From the report of the minister of ag-riculture it appears that the number-ol immigrants who settled in Canada lass year was 79,109 as against 103,823 in the preceding year, and 133,624 in 1883 Two causes for this decline are advanced—one, the general decline in emigration from Great Britain and Europe, and the other tae outbreak in the Northwest, which doubtless induced many British agricul-turalists to change their destination. Only 17,000 came in by the St. Lawrence route, the war of rates in the states enabling immigrants to come in chebrier via New York than by Quebec. Of the 17,000, nearly two-thirds were Emistish, 2107 Irish, 2009 Scotch, and 1489 Scandina-viaus. The number of mechanics who landed at Quebec was 886, against 1911 in the preceding year.
