EXPERIMENTS IN PRESERVING TIMBER.

It is a matter of no little scientific interest that, for a considerable period of time, sufficient at least to make the work thorough, some of the German government officials, principally at the well-known mine Attenwald, near Saarbrücken, have been employed in experiments to ascertain the best means for preserving and protecting mine timbers, both from decay and from fracture by pressure. In connection with the tests to prevent decay in mine timbering, especially such as is exposed to a great amount of pressure, rerort was made to lime, coal tar, tar and carbolineum, these being used in such a manner as to enable the experimenters to definitely compare their relative protective value. The results show lime to be the weakest. coal tar preserved the outside of the timber, while the core was found completely decayed; carbolineum proving by far the most effective, leading to its adoption on all the timbering of the upcast in that mine. In carrying this out, the mine timbers made of wood peeled and dried are twice painted over with the carbolineum above the ground, and require each, when 2.5 meters long and of 0.25 meters diameter, a four-fifth kilogram in the first application, and three-fifth kilogram in the second. To prevent the premature breaking of the wall props, after experimenting for some time, it was found that when three or four notches, thirty centimetres deep, had been sawed in the top there was no breakage.

BERLIN, ONT.—A committee has been appointed to secure plans, specifications, etc., for a system of sewerage.

VICTORIA, B. C.—A number of salmon canning factories are to be erected in the Province by the Victoria Canning Co.

ST. HENRI, QUE.—A by-law has just been passed to borrow \$50,000 for waterworks and street improvements.

SINCOE, ONT.—A new Roman Catholic Separate School is to be erected in Section No. 2, in the township of Tiny, to cost \$1,400.

WOODSTOCK, ONT.—A new exhibition building is to be erected, at a cost of \$1,500. The building is to be completed before the fall exhibition.

DIGBY, N. S.—Mr. A. V. Wade, Town Treasurer, invites tenders for a loan of \$4,000, said sum to be expended in the erection of a school house.

ILDERTON, ONT.—The Episcopalians of this town have completed arrangements for the erection of a new church. Plans are now being prepared.

BROCKVILLE, ONT.—Messrs. H. Mooers & Co. are asking the Council what inducements they will give for the erection of a large flour and oatmeal mill here.

MITCHELL, ONT.—Dr. A. D. Smith is about to build a fine new brick residence. It will be a two-story building, Queen Anne style, and will cost about \$2,000.

GODERICH, ONT.—A by-law has been passed by the Council authorizing the issuing of debentures to the amount of \$5,000, for the enlargement of the High School.

FORT WILLIAM, ONT.—Mr. E. Merault contemplates building a large new hotel on Victoria Ave. The main building will be 30 x 40 ft., three stories high, and brick veneered.

SPRINGHILL, N. S.—Tenders are invited by Mr. J. R. Cowans until the 25th inst. for the supply of stores of various kinds required by the Cumberland Railway and Coal Co.

WELLAND, ONT.—A company is being organized by Hon. R. W. Scott, of Ottawa, for the manufacture of glass. Should this town grant them a bonus of \$25,000, they will locate here.

A. P. Bulman invites tenders in this issue of the RECORD until 1st August for the erection of two sandstone front houses on Guy street, to cost \$12,000. TORONTO, ONT.—It is said to be the intention of Mr. John Douglas, of Huron street, to erect a row of solid brick stores and dwellings in the east end of the city. —The Board of Works have decided to pave thirty-five lanes with cobble stone, at a cost of \$29,503. —Sewers have been recommended on Edmund and Springhurst avenues, stone sidewalks on Albert and Terauley streets, and a granolithic walk on the east side of Yonge street, from Carlton to Wood street, and on the south side of King street for 75 feet westerly. —Mr. Babbington, architect, Queen street west, has plans ready for several houses on Walmer road and vicinity. —A Committee has been appointed by the Board of Trade to proceed to Montreal to interview the railway companies with respect to the establishment of joint elevators in this city. —Mr. H. Simpson, architect, has sketches made for alterations and enlargement of 9½ Adelaide street east. —The city council has notified the ratepayers of their intention to construct the following works: Extension of Queen street west into High Park, cost \$46,000; block pavements on Marion street, from Lansdowne avenue to Macdonnell avenue, cost \$900; Duncan street, from Macdonnell avenue to Soraraen avenue, cost \$2,500; Sulley street, from present north terminus of pavement to College street, cost \$1,500; Henderson avenue, from Clinton street to Grace street, cost \$1,170; widening of present cedar block pavement on King street, from Strachan avenue to Armour street, cost \$2,300; wooden sidewalk on both sides Grosvenor street, from Yonge street to St. Vincent street, cost \$1,800; private drains on Dupont street, from Manning avenue to Bathurst street, cost \$1,440. —Mr. Geo. Harper, architect, has completed plans for a large warehouse for Mr. Carlaw. —Mr. C. F. Fraser, Commissioner of Public Works for Ontario, will receive tenders until the 4th day of August next, for the grand

staircase and ornamental grille work, for the interior woodwork and hardware, and for the painting, hardwood finishing, glazing, etc., required for new Parliament and Departmental Buildings.—Plans have been prepared by Mr. J. A. Fowler, architect, for a residence in Parkdale for Mr. Kinnear.—The city council has accepted the proposition of Messrs. Marchmont & Co. to build a crematory on the Island for the destruction of refuse and night soil.—Mr. W. R. Gregg, architect, is preparing plans for a block of stores on Spadina avenue for Mr. Wanless.—The City Engineer will receive tenders until the 20th inst., for scraping and painting the Huntley street and Glen road bridges.—Mr. Geo. M. Miller has prepared plans for a hotel for Mrs. Devaney, corner Bathurst and Bloor streets.—The Property Committee has recommended that a site be purchased on Pape avenue for the erection of a new fire station.—Messrs. Post & Holmes, architects, of this city, have prepared plans for an Episcopal Church at Muskegon, Mich.—Tenders are wanted for carpenter work of four houses. Plans at 141 Yorkville avenue.—On the 16th inst. the citizens sanctioned the by-law to expend the sum of \$300,000 on the improvement of the Esplanade, including the erection of a large Union Station.—Royce avenue, St. Mark's Ward, is to be opened out to a width of 65 feet.—The following building permits have been granted: W. INFLUENCE OF TITANIC ACID UPON THE FUSIBILITY OF REFRACTORY CLAYS.

According to H. Seger, 100 parts of zettlitz kaolin, which contains 98.5 per cent. of pure clay substance, were, on the one hand, thoroughly mixed with 5 or 10 per cent. of silica acid, and on the other, with an equivalent quantity of titanac acid. The mass was then shaped into small

cones and heated in a crucible in a Deville blast furnace to a temperature between the melting heat of wrought iron and platinum. After heating the zettlitz kaolin was white, almost completely condensed, translucent on the edges, its shape completely preserved and sharp edged with a dull surface. 100 parts of zettlitz kaoline with 5 parts of silicic acid were snow white, somewhat absorbent, translucent on the edges, with a porcelain-like fracture, shape completely preserved, surface dull. 100 parts of zettlitz kaoline with 10 parts of silicic acid were snow white, somewhat more absorbent than the preceding, translucent on the edges, almost as dense as porcelain, with a dull surface. The cone of 100 parts of zettlitz kaolin with 6.65 titanac acid was somewhat laterally inclined, the fracture was densely slagged, the surface dull glazed and dark blue grey. The sample of 100 zettlitz kaolin with 13.3 titanac acid appeared completely shrunk together to a dark blue gray drop of enamel. According to this, titanac acid acts as a decided flux already at temperatures at which silicic acid has still a loosening effect, and, hence, in analyzing refractory clays more attention than heretofore has to be paid to the presence of titanac acid. Remarkable is the dark gray blue coloration acquired by the samples mixed with titanac acid; it calls to mind the blue gray coloration which many clays acquire by strong burning.—*Brickmaker.*
