The Government of Canada not having been invited to send a representative to the Lausanne Conference and not having participated in the proceedings of the conference, either directly or indirectly, and not being for this reason a signatory to treaty; on be-half of Canada my Ministers do not feel they are in a position to recomthe Peace Treaty with Turkey and the convention thereto. In these words the Governor General in a message addressed to the Secretary of State for Colonies on March 24, 1924, defined the attitude of the King Government to-wards the Lausanne Treaty. EIGHT MISSING IN MIKADO DIS-ASTER.

HALIFAX, N.S., May 26. Eight of those who were on board the Grimsby trawler Mikado when she went ashore on the west side of Forchu Island, Cape Breton on Sunday night are believed to be dead and eight have been rescued, according to work received here to-night by the local agent of the Department of Marine and Fisheries. The tug Ocean Eagle which reached the scene of the disaster about nine o'clock this morning, has arrived at Canso with seven survivors and with the body of one of the crew who died while being taken from the wreck to the tug Six bodies were found on the beach near the scene of the wreck. One man thought to have been a passenger on the Mikado was rescued by the lightkeeper's hoat, and the only other one of sixteen believed to have been on the ill-fated craft is unaccounted for Sixteen men believed to be Norwegian sailors rescued by the Ocean Eagle were in such an exhausted state that they were unable even to tell their own names, but within a few days it is thought they will be none the worse for their experience,


Australian

Remains, consisting of bones and teeth, representing the largest marine reptile ever discovered in Australia have been discovered by the director of the museum at Queensland. Authorities agree that at least several million years have elapsed since these deposits, known as the Rolling Downs formation near Hughender, were laid down in early Cretaceous times. The fossil represents part of the anterior portion of the lower jaw. with the right and left sides united on a strong beak-like formation. The nearest relative of this Queensland giant is probably the pleiosaurs grandis, from the Kimmeridge clay of Dorset, England. The pleiosaurs were enormous marine reptiles, attaining about 50ft. in length, with large skulls, short necks, and paddle-like limbs. The Queensland specimen is so distinct from the pleiosaurs known from Europe and America that it has been named Kronosaurus Queens-landicus. 


