The following is the account, sent over the cable, of the great boat race between Oxford and Cambridge Universities on Saturday last.

As the two crews pulled out into the stream for the starting point, at Putney Bridge, the betting was decidedly in favor of Cambridge, and odds of four and five to three were freely offered and taken by the admirers of the "dark blue."

The preliminary arrangements being completed, the boatmen stripped for the contest, took their respective positions without any delay, and upon the signal both crews took water almost simultaneously. Oxford sculling, however, a trilling lead, Cambridge was not at all slow, and seemed to take things more coolly. Both crews settled well down to their work after a few strokes, and a spirited struggle ensued to Bishop's Creek, which resulted in favor of Cambridge, who, amid the shouts of their friends on the banks of the river, seemed to be able to hold the Oxford's boat well astern.

Between Grass Wharf and Rose Cottage, Goldie accelerated his stroke and gradually increased his speed, till Cambridge led almost a length, both coxswains being evidently much embarrassed by the blinding snow cutting them in the face. Off the Soap Works the Oxford increased their efforts, and amid shouts of "Well pulled, Houlton!" the stroke of the Oxford boat showed nearly even with the Cambridge. Both boats were keeping a very steady stroke; but there seemed to be more strength in the Cambridge crew, and they gradually but surely drew to the front, so that at Hammersmith Bridge they led a full length. After rowing some little distance, Oxford again made another effort as they came to Corey Reach, to deprive Cambridge of their lead. Thanks to their excellent rowing and Hall's fine steering, from his knowledge of the course, and favoured by Robert's wild and erratic steering, the rivals were almost on even terms as they passed Chiswick.

Soon after passing Chiswick, the rivals entered upon the fourth mile. The excitement was intense, for here a few minutes must decide whether Cambridge could hold her position or be compelled to succumb to the gallant efforts of the Oxford crew. The struggle told on Oxford, and although they had almost succeeded in making things even, they could not hold their position; Goldie calling on his men again to increase their stroke, as also did Houlton, the latter running as high as 42. In racing from Chiswick Church to Barnes Bridge the struggle between the two crews was a series of severe and continuous "spurts," during which Cambridge again increased the lead, so that as they passed under the bridge they were fully a length in front. After one more effort from Houlton, Oxford settled down to a steady stroke, Cambridge increasing the lead so that when she passed the ship at Mortlake she had a clear length and a half.

The winning crew was received with the wildest cheering, which, taken up anew, soon reached Putney. Even there, in the vast shout, the only distinguishable word was "Cambridge!" The Oxford crew were in bit a very few moments behind, and although their friends were scarcely less hearty in their welcome, "the eight" felt that they had little interest in the shouts which filled the air. Many of the partisans of the defeated crew believed firmly to the last moments of the race that Oxford would to-day regain her former prestige, and recklessly scattered their money on a lost cause. It is claimed by the friends of Oxford, with a good degree of fairness, that the alterations made in the crew only a short time ago, in consequence of the temporary retirement of Lesley, militated to a very great extent against the chances of their proving victors on the present occasion. Considering all the disadvantages under which the Oxford crew labored, they made a gallant though fruitless struggle for victory over the powerful and well-organized crew sent up by Cambridge.

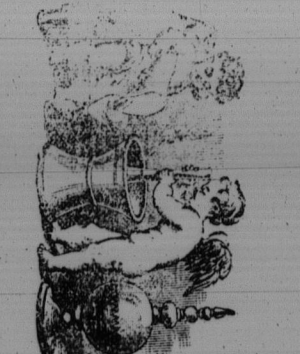
