The Cholera, Fitting out of the "Tigress"—An Attempt to Scuttle her. dt

New York, July 9.—Crop reports from Iowa are very favourable, recent storms doing but little damage in that State. dt

An Evansville, Ind., despatch reports that a destructive tornado passed over Southern Indiana and Northern Kentucky to-day, doing much damage to houses, fences, crops, and timber. dt

New York, July 9.—A Montgomery, Alabama, despatch says the statements in northern papers that cholera is raging here is false. It has only appeared at two points in Alabama, Huntsville and Birmingham, and has disappeared at the former and reported on the decrease at the latter. Three sunstrokes—one fatal—at New Orleans yesterday. dt

There was seven cholera deaths in Cincinnati and three in Memphis to-day. dt

Thirty of the best and most experienced men on board the receiving ship have been selected for the crew of the Tigress, announced to sail positively on Saturday. dt

The Tigress will carry 250 tons of coal, and if necessary will get a new supply at St. Johns. By this evening all supplies of provisions will be shipped. dt

The total amount of provisions carried will be ration for forty men for two years. An unsuccessful attempt has been made by some rascal to scuttle the Tigress. dt

In the House of Commons, July 8th, Mr. Henry Richard, member for Merthyr Tydvil, and Secretary of the London Peace Society, moved that in the opinion of the House the Government should communicate with foreign powers for the purpose of improving the international law, and with the view of establishing an arbitration as a permanent resort for the settlement of differences between nations. dt

Eighteen Norwegian belonging to the German American Navigation Company's service, who were left on Spitzbergen were found dead by the party which went to their relief. dt

Further Particulars of the Wreck, The following additional details of the wreck of the lost steamer can be handed:—The City of Washington started from Liverpool on the 24th of June, and from leaving that port until the vessel struck, neither sun nor stars had been seen, so that it was impossible to obtain observations during the entire passage, in order to ascertain the position of the ship. dt

When the steamer struck about 2 p.m., on Saturday, the fog was so thick and so dense that no object could be seen three yards ahead. dt

Every body on board supposed that the vessel was proceeding on her way to New York, and the only difficulty to the contrary was the heavy grating round the vessel was driven over the rough bottom of the shoals, where she now lies. dt

The City of Washington was one of the oldest steamers of the Inman line. She was built in Glasgow, Scotland, in 1856, and has been in constant service almost ever since. dt

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Credit Valley Railway.

To the Editor of The Daily Mercury, Sir,—As a ratepayer of Erin, and one interested in its prosperity, and I would also say in the construction of the Credit Valley Railway, I feel it my duty to reply to an editorial on the same in The Mercury of the 2nd inst.; which is calculated, in the highest degree, to mislead and prejudice the minds of the people who are to be affected by this enterprise. dt

You say that you did not refer to this scheme for the sake of offering opposition or of depriving any portion of the county of railway advantages, &c., &c., but for the purpose of warning the farmers and others against blindly voting away their money. dt

Now, Mr. Editor, this is all very well, and those who are not able to think for themselves will, no doubt, be very thankful to you for any advice you give them, but your misrepresentations and concealment of facts in the article alluded to are so plain as to convince most of your readers that you are governed by other motives than those of a kind counsellor. dt

1st. You say that Halton has already granted \$50,000, while you cannot be ignorant of the fact that that county has granted \$75,000, and the town of Milton \$30,000, making in all \$135,000 for the construction of the road through its bounds. dt

2nd. You say that the only bonuses granted between Toronto and Orangeville are \$100,000 from Toronto, and \$90,000 from the county of Peel, and Brampton. dt

You are right as regards the \$100,000 from Toronto, but you should remember that a part only of the county of Peel has granted \$70,000, the town of Brampton \$20,000; and the village of Streetville \$20,000, making in all \$210,000 for Toronto to Alton, not to Orangeville, as you say. dt

Now, Mr. Editor, this alters your figures considerably. The above bonuses, together with the aid which the Government has guaranteed, afford sufficient encouragement to the company to build the road. dt

This is clearly seen from the progress which they have already made. dt

We come now to that portion of the road which, I presume, more particularly affects those to whom you offer your kind advice. dt

You say that the bonus (\$150,000) asked from the eight municipalities in this county is large compared with other bonuses granted, and asked for. dt

Taking for granted that your route and distance are correct, it might be considered large. dt

You describe the line as running across the upper part of Erin, four miles across the north angle of Elora, five or six miles across the south part of Garafraxa to Fergus, and thence to Salem, three miles more—in all 23 miles. dt

Now, you will find that the bonus of \$150,000 covers a distance of at least 30 miles. dt

The branch to Fergus, Elora and Salem will form a junction with the branch to Orangeville—about two miles from the town line of Erin—running through the township within three-fourths of a mile of the villages of Erin, Hillsburgh and Mimosa, having stations at each of those villages, and making a distance of at least 21 miles. dt

The clerk was instructed to allocate to each congregation the amount to be paid to the General Assembly's Fund, on receipt of the necessary information. dt

Mr. Davidson reported what he had done regarding the deciding of the property in Moorefield given as a site for a new church, when his diligence was approved, and he was requested to attend to the matter. dt

DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR—This new Department will take the place of that of Secretary of State for the Provinces, and in some cases of that of Secretary of State for the Territories. dt

The duties of the office are exceedingly important. dt

The Minister of the Interior is to have the control and management of the affairs of the North West Territories; to be the Superintendent General of Indian affairs, and, as such, to have the control and management of the lands and property of the Indians of Canada; to have the control and management of all Crown Lands being the property of the Dominion, including those known as Ordnance and Admiralty Lands, and all other public lands not specially under the control of the Public Works Department, or of the Militia and Defence (and excepting also Marine Hospitals and Light-houses and land connected therewith, and St. Paul's, Sable and Portage Islands); and he is substituted for the former Commissioner of Crown Lands, as regards Ordnance and Admiralty Lands, transferred to the late Province of Canada, and lying in Ontario and Quebec. dt

All the duties given to the Secretary of State by the Dominion Lands Act, 1812, are transferred now to the Minister of the Interior. dt

The Governor-General arrived at Gaspé on Tuesday. dt

Meeting of Presbytery.

On Tuesday last the Presbytery of Guelph in connection with the Canada Presbyterian Church met in Chalmers' Church here and was duly constituted. dt

Representative Elders produced their commissions from their respective sessions, which were read and the roll made up for the ensuing year. dt

Mr. A. D. McDonald was chosen Moderator and took the chair, after which a vote of thanks was tendered to the retiring Moderator, Mr. Anderson, for his conduct in the chair during his term of office. dt

A Committee was appointed to arrange for the annual missionary meetings and sermons; Mr. Middlemiss, Convener. dt

Commissioners to the General Assembly reported their diligence in fulfilling the duties assigned them. dt

The list of vacancies, supplemented congregations, and mission stations was revised. dt

Mr. Smellie reported from the Committee appointed to superintend Students living in the bounds. dt

Mr. Cameron was appointed Convener of a Committee to make arrangements for the annual Presbyterian Sabbath School Conference which was appointed to be held in Acton. dt

Mr. Torrance reported that he had preached, by appointment, in West Puslinch and declared the pastoral charge of that congregation vacant by the death of Mr. McLean. dt

Mr. Ball reported that he had declared the pastoral charge of Caledon West vacant, on the day appointed by the Presbytery, employing a substitute for the purpose, as he was otherwise engaged in the service of the Presbytery. dt

A minute was read from the Presbytery of Toronto expressing their unwillingness to accept the charge of Caledon West after the first of October, the Presbytery of Guelph to supply it in connection with Alton till that date. dt

A Committee, Mr. McCreese Convener, was appointed to take further steps for increasing all salaries of Ministers within the bounds to a minimum of \$600. dt

A communication was read from Chalmers' Church, Wintbourne, to the effect that the congregation there was not in circumstances to pay the amount of stipend promised to their minister. dt

Delegates were heard, after which it was resolved that a Presbyterial visitation of the congregation be made on the 22nd inst., to inquire into all the circumstances. dt

The clerk was instructed to allocate to each congregation the amount to be paid to the General Assembly's Fund, on receipt of the necessary information. dt

That Fifty Thousand Dollars.

ALL RIGHT WITH "THE GLOBE."

The Tory papers have been crowing and cackling and fluttering like a full-grown poultry show over the two solitary references in the Allan correspondence to George Brown and The Globe.

"MONTREAL, 27th Feb., 1873. Mr Dean Sir, The papers which have come from New York indicate the amount of stock allotted to me as \$1,450,000. This I propose to divide in something like the following shares:—Hon. D. L. Macpherson, \$100,000; Hon. A. B. Foster, \$100,000; Hon. J. C. Abbott, \$100,000; Donald A. Smith, \$100,000; Donald McInnes, \$50,000; Andrew Allan, \$100,000; John Sheiden, \$50,000; C. S. Gzowski, \$50,000; George Brown, \$50,000; Henry Nathan, \$100,000; C. J. Brydges, \$100,000; T. McGreevy, \$50,000; H. Allan, \$50,000. Total, \$1,450,000.

"This may not be the ultimate arrangement, as I have not yet even proposed the matter to some of the gentlemen, but if I can arrange it there will not be much change.

"Please advise me at once if you consent that your name shall appear as one of the Provisional Directors, as I must send in the list to the Government without delay. Yours truly, (Signed) HUGH ALLAN."

"MONTREAL, 27th Feb., 1873. Mr Dean Sir, Since writing to you I am informed that the Hon. Geo. Brown will not be a shareholder at present, and I propose to name Mr. Howland in his place. Yours truly, (Signed) HUGH ALLAN."

We sympathise with our opponents in thus losing one of their trump cards; but after all it does not much matter to them. All they have to do is to follow their usual course—quietly ignore the most convincing proof, and go on reiterating their statements, trusting that constant repetition will drive it home. But this is a game which will only answer with the least intelligent of the community.

The remaining and only other phrase—"We are all right with The Globe,"—is easy of explanation. The intriguing with Americans was not publicly known at the time that was written; Sir Hugh believed that he could delude the country into the belief that he was organising a sound company, one that was going to honestly push the work forward; and he knew that The Globe would not incur the odium of obstructing the construction of the railway, however much it might grumble at the extravagance and recklessness displayed by the Government.

"Hit him hard; he's got no Friends."

The Toronto Sun, a Tory evening journal, has a three-column article denouncing Sir Hugh Allan in unmeasured terms. The inference intended is, of course, that whilst Sir Hugh is a black-hearted schemer, Sir John's immaculate reputation is undefiled by one speck of corruption. The force of Mr. Huntington's indictment is shown by the fact that the Tories are driven to adopt a line of defence like this.

SENATOR MACPHERSON denies positively that he told Sir Hugh Allan he had been applied to by the latter's opponents, that he ever insisted on getting \$250,000 of stock, or that he threatened opposition if he did not get it.

The town of Brantford has \$67,000 on hand, and the Examiner discusses the interesting question of its disposal. A bill granting \$70,000 to the Norfolk Railway is about to be voted on, and if it is passed that will settle the question. Should that road not be built, then the alternatives are referred to of leaving it invested at 5 per cent.; of spending it on local improvements, including \$40,000 on drainage, \$10,000 on a High School; or of applying it to the reduction of the Government debt, now \$194,000.

POSTAL CARDS.—The following notice appeared in the last Canada Gazette: From the 1st July next, the post-cards of Canada may be addressed and mailed from Canada to any place in the United States, and will be delivered there without any charge, if prepaid two cents each by affixing an ordinary one-cent Canada postage stamp in addition to the one-cent stamp impressed upon the card. Unless so prepaid, post-cards addressed to the United States will not be forwarded. Canada, prepaid two cents, will, in like manner, be delivered at their destination in Canada without further postage charge.

STRANGE ACCIDENT.—On Saturday, a locomotive, while running into the round house of the Pittsburg and Connelville Railway, ran off the track and against the principal support of the house, causing the roof to fall in, and injuring engines and railroad material to the extent of \$14,000.

A young child in Quebec had a very narrow escape from a frightful death, while playing on a gallery in the third story of the house. He lost hold of the railing and fell down, but fortunately his clothing caught in a book which projected from the lower gallery, and the child hung in this way till rescued. He sustained no injury.
