THE NATURAL RESOURCES

When Premier Sifton was commissioner of public works in the old North West Territorial legislature, he with F. W. G. Haultain, then premier, framed a model bill for the new province...

As soon as Mr. Sifton re-entered public life, he again took up the question of the control of the natural resources by the province.

He went further, and pressed upon Sir Wilfrid Laurier the need of such a change. He succeeded, and secured from the late premier a promise that the change would be made.

Mr. Borden, when in opposition, made the provincial control of the natural resources the plank in his platform which he used most frequently in western Canada.

Premier Sifton called the attention of the new premier to the situation shortly after Mr. Borden took office. Here is a copy of the letter which he sent:

Dear Mr. Borden,
Edmonton, November 8th, 1911.
Enclosed please find copy of letter sent Sir Wilfrid Laurier on the 20th of March last, pursuant to resolution of the legislative assembly of Alberta, copy of which resolution is set forth in the letter.

It will be unnecessary to enlarge at present upon the argument contained therein in regard to granting the province of Alberta of the natural resources within its boundaries. But I must better to draw the matter especially to your attention before your session opened, as the question might be under discussion, and to assure you, as I think I may on behalf of the legislature, that there is no difference of opinion between the members of the country in regard to the desirability of following out the suggestion contained in my letter.

I was pleased to see that your own views as reported are very much along the same lines, and I am pleased to arrange for an interview at Ottawa on the subject at any time it may be convenient to you.

The history of the whole affair is given above. First Mr. Michener favored the legislation. Then, when elected, he opposed the agreement. Then, after Mr. Bennett got the big brief with the Royal bank, Mr. Michener opposed what he had favored in 1910.

There is nothing to indicate that Mr. Michener will not right-about-face or wrong-about-face at the next session of the legislature, if he should be elected to that body.

ELEVATOR TRUST IN THE FIELD

The strongest opposition that is being offered the Sifton government in this contest is R. B. Bennett, the elevator trust of Alberta.

He is in Alberta fighting with all his energy, the government that has passed legislation enabling the farmers of the province to free themselves from the grip of that monopoly.

He is a dominant factor in Alberta politics. Does any person suppose that Mr. Bennett would permit a government to create opposition to him, if he had the power to prevent it?

The big issue in this election is the agricultural legislation. The big fight is between Mr. Bennett, the elevator trust, on the one hand, and the Sifton government, which has taken its life in its hand by passing the elevator bill.

The price of grain was never as low as at the present time. Farmers are selling their oats for 15 to 19 cents a bushel, which is less than the cost of production. Across the line, in Great Falls, the farmers can get 50 cents a bushel for oats not so good.

The government is doing its utmost to change conditions.

R. B. Bennett is the elevator trust. Admittedly the elevator trust is making this keen, bitter fight against the government which is assisting the farmers to break the trust, and get some fair competition to "my elevators."

This is of interest, not only to the farmers, but to the merchants and professional men. It is of direct importance to every elector in Alberta.

MONTANA NEGRO KILLS TWO OFFICERS AND IS LYNCHED

Mondak, Mont., April 5.—After shooting to death Sheriff Courtney and Deputy Sheriff Master, J. C. Collins, a Negro, charged with a telephone pole, and his clothes set on fire, by a committee of citizens early this morning. The mob overpowered officials and broke into the jail, where Collins was held prisoner.

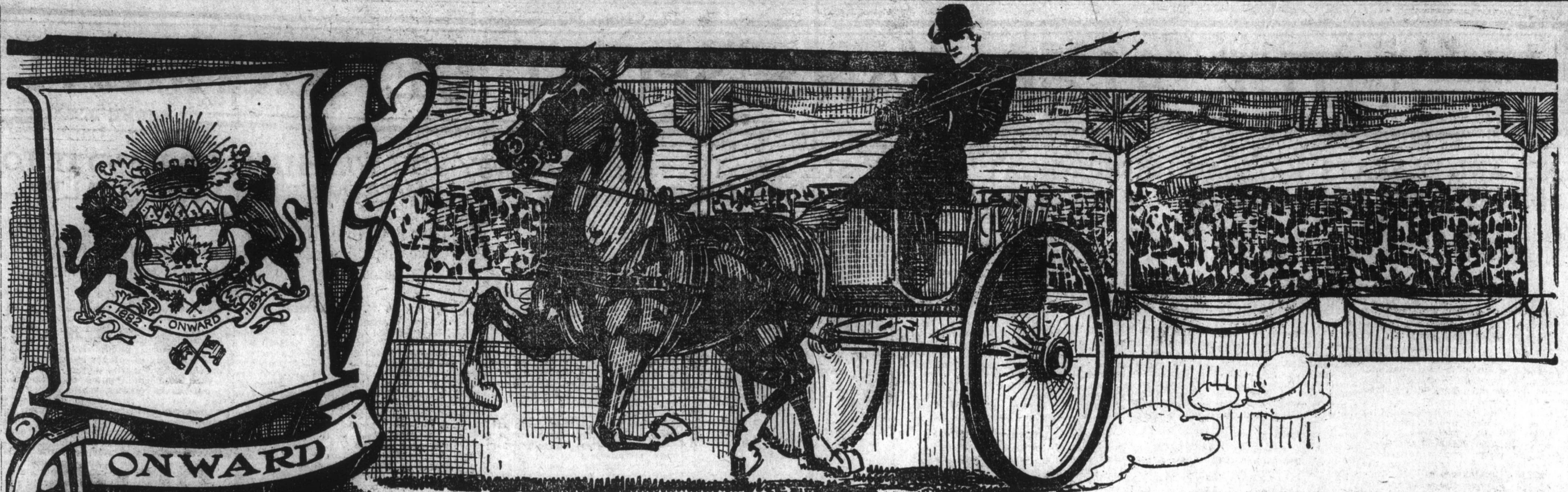
Collins, who was employed by a bridge construction company here, was boarding with a negro named Clay Best. Best sold his horse and property to another negro named Patterson. When Patterson came to take possession of his property, it is alleged that Collins attacked him, Patterson, beating her severely. Patterson, were out on a warrant for Collins' arrest.

When Sheriff Thomas Courtney and his deputy, Richard Burmaster, arrived here from the county, they were in as a deputy E. P. Wilson, of this place. The party went to the camp of the bridge construction company where Collins was at work. Wilson was sent on ahead to the office to inquire where Collins was working. Just as he stepped into the office, Collins held him up at the point of a gun and took away his arms. Collins stepped out near the bridge and almost collided with Sheriff Courtney, who was about to enter the office. Collins fired twice at the sheriff, killing him instantly. He then turned upon Deputy Burmaster and shot him five times through the body. Collins then ran into the brush.

A posse of citizens was quickly organized and took up the trail of the slayer. He soon was surrounded, and seeing that escape was impossible, gave himself up. On arriving there the party was met by a mob. Collins, however, was put in jail, but only for a short time. Angry citizens quickly overpowered the officials, freed the jail and took Collins to a telephone pole, where they hanged him, riddled his body with bullets, and then set fire to his clothes.

England's Youngest Admiral London, April 5.—Rear-Admiral David Beatty, the youngest admiral in the British navy, has hoisted his flag aboard the battleship Lion, and assumed command of the first battle squadron, in succession to Rear-Admiral Buxton. The squadron consists of the superdreadnoughts Lion and Princess Royal, the dreadnought cruisers Indefatigable, Invincible, and Indomitable.

Admiral David Beatty is the youngest naval officer who has been given an independent command since the days of Admiral Rodney, who was the officer at St. and Admiral Keppel, who attained the honor at the age of 29. Admiral Beatty was promoted from lieutenant to commander, and again from commander to captain, for war services, the first in the Soudan in 1898, and the second in the Boer rebellion in 1900. He occupied only eight years in rising from lieutenant to captain, a rise which usually takes an officer anywhere from 12 to 18 years to accomplish. During his naval service he has been at different periods the youngest commander, the youngest captain, and the youngest rear-admiral in the service.
