Omaha, March 24.—A telegram from Scott's Binifis, Wyoming, states that on Sunday, 22nd inst., one white man was killed, and all the horses at Code's Ranch were stolen by Indians.

Trial of Mrs. Ridley for the Murder of her Three Children. Verdict Not Guilty.

The Assizes were opened here on the 17th inst., before His Honour Judge Morrison. The oally case of interest was that of Mrs. Dorothy Ridley, who, as your readers will remember, drowned three of her children in the south branch of the River Maitland, on the lat of May, 1873, whilst labouring under a fit of insanity. She remained in gaol here for a short time, when she was sent to the London Asylum, where she remained until Thursday, when she was brought here for trial. The dector of the asylum reported here so far recovered as to be fit for trial, and en Thursday she was arraigned; she made no plea. The trial lasted about three hours. The jury after a short deliberation brought in a verdict of "Not Guilty," and a most righteous one it was.

The Puslinch By-law in Aid of the Credit Valley Railway.

We publish in our weekly this week a copy of the Puslinch by law granting a bonus of \$10,000 to the Credit Valley Railway. It will be seen that only a section of the Township is asked to vote this bonus, namely, the gore, front and rear, and all that portion of the 7th, 8th, 9th, 10th and 11th concessions, lying south of the line between lots numbers 23 and 26. The by-law sufficiently explains itself, and the rate-payers living in the section interested would do well to read carefully its provisions, and seriously to consider the feasibility and advantages of the scheme before they record their votes. The money they will vote away will come out of their own pockets, and it behoves them therefore to consider well what they are doing, and see that they get full value for the amount which the Company asks of them. Above all we would advise them to keep a sharp eye on Mr. Laidlaw, the President of the Company, who is most profuse in his promises before a by-law is carried, but after that is done intrenches himself behind his power of attorney, and snaps his fingers at those who helped to foster up his schemes.



Canadian Granges.

To the Editor of the Morcary.

Sir, —In your issue of 12th inst., there appeared a letter under the above title, which calls for a few passing remarks. At the outset let me say that I have no connection whatever with any "Grange," either Yankee or Canadian, but write simply in the interest of the farming community to which I belong. Your correspondent has two serious objections to the Granges. "1st. No such state of things exists here as led to this movement in the United States. Neither small crops, nor high freight tariff, nor exorbitant charges of middlemen and manufacture's agents." Here, however, he checks himself, and qualifies his assertions with: "No doubt in some instances these things may have happened, but our farmers are not obliged to mortgage their farms to pay running expenses. We do not farm at a dead loss. We have nooceasion to organize an opposition to railroads, middlemen, and implement makers, and as this is the main end and object of the "Grange movement, it need not be imported into Canada." Now I do not wish to write in the degmatic style of your correspondent, but I assert, and am prepared to prove it, that a number of farms within

Your correspondent's second objection seems to me to be rather silly, but it might be obviated by our having Canadian Granges independent of the United States control. Farmers' clubs may be good enough in their own place, but they have been of little use heretofore in the matters above referred to. My own humble opinion is that "Granges" would powerfully assist the farmer in combating existing monoplies, as well as in preventing the formation of others which seem to be looming in the distance.
