

The Fish Trade.

During the month just closed shore fish prices held out well in the local shore will endure at \$11 and \$12 in the local at least. There is, it must be remembered only a limited quantity of this quality and it is quite likely that the value will increase in in the coming winter.

Whilst Operto has been carrying a big stock of Newfoundland fish the past two months, the markets of the Mediterranean have so far received very little of our fish of 1919 catch. which leads to the belief that prices will improve later in the season. Now as to soft Labrador, the proportion is one to cause more doubt. There is certainly a very large catch this year, we estimate not much less than half a million quintals.

yet come into St. John's, which is an nusual circumstance for this time of the year. The price which opened at \$10.50 in September declined gradually every week till it got down to \$8.00.
