One of the best known crooks in Montreal twenty years ago was Rob-et W. (Rasor) Fenton. He was of

irio of brothers who were "known to the police," "Razor" appeared in the lourt of King's Bench for sentence nore than once and was sent to peni-entary for picking pockets, for that vas his trade, and he was exceedingly proficient at it. On one occasion he was charged with picking the pocket of a well-known Outremont farmer of several thousands of dollars, the proceeds of a sale of land in what is now a thickly populated part of Outremont. He was tried and convicted and given a long term. It was a sad scene in the court, for the convicted man plain-ly showed his distress. He was not deserted, however, for his relatives, women folks, supported by friends, came up to the prisoner's dock and kissed him bood-bye. Then he stepped back, to be taken to prison for a number of years. He was a youth then, but the terrible lesson was ig nored and he kept on getting into couble in cities all over America.

Years of hard living began to pall on "Razor" in time, however, and he came at last to realize that the way of the transgressor is hard. The picking might seem easy, but there was always the sequel, which was frequently a trip to jail or penitentiary.

"Razor" Fenton has reformed after

all these years and is now a preacher in the United States. He is telling young men that it is both foolish and unprofitable to follow the crooked path. The game is not worth the can-dle. He should know.





Light Travelled 186,000 Miles a Second

The record long distance for stellar bjects is held at present by a faint which is 220,000 light years from the earth. This cluster is known only by When the human race was still in also been journeying onward at the rate of about 1,000,000 miles a day and has covered a distance of 14 light years. Every 15,750 years the sun covers a distance of one light year, which is equal to about a trillion miles. The nearest star, Alpha Centauri, is four and one-third light years away, and the brightest star, Sirius, is 31/2 light years from the earth. So our solar system has travwhich separates us from the nearest stars while the light from this cluster

has been speeding toward us. The method of measuring the distances and diameters of the globular tar clusters was developed by Dr. Harlow Shapley, formerly of the Mount Wilson observatory, now director of the Harvard College observatory. Dr. Shapley has made a detailed study of practically all of the known globular clusters, about 70 in number. The results of his investigations enormous distances from the earth. Even the nearest, Omega Centauri, is more than 22,000 light years away and many of the clusters are nearly as distant as N. G. C. 7006.

Measurements of the distances of the globular clusters are obtained through a determination of the apparent brightness of giant variable stars that exist in all of the clusters. The brightness of the giant red and giant white variable stars is very accurately known. So, when the apparent brightness of these stars has been found, the distance of the cluster they are in is obtained from a very simple relationship connecting the apparent brightness and the absolute magnitude or intrinsic brightness. In fact, now that the method has been perfected, there is less labor entailed in determining the distance of a globular star cluster many thousand light years away than in finding the distance of the nearest stars by the trigonometric method of direct measurement, and the results are proportionately more accurate. It has been estimated that the errors in the values given for the distances of the globular clusters do not exceed one fifth of the measured

All of the globular clusters consist of thousands of suns, many of which are several hundred times more brilliant than our own sun. Indeed a star no brighter than the sun would be entirely invisible if located in one of these clusters. The diameters of some of the globular clusters are so great that light would take several hundred years to cross them.

In the most powerful telescope N. G. C. 7006 appears visually as a nebulous star, but a seven-minute exposure on a fast photographic plate has shown about 200 stars in this cluster that are well within the limit of visibility of the greatest telescopes .--Kansas City Star.

Tragic End of a Painter.

On Tuesday, June 1, 1841, Sir David Wilkie, one of Britain's celebrated painters, died on board the Oriental, in Gibraltar Bay. Queen Victoria had honored him by sitting for his first splendid picture of Her Majesty's "First Council," and he had gone to Constantinople by her orders to paint a portfait of the Sultan of Turkey. But during his return in this vessel, after it had touched at Malta and at Gibraltar, he was taken suddenly ill and expired, at 56 years of age. The Governor of Gibraltar could not allow the corpse to be brought on shore, and it was therefore committed to a watery grave. Some who use the Church of England prayer Book may never have noticed that it. provides for such cases. Sir David Wilkie was a Scotsman, Born near Cupar, in Fifeshire, in 1785, son of a minister of its established church, but like many of his countrymen, he came to England in 1805, and while for health's sake visiting Italy and Spain, he studied there the art in which, previously and afterwards, he was so distinguished.



LONDON PRESS OPINION.

LONDON, June 1. Colonial Secretary Churchill's stateent on Ireland in the Commons yesterday made a deep impression. The emphasis, which he laid upon the extreme gravity of the situation, and the suggestion of the possibility of Great Britain reoccupying Irish territory is featured by this morning's newspapers as the opening of an ugly ading to incalculable trouble. The hopeful note he sounded in conclusion, receives some recognition. The Times says "that Great Britain is in the presence of one of the greatest crises of her history. She is faced with an anarchic movement, similar in some features to that which submerged the Russian Empire." Confident that an overwheming preponderance of British opinion supports the Anglo-Irish Tr.aty, the newspaper demands that the government "fulfil" their trust both as regards the South and North of Ireland. "Ireland knows where Great Britain stands," it adds. and in the light of that knowledge, must chose swiftly whether she shall take the liberty so unequivocally offered by the Treaty, or accept the doom that inexorably awaits the retion." The Daily Telegraph insists that "British carnet abandon Ireland to anarchy, or hand it over to an exto anarchy, or hand it over to an extra legal junts of rebels or Republicans." The Daily Chroncle says "nothing in the speech is better than its concluding passage, wherein Mr. Churchill insisted upon the wisdom of carrying out the Treaty on the British side most carefully in all its points, so that we should give it every chance of succeeding."



Giant Salt Mine is 7th Wonder of U.S.

The ancient world has seven won ers. We to-day, if we look about us, can find an equal number within the limits of the United States. Niagare Falls, the Grand Canyon of the Colorado, the Yellowstone National Park, the Yosemite Valley, the Cliff Dwellings of the Southwest, the Petrified Forest of Arisona—those will do for

The seventh has never been seen and never will be seen, by anybody, because it is far underground. Nevertheless, it is a first-class marvel. It is the greatest hed of salt in the world, averaging at least 200 feet in thickness and extending over-or perhaps one should say under—an area of 100,000

The northern end of this salt bed, in central Kansas, has been known for many years, but not until recently was the fact ascertained that it extends thence in a southwesterly direction through northwest Oklahoma, northwest Texas and eastern New Mexico. This discovery has been made by numerous borings-not for salt, but for oil, gas and water. This vast bed of salt extends at least 650 miles from north to south and 150 to 250 from east to west. In many parts it is more than 300 feet thick and in some places its thickness exceeds 700 feet. Assuming an average thickness of only 200 feet, the bed must contain at least 30,-000 billion tons of salt!

It was formed by the evaporation during long ages of a shallow sea, which in very ancient times covered all that part of the United States. The deposit has great economic value. the salt being easy to mine as it is mined even now in Kansas) by the simple expedient of boring two holes and forcing water down one of them. The water comes up out of the other hole laden with salt, and is evaporated

It is thought that valuable deposits of potash salts may perhaps be found locally in this great basin of saline accumulation. — Philadelphia Public

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
