GENERAL AND BURIAL REFORM.

Several Burial Reform Societies are in existence in England, and at the present time they are engaged in an active propaganda to secure greater simplicity in funerals and burials. The specific objects that the societies have in view are principally to eliminate the sham and tinsel of the modern funeral, to cheapen the expense connected with burial and to use a simple coffin that will permit of a rapid decomposition of the human remains.

WHERE ARE THEY AT?

The members of St. Gregory's Church, Ottawa, are responsible for the running of a special train on the Grand Trunk Railway from Toronto to that town on Sunday last. The church is now one and it was decided to run the train in order that the attendance might be as large as possible, and also, we have no doubt that the collection on the opening day might be a handsome one.

THE TOLL-GATES GOING.

The York Township Council at its meeting on Tuesday showed that it appreciates the advantage of establishing better means of communication between Toronto and its suburbs. The council agreed to remove the toll-gates within the municipality and assume control of the road itself. This means that the Township is ready, as soon as it can be legally effected, to tear down the gates that prevent the free communication of the people between upper Yonge-street, Kingston-road and other districts, and the city of Toronto.

THE LAWS OF CAESAR AND OF MOSES.

Judgment has been given in the case of the Queen v. Robert Watt, a Seventh Day Adventist, living near Chatham, Ontario. His offence consisted in hauling rails on that day. The magistrate who tried the case dismissed it on the ground that the defendant was a farmer and as such was not amenable to the provisions of the Lord's Day Act. The defendant, being a Seventh Day Adventist, observes Saturday instead of Sunday as the true Sabbath. In this he follows to the letter the Scriptural injunction which bids us work six days in the week and rest on the seventh day. Watt is a deacon of a church with 42 members, and he and his co-religionists were most anxious to have the case determined from a religious standpoint.

FARMERS CAN WORK ON SUNDAY.

Seventh Day Adventists Win the Test Case Brought Against Robert Watt of Windsor.

Windsor, July 4.—One of the most interesting cases with which the attention of Squire Forban's court has been engaged for some time was finally disposed of yesterday. On the 19th June Robert Watt, Selton, Howard Township, was given a hearing on the charge of breaking the Lord's Day by hauling rails with members and the evidence showed that the rails had been undoubtedly hauled, but the defence set up that the law in the case did not affect the farmers.

TWO CENTS ENOUGH.

Hamilton Herald. It is not likely that anything will come of Mr. Maclean's attempt to establish a two-cent-a-mile rate for radial railways operating under Dominion charters. The railway companies are not likely to pay for traveling on any railway. As a matter of fact, if the steam roads can make money by doing business at two cents a mile, as they do, electric roads could get fat and prosperous on a cent a mile.

PROF. HUXLEY'S SIMPLE FUNERAL.

London, July 4.—The burial of Prof. Huxley took place in Finchley, near Euston, yesterday afternoon. The funeral was a simple one, and was conducted in the simplest manner. Besides the relatives there were present representatives of the Royal Society, among them being Prof. Huxley's old friend, Sir John Lubbock, John Evans and Gen. Sir John D'Almeida. Herbert Spencer was too ill to attend, but sent his secretary to represent him. Among the notable persons at the grave were the historian Lecky, Prof. Geo. Darwin, Ray Lankester, William Crookes and Charles Bradley, Jeffrey Bell, Henry James and Spencer Walpole.

AMERICAN THEOLOGISTS SEcede.

London, July 4.—The convention of Theologians was called to order here to-day, with the first part in the chair. Mrs. Annie Besant moved the resolution from the American section be laid upon the table without discussion, inasmuch as, while pretending to convey friendly to the European section, the motion was adopted after a long debate, whereupon the American section, under the leadership of Mrs. Besant, then moved that a committee be appointed to reform the constitution, which was agreed to. Com. L. H. D. Dixon, Col. Olcott read a cablegram expressing the wishes of affiliated lodges in America.

East End News.

No less than ten cars were brought into use by the G.T.R. to convey the teachers and scholars of St. Stephen's Church to Victoria Park yesterday for their annual picnic. Everyone had a good time, they returned about 8.30, and almost every kind of outdoor game. St. James' School went by special train to the G.T.R. to Rosebank. Nearly 600 teachers, children and friends went by the train. They arrived at the ground about 4.45 and the first part of the afternoon was spent in games of various kinds, while many went out boating. At 4.30 tea was served to the children in the open air, and afterwards in a marquee to the teachers and visitors. Immediately afterwards races for the children were started and these caused great emulation to the competitors. Among the visitors present were Rev. W. Lewis, Mr. A. Grassett, Misses Atkinson, Dixon, Lee, Kingston and many more.

Servia's Political Crisis.

Belgrade, July 4.—Prime Minister Christich has resigned, and last evening King Alexander summoned several prominent politicians to palace to confer with him on the formation of a new Ministry. It is expected that the King will ask E. Simitsch, at present Servian Minister to Austria, to form a coalition Cabinet.

HUNTER HONORABLY ACQUITTED.

The Farmers Were Considerably More to Blame in the Transaction Than He Was.

William E. Hunter of this city, who was arrested at Sandridge on a charge of obtaining money under false pretences, would appear to be a much maligned man. Before His Honor Judge Mahaffy at Bracebridge, Hunter was tried on four charges of obtaining goods under false pretences, with a second count of theft in each instance. The cases lasted several hours, and were of more than ordinary interest to the farming community. Hunter had arranged with the farmers in the neighborhood of Sandridge to act as their broker or agent in the disposal of cedar posts, poles and general forest produce, he to receive \$2 per cent from each member of the concern as remuneration for his time and expenses.

FOUND AN EMPTY BOWDOCK.

DOLE'S COMPOSITE CABINET.

Only One Hawaiian Among the Fifteen Members. San Francisco, Cal., July 4.—Advices from Honolulu, by steamer Alameda, dated yesterday state that the cabinet has named the five remaining members of the Council of State, as follows: Charles M. Cook, American; Joseph H. Henshaw, Portuguese; John E. Mulla, American; T. B. Murray, American; Henry Smith, Hawaiian. The cabinet includes six Americans, three Englishmen, three part-Hawaiians, and one full-Hawaiian, one German and one Portuguese. The Council will probably be sworn in on Monday, after some pardons of insurgents.

FREEMEN OF WICK.

Lord Wolseley and Viscount Peel Honored by the Catholics Boreth. London, July 4.—The Freemasons of Wick, Scotland, to-day, where General Lord Wolseley and Viscount Peel, of the party, received the members of the borough United States Ambassadors Bayard, who also was one of the party, made a brief speech, in which he said that the secret of his mission to the Great Britain was that the war of 1812 should be the last war between the United States and Great Britain.

MRS. McLEARY DEAD.

She Owned the Cow That Kicked the Lamp That Caused the Fire That Burned Chicago Chicago, July 4.—Mrs. Catherine McLeary died yesterday afternoon. She was the owner of the fractious cow which in a barn in the rear of No. 176 De Koven-street, on a memorable night in October, 1871, kicked over a lamp that started a blaze which cost Chicago \$190,000,000.
