the season was set at \$400 each, \$200 of which is to go up at February 1st and \$200 on April 1st. The salary limit is fixed at \$1,200. The season will open May 20th. National protection in class C has been applied for, which will place the Western Canada on a par with the Northern, in which Winnipeg plays, or any of the state leagues on the other side.

City Solicitor N. D. Beck wired from Ottawa last night stating that the Grand Trunk Pacific and the Canadian Northern have reached an agreement, subject to the city of Edmonton granting the Canadian Northern the same rights on the north side of the track as the G. T. P. has on the south side. A formal application will be made to the city in the near future. The C. P. R. also intends opening negotiations with the city at once.

The Hon. Robert Franklin Sutherland B. A. K. C. Speaker of the House of Commons.

Mr. Sutherland was born at Newmarket, Ont., April 5th, 1859, and is of Scotch descent. He was educated at the public and high schools of Newmarket, and at the Toronto University and the Western University. Mr. Sutherland was called to the bar in 1886 and appointed K. C. in 1888. He has been an alderman of the city of Windsor, president of the Windsor St. Andrew's society, and president of the Windsor Library board. Mr. Sutherland was first elected to the House of Commons at the general elections of 1900, and re-elected in 1904. On the 11th of January he was elected speaker of the house, in which position his gracious and kindly ways won for him the respect of every member.

U. S. ELECTIONS. New York, Nov. 7.—Charles E. Hughes has been elected governor of New York by a plurality of 65,192. Hearst carried all five boroughs and the Bronx with a plurality of nearly 72,000.

The election returns to date indicate that the Republican candidates have been elected by a good round majority, and the stock market should reflect the victory. The technical position of the market is very strong, as the weaker holders of securities are pretty well out of their holdings. The south is a rangly democratic. Illinois and Indiana went overwhelmingly Republican. North Dakota is in doubt; South Dakota is solidly Republican.

St. Paul, Nov. 7.—Johnson is re-elected governor by an increased majority, the returns indicate his election by about 40,000. Johnson's vote will be larger than that two years ago. The total vote is considerably smaller than in 1904.

Milwaukee, Nov. 7.—The open state ticket held by Gov. Davidson, swept the state by an estimated plurality of at least 40,000 over Aylward.

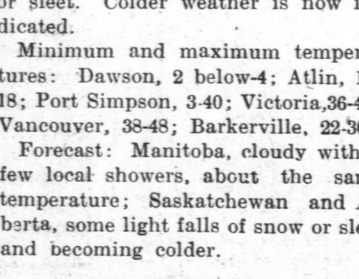
