

Tragic Tale of Heroic Endurance Canada Endorses

Inspector Fitzgerald's Diary for Ten Days Preceding His Terrible Death.

Ottawa, May 16-The annals of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police contain no more tragic tale of heroic endurance, culminating in a slow and terrible death, than that disclosed in the story of the tragedy of the finding of the frozen bodies of Inspector Fitzgerald and three other members of the force, by Corporal Demoster of Dawson last February, whose detailed report was received today by Compt_oller White.
