case occupied the court four full days, and was brought to a close on Saturday evening. The facts are as follows:—In the plaintiff's bill it was set forth that previous to April, 1844, John Allan, his late father-in-law, resided in the Township of York, in the County of York. At the same time, defendant Dunn, another son-in-law to said Allan, lived on the South half of 21, in the 2nd con., Puslinch; that, at the instigation of Dunn, Allan was induced to purchase the lot in dispute, being the South half of lot 20, in last mentioned concession. In this purchase, which was made on 3rd July, 1843, from one John Hoggan, the original locate of the Crown, for \$30, Dunn acted as agent to Allan, and, in preparing the assignment of Hoggan's interest, Dunn's name was inserted instead of Allan's. About the time of such purchase, Dunn visited Allan in York, handed him the criginal location ticket, and the assignment lately obtained from Hoggan. At this time Allan did not discover that Dunn's name was in the assignment. The papers were laid away in a box, and the \$30 paid to Dunn.

In April 1844, Allan, accompanied by the plaintiff, moved on lot 20, and remained in actual occupation until May, 1851, when he removed to the township of Albion, to reside with a son, having, in the meantime, erected a house and barn, two out-buildings, a workshop, and done some clearing and fenoing. Allan made a will in 1850, devising all his real and personal estate to his wife for life, then to his grandson, John C. Allan. When he left in 1851 he gave up possession of the lot to the plaintiff, who by himself and his tonants retained coatinous possession until Angust 1871.—Allan died on the 14th May, 1862, and his wife in the December following. In 1856 the plaintiff obtained a power of attorney from Allan, authorising the former to procure a re-conveyance from Dunn, With a view of enforcing this, the plaintiff retained Messrs McKenzie & Geeddes, then practising law at Elora, who failed, however, to get the matter rectified. Sometime in 1861, d however, to get the matter rectified. Sometime in 1861, defendant Dunn having no papers in connection with the title of the disputed lot, and at the same time contending that it belonged to him, procured another transfer from Hoggan. In 1871, James A. Evans, while occupying under the plaintiff, connived with Dunn to sell the lot to the defendant, Hogg, the consideration being \$200, which was equally divided between said Evans and Dunn. The Chancellor in giving judgment considered the plaintiff had made out his ease, but reserved judgment as to the sufficiency of the proof of the execution of Allan's will—a link in plaintiff's title.

The Body of Horace Greeley Lying in State.

PREPARATIONS FOR HIS FUNERAL

The scene at the City Hail, New York, on Tuesday, where Mr. Greeley's body lay in state, has had no parallel since the day the body of President Lincoln lay within its walls. The building itself has a sombre and mouraful appearance. Flags were at half-mast, pillars were enfolded in black serge, while festoons of the same material drooped over the portice and enframed the windows. Fronting the new post-office, on the balcony, shrouded in mourning emblems, and in the beavy folds of the United States banner, was the portrait of Horace Greeley. Below was the inscription, "We remember with pride his busy life." People continued to pour in all day and till ten o'clock at night. The coffin was black with heavy silver handles. At the head was a portrait of Mr. Greeley, as he appeared in life, and a large chaplet of taber roses. The soffin hore the inscription, "Horace Greeley, born February Brd, 1811, died November 29th, 1872," and was ornamented with festoons of natural fern leaves. At the head was a second inscription, "I know that my Redeemer liveth," and yet another at the foot worked in violete—"The city mourns our loss."

The citizens of Brooklyn will erect a \$25,000 monument to the late Mr. Greeley in Prospect Park. All the municipal corporations in the vicinity of New Yo'k will officially attend the funeral. A New Found Race.

A New Found Race.

Not far eastward of the source of the
Little Colorado, on the great trail from
Fort Mohave, on the Colorado, to Albuquerque, on the Rio Grande, and over a
day's journey from the northern extremity of the great diamond range now attracting attention, there are ruins of
Aztee settlements and three villages inhabited by Indians. They are called the
Zuni villages. Each contains probably
2,000 people. An intelligent officer, who
has been among them, thus describes
them:

modest fullness of their dress. They skirts of black woollen cloth, and a gracefully folded over the breast. e goods are of their own make. their houses are clean, and their ing is not to be despised. e Zun Indians are more than half

tribled. They are essentially a pastoral people. They have fields of corn, wheat, and vegetables. They have flocks of sheep and goats. They roise horses, horned cattle, and asses. They correl their stock at night in high stone enclosures. They use all their animals for food, but a fatted ass is their favorite dish. They keep fowls. They spin their own wool and weave it. They have a grand frolic at threshing time. The grain in sheaf is taken to a broad, flat, rocky place, and thirty or forty horsemen canter and caper about on this threshing floor till the grain is well separated. It is then winnowed by raking the straw and tossing the chaff in the wind. After this they close the day with a general horse race, after the fashnon of our agriculty al fairs.

As our diamond-hunters are about to people the neighboring country it is interesting to know that these Zuni Indians are friendly to white men, and that supplies can be had there. The valley of the Rio Grande is well settled with Mexican farmers and herdsmen. These and the Zunis will make common cause with the miners against the plundering Apaches.

The Zuni Indians never make war of aggression. They stand on the defensive. But cutside Indians fear them, because of their superior organization and means of defense. Therefore their quietude is seldem disturbed.

The well-watered soil is a dark gravelly loam. They have at all times excellent pasturage, to the use of which travellers entering the diamond region by the way of Santa Fe and Albuquerque are made welcome, on payment of a moderate charge. The houses of these Zuni villages are well brill to stone. They are three stories high. Each ascending story recedes, so as to make a terrace in front.
