BUY AT HOME ==

A great war has always been followed by a period of business depression which seems more acute than an ordinary depression as it comes after the war period of intense activity. It was expected this change would be more marked than that following any previous war on account of it involving many more countries and many more people.

With past experience before it the Canadian Reconstruction Association immediately at the close of the war started a "Buy at Home" campaign. The purpose of this was to stop the stream of money sent out of the country to buy imported goods and to turn it back to keep the factories here working and the men employed. The events of the past two years prove that this was to be no exception and while this slowing up in business did not come as soon as was expected and was not apparent until a year or more after it was thought to be due, it finally came in full force in the fall and winter of 1920 and has continued to the present. The Reconstruction Association has made a complete analysis of the amount of money spent by various countries on imported goods. These statistics, when gathered together and compiled, brought out the fact that this country imported more goods in comparison to its population than any other country in the world and indeed almost twice as much as any other country. These figures also show that nearly eighty per cent. of all the goods imported came from the United States and that they amounted in a year to over \$800,000,000 or over \$2,000,-000 a day. A further analysis of the actual imports showed that of the imported goods large numbers of similar goods were made in Canada and probably the buyer need not have imported them if he had wanted to buy at home.

It is no doubt true that many things are imported which cannot be bought from home manufacturers at as good advantage. There are frequently local conditions that make it impossible to compete with goods manufactured in large quantities under more favorable conditions. Other goods are imported because not being made here at all due in some cases to the demand for them not being enough to justify a Canadian plant for their production.

It frequently happens, however, that none of these conditions happen but there is a certain spell in the word "imported" both for the buyer and seller and a sale is made of foreign goods. At the same time just as good a purchase could be made as to quality and price on a home made article if either the buyer asked for it or if the seller offered it. This is the purpose of the "Buy at Home"

Not only here have past war conditions so adversely affected industry but in all other countries unemployment is more serious and most of them have adopted measures to protect their own working men and to keep out imported goods as far as possible. This has been done by the raising of import duties and other measures to encourage the use of home made goods and to keep out imported goods. This has had the effect of shutting off the market to manufacturers in different countries and this has especially affected the farmers and stock raisers in Canada who have been practically shut out of the market of the United States. While it is true that Canada buys a large quantity of goods in the United States, it on the other hand exports a large quantity more especially farm products into the United States. However, by the tariff, passed something like a year ago, the shipment of Canadian farm products has been practically shut out of the United States market. A tariff of about 70c. a barrel has prevented the shipment of large quantities of potatoes by the New Brunswick farmers to Boston, New York, and other points, which were formerly almost the best market for these potatoes. A duty of from 15c, to 30c, a lb, on wool has reduced the exports of wool to the U. S., 95 per cent. during a six months period, and the past week a bill proposing a duty of 15 per cent. on hides has been reported in the U. S. Senate which, if adopted, will close entirely the U. S. market for hides which now consumes a great quantity of the Canadian production.

With so large a part of the foreign market shut out the "Buy at Home" compaign becomes more important and it is only by supporting those who do business here that there will be a further market for farm products as well as manufactured goods.
