THE IRISH QUESTION.

Devitt's Danger—Parrell in Favor of American Issue—Best Being Paid.
LONDON, Feb. 3.—The debate in the imperial house of commons was a memorable one. Thirty-three home rulers were suspended for obstructing the progress of public business. Mr. Parrell's life for meeting obstruction was then read.

It appeared on his examination that he had no property except some \$700 which he has in his pocket, and which was the proceeds of a bet upon the Hamilton-Trickelack race. This, he said, he was going to spend, and would not give it up to satisfy the judgment. The summons moved absolute to-day was to commit this defendant for his unsatisfactory answer.
