About Warm Milk.

Considerable has been lately said in medical journals concerning the value of warm milk as a remedial agent in certain diseases. An interesting article on the subject lately appeared in the London Milk Journal, in which it is stated, on the authority of Dr. Benjamin Clarke, that in the East Indies warm milk is used to a great extent as a specific for diarrhoea. A pint every four hours will check the most violent diarrhoea, stomach ache, indigestion, cholera and dysentery. The milk should never be boiled, but only heated sufficiently to be agreeably warm, not too hot to drink. Milk which has been boiled is unfit for use. This writer gives several instances in arresting the disease, among which is the following: The writer says "I have never failed in curing in six or twelve hours, and I have tried it, I should think, fifty times. I have also given it to a dying man who had been subjected to dysentery eight months, latterly accompanied by a continued diarrhoea, and it acted on him like a charm. In two days his diarrhoea was gone; in three weeks he became a hale, hearty man; and now growing fowls of any age this is the best staple food, when properly treated. The Cow in Question.

Cooked Food for Poultry.

The practice of furnishing to fowls one meal of cooked grain or vegetable, to fowls daily, is now much more general in this country, especially among fanciers and breeders than it formerly was. This method has been generally advised in the Poultry Year Book for years. If this plan has not been so common throughout the year, then we especially commend it as the present season, and through the spring months, is very best that can be devised. Such food is more nourishing and is more easily digested. It is more palatable and desirable to the birds. And in every way we deem this the better mode. It is the best, and usually most economical to the poultryer, to furnish the food in the morning. If fed warm during the frigid months, from December to April—it will be more so than the birds. The most you give your fowls should always be cooked. Bread meat is too dry; it makes the appetite and causes illness. Cooked meat goes further, is more nourishing and less injurious if over-fed, than the raw one. For young fowls, very little is needed at a time, and either old or young birds, when kept in confinement, should not be stuffed with the kind of all-day food. A large part of their food should be grains and cooked vegetables. For growing fowls of any age this is the best staple food, when properly treated.

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Black Diamond. Potville in Pennsylvania is now said to possess the deepest coal mine in America. Through its shaft, 1,576 feet deep, 200 tons, holding four tons each, are lifted every day.
