

## Another Eye-Opener From Watchman

Morris and Morrison Show Up in Their True Light.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir.—The "ratters rang" with high faluting speeches on Agriculture when Morris assumed power, we had big expectations which proved an excuse for incompetents like Downey and Devereaux to draw thousands of dollars from the people, every thing was going with a bang. But lo, what do we see in the Trade Review to-day, nothing less than a notice from the Agricultural Board that owing to the failure in crops there will be no exhibition held this year.

Would anyone wonder that providence has taught us a lesson, taught us to use our intelligence in selecting our rulers, for by their extravagance they seem to have brought a curse on the country. And why should it be otherwise, how can we expect better luck? When men like the Minister of Justice are looked upon as nothing more than baseless land grabbers. What can we expect when the Government condones such pilfering and warns him with a wink of the eye, not to do it again? What prosperity can we look for, when the Premier of the country keeps such an individual in his executive. Whereas if he desired to keep the standard of justice high in the opinion of the people he would fire Morrison from the position of Minister of Justice immediately. But he is afraid to say boo to Morrison because he is afraid he will put the Protestant people of this country against him. But I can tell Morris that the Protestant people of this country stand for justice though the heavens fall. Morris and Morrison are galling Catholics and Protestants alike, it is the game of "you scratch me and I'll scratch you," and they think by appealing to the people in a religious appeal that they will manage to carry the country again. But the schoolmaster is abroad and the people have their eyes opened. There is about as much religion in Morris or Morrison as there is in a timber deal. Therefore I warn both Morris and Morrison that that kind of a game is over and thank God we have become enlightened enough not to be swayed by appeals to our religious feelings. They say that Sir Robert Bond never went around among the people like Morris and think they can arouse sympathy for Morris and hatred for Bond, or that score. But the people are asking themselves what good are we receiving from the codder in general. They know that Sir Robert Bond could never play the part of a hoaxer he was and is too much of a straight forward man for that. And the Morris's jumping-jack excursions may count for something with the giddy ones of a district, the men of good common sense place the proper value on it and look upon it as an insult to their intelligence. What the people of the north should do is to ask him a few straight questions when he arrives amongst them. Ask him why we have to pay forty cents duty on every dollar's worth of dry goods we purchase. Ask him why we have to pay a dollar and a half duty on a barrel of pork. Ask him why we have to pay a dollar duty on a barrel of beef. Ask him why we have to pay thirty three cents duty on a dollar's worth of tea. Ask him why we pay three cents duty on biscuits and still the two bakeries in town can pay Renne thousands of dollars to keep his bakery closed up. Ask him why we have to pay three and a half cents duty on every pound of butter coming into the country in order to protect men who contribute to his election expenses. Ask him what he has done to improve the condition of the Lunatic Asylum and the Poor House. Those are only a few of the questions to hurl at Morris and hurl them at him and at him and make him answer them. Ask him about John Crosbie's and Piccott's record in the Court House. Ask him how much money he drew from the chest for the past three years. Arriving in your settlement with a nice smile and promising anything from a needle to an anchor is not good enough. We in St. John's know that game and we warn the men of the north to beware of the slimy politician of the How are you and How are all the Home brand. ## Visiting the Wilhelmina.

Yesterday hundreds of people visited the S. S. Wilhelmina which is on Dry Dock. Permanent repairs to her will cost, it is estimated, approximately \$50,000.00. As already alluded to in the Telegram the ship has been stripped of all her moveable fittings, her engines have been injured. This work was done by parties who boarded her for salvage while she was beached at St. Mary's, but who had no right whatever to do so and the case will finish in the courts.

## Cable News.

**Special Evening Telegram.** SYDNEY, N.S.W., Sept. 8.

The Australian Naval College will be erected at Jervis Bay, a convenient inlet, not far south of Sydney. Here, in addition to class rooms, laboratories and all other college equipment, will be barracks, recreation rooms, staff quarters and extensive power refrigerating plant. The scheme, when in full working order, will see 150 Australian young naval officers studying at the College. Midshipmen and cadets on passing the required examination are to be entered at the age of thirteen. The expense will be paid by the Government, which will even provide pocket money. The college term is four years.

**Special Evening Telegram.** TORONTO, Sept. 8.

The Methodist General Conference officers have had a crisis precipitated upon them by the receipt of a telegram from Dr. Woodworth, who, two months ago, was sent to England to recruit a hundred preachers from theological colleges for work in Western Canada, where the supply is exhausted. Dr. Woodworth announces that he has been scarcely able to secure a score of men.

**Special Evening Telegram.** BOSTON, Sept. 8.

Vice-President Sherman is reported to be in poor health, and may have to decline the nomination. It is reported here that the National Committee will name a Massachusetts republican for vice-President. Curtis Guild, Jr., Ambassador to Russia, is mentioned.

**Special to Evening Telegram.** DUNDREE, Sept. 8.

Several members of the British Association attending a suffragette meeting, and condemned pump feeding for female prisoners. Dr. Halliburton, of King's College, London, said that pump feeding, even of criminals, would not be tolerated if statesmen knew what was its horror and disgust, apart from the physical injury, which made it a punishment recalling the worst days of mediæval cruelty.

**Special Evening Telegram.** LOULGATE, France, Sept. 8.

Garros the aviator, has eclipsed the old world's record for altitude, by about 2461 feet, ascending in a monoplane to a height of 16,240 feet. The previous record of 13,779 feet was made in Vienna by Csakay, the Austrian aviator.

**Special Evening Telegram.** MONTREAL, Sept. 8.

The Allan liner, Hungarian, bound from Liverpool to Montreal, is fast ashore on the South Ledge at Centre Coeur. Two steamers have gone to her assistance.

The Suffragettes raided the grounds of King George's Highland Castle, last night. The King is residing here during the shooting season. A strong force of police are in attendance. The women, however, succeeded in outwitting the guards, and left signs of their exploit in the shape of purple colored flags bearing the words—"Votes for women means peace for cabinet ministers," all around His Majesty's private Golf Links. They returned afterwards and took away the flags.



## Nfld. Man Devoured by Bear in Woods at Ingonish.

While on His Way to Work Twelve Days Ago He is Believed to Have Met Horrible Death—No Tidings of Him Has Been Heard.

Missing from his home at North Bay, Ingonish, Victoria County, and believed to have been devoured by a bear, is the belief of the people of Ingonish concerning the fate of a young man named Barnes, who disappeared from his home on Friday, August 23rd, just twelve days ago today.

Barnes, who is a young man of about thirty-five years of age, went to Ingonish from some part of Newfoundland about 6 or 7 years ago, and a few years later married a Miss Hardy, of North Bay, where she resides with their two small children. Some eighteen months ago, it is said, the unfortunate young man showed signs of mental aberration, but was always able to attend to his work, which was generally about the fishing grounds or in the factories. For the past year or so he was employed by Mr. J. K. McLeod, and on the day on which he disappeared he had worked the whole of the forenoon in the latter's employ. When the noon hour came Barnes walked to his home, about a mile distant, and after partaking of his dinner, he left on return to the factory. To his wife and children he seemed as usual, and there was nothing to denote that anything unusual was wrong.

However, that was the last seen of the young man. That he has met an untimely death there is not the slightest doubt, and that he is the victim of one of the ravenous bears that are said to invest the woods in Victoria county is the general belief of the oldest inhabitants of the place. This feeling is strengthened by the fact that Sam Jackson, of Ingonish, one of the oldest and best trappers in Cape Breton, while in the woods on the day the unfortunate man left home, was startled by the strange sounds which he heard coming from a spot in the forest that would be traversed by Barnes on his way to work. These sounds, it is said, resembled very much those of the bear, and the accompanying noises heard by the veteran trapper were of such a kind that Mr. Jackson was greatly unnerved, so much so, indeed, that he was compelled to take to his bed for several days.

A searching party was instituted when the news of Barnes' disappearance went out, but despite the most vigilant hunt no tidings of the man has since been heard, and it is now conceded by all that the poor fellow was overtaken by one of the above forest denizens, and being unarmed and unable to successfully battle for his life, he died in the attempt.—North Sydney Herald, Sept. 4, 1912.

## Brutally Treated

Saturday night two Norwegian seamen, belonging to the whaler Lloydsen, who were celebrating, were attacked by several "townies" on Bowring's and brutally treated. The Treaty Shore is disgusted with the Reid Coastal Service. No notice was given the residents about taking off the Solway or cutting off the Home at Battle Harbor. The service has given no satisfaction. Mr. Coaker was held up nine days on the coast through the bungling of the service. He held several splendid meetings and was accorded a splendid reception. He says the officials were notified by Mott of the Premier's visit and were asked to get up a reception for him. He reports the fishery from August a blank, and the hook and line fishery on the Treaty Shore as the worst for twenty years. There is no bait anywhere, with no fish catching. Weather was never worse. All the dry fish in Green Bay has been sold at \$5.80 and \$6. Labrador fish is being purchased in Green Bay at \$4 and a considerable quantity has been shipped. Cod oil is very scarce, the large proportion of it has been disposed of. The fishermen are grumbling about Morris's failure to provide bait depots as requested by the F.P.U. two years ago, and the prospects of even a fair fall's catch is very poor.

## Fisherman Astray in Boat.

PICKED UP AT PETTY HARBOUR.

Yesterday morning a message was received in the city from Petty Harbour to the effect that a man named Raftus, who had been adrift in a small row boat, was picked up there the day previous. Raftus is a fisherman from the North Battery, and about 60 years of age. He left home on Friday evening last for the fishing grounds in company with several other boats. While proceeding to the Cape Shore grounds some of Raftus's companions knew that a gale was approaching and decided to turn back; meanwhile advising Raftus to do likewise, warning him he would be swamped. He disregarded the warning and continued rowing in the direction he was going. The boat Raftus was in had just been out of sight from his comrades, who were rowing with might and main towards the shore, when a deceptive north-easter sprang up. As the night advanced the wind blew harder and harder but there was no sign of Raftus, who acted in so foolhardy a manner. His friends began to give him up as they knew that his chances of reaching the land were slim. Enquiries were made at various places but no one had seen him. After being adrift all night in an open boat, exposed to the sea and getting the full force of a north east gale, by a kind act of Providence Raftus was picked up off Petty Harbor on Saturday by two residents of the place where he received careful attendance and this morning he was driven to the city not looking much the worse for his terrible experience.

## A Working-man Injured.

A laborer named Morrissey, met with a painful accident on Saturday by having his right foot crushed. A motor car was being discharged from the S. S. Stephano at Harvey's wharf and a number of workmen were engaged at it. When landing the machine on the wharf Morrissey, who was helping get his foot caught underneath the car and one of his toes was crushed to a pulp. He was driven home and attended by a doctor.

## Investigation of English Tragedy Clears Mystery.

Man Shoots Wife and Children—Had Two Wives—They Were Sisters and Both are Claimed to Have Been Married to Him.

A terrible crime, involving the loss of the lives of no fewer than five persons, was perpetrated at Eastbourne, a man, three children, and a woman being found dead in the bedroom of a house in the Upperton district says a London paper. All of them had been shot. The bedroom had been set on fire and the bodies were so charred as to be almost unrecognisable. The remains so far as can be officially ascertained are those of "Captain" Robert Hicks Murray, thirty-two, Edith Matilda Murray, his wife, twenty-six, Vera Murray, eighteen months; Stanley Murray, three and Winifred Francis Murray, two.

When knowledge of the tragedy first leaked out the police were confronted with a veritable maze of "mysteries;" but many of them have, apparently, been elucidated by information since supplied to the authorities.

The tragedy is that of two sisters "married" to the same man—"Captain" Robert Hicks Murray. By each he had issue. The husband is supposed to have gathered both families under one roof, afterwards seeking to exterminate both wives and their children. Then, in an endeavor to cover up the crime, he set fire to the house.

### WIFE AND CHILD KILLED.

It appears that the real wife, Edith, and her child were killed on Aug. 17, and that the bodies were placed in a locked bedroom. When the other victims were despatched all the bodies were placed in a row, petrol was poured over the room in which they lay, the murderer setting fire to the house, and as the flames rose he committed suicide with a revolver shot.

Florence Murray, a sister of Edith Murray, and mother of two of the murdered children, escaped to give the alarm. She was bleeding from serious bullet wounds, and lies in the hospital at Eastbourne.

Murray first took Florence and her two children to Meads, a quiet neighborhood, two miles outside Eastbourne, where he so effectually concealed their identity that neither the name of Mackie nor Hicks Murray was known to the tradespeople, to the postal authorities, or to the police.

Next he took a house at Enys-road for a month, and brought his wife Edith and her baby there. They were seen by no one except the charwoman and other "helps."

On the afternoon of Aug. 17 at 3 o'clock, when the "help" left, the mother and child were alive and well. In the evening Florence and her two children were brought to the house from Meads, and he informed her that he had not the use of the whole of the premises, and that the owner of the apartments. One of the rooms indicated was that where the police afterwards discovered blood marks, and in which someone had attempted to wash his or her hands in a pan of water.

### BROUGHT SECOND WIFE HOME.

It was scarcely possible to doubt that when he brought the woman and her children to the house in the evening his murdered wife and infant were dying in the closed apartment.

Inquiries revealed that there was a family of four sisters named Paler, Edith and Florence lost touch with the other members of the family through their relationships with Murray. Some two years ago Robert Murray met and married Edith Paler, despite the fact that he had previously lived with Florence at Marjorie-grove. His affections appeared to have swung from one to the other, for some time after marrying Edith he was again living with Florence, by whom he had two children. He lived with Florence at Clapham, and she claimed to have been married to him by Scottish law. His wife, Edith, visited him frequently, and even, according to the accounts of neighbors, made clothes for Florence's children. Relations between the sister-wives were friendly, though two separate establishments were maintained by the husband.

Then a year ago the wife Edith gave birth to a child. This was six months after the birth of Florence's daughter, Vera. It appears that from this point the sisters became rivals and enemies. The vicissitudes of the two households are unknown. But on July 24, Murray and his wife Edith, and her child took a furnished house in one of the best parts of Eastbourne. There they apparently lived in peace until Monday.

At the inquest a sister of the two women was asked if she ever heard Florence say that she went through a ceremony of marriage with Murray, and she replied in the affirmative. It took place at the house at Clapham Common under the Scottish form.

Those who met Murray speak of him as a man of soldierly bearing. James McKinnon Murray, of Callow Lands,

near Watford a cousin of the dead man, stated the relations between them were strained.

"I have seen very little of him lately," said Mr. McKinnon, "and we did not get on very well together. The last time I saw him was just before Christmas, when he called on me to ask me if I could negotiate a mortgage on some property that he told me he owned in India." The interview, according to Mr. Jas. Murray, did not end satisfactorily. His cousin seemed to be very excited, and the upshot of it was that he left the house and declared that he would never come again.

"He was a man of very excitable temperament," said Mr. James Murray. "I know very little about his matrimonial arrangements, but when he came to me last he said, 'I think I have made a mistake in getting married. I am not a man who is suited to that life. Women amuse me but after a time they bore me to death.' He was at one time, I know an orderly to a major of the Seaforth Highlanders, and he had also served in a similar capacity in Hongkong and India, but, so far as I know, he was never a non-commissioned officer. On one occasion he showed me his photographs in the uniform of a Highland regiment."

Murray had been described as a one-time captain in the Scots Greys and Gordon Highlanders and at the inquest a relative of the woman who had perished said she had been informed he was a captain in the Greys. In the certificate of marriage of Edith and himself he was described as a bachelor of independent means, while in the birth certificate of one of his children he was described as a retired captain of the Gordon Highlanders.




