



# SULZER IMPEACHED AT CLOSE OF AN ALL NIGHT SESSION

## His Wife Makes Valiant Attempt to Save Him by Confession that She Diverted Funds Without His Knowledge or Consent.

ALBANY, N. Y., Aug. 13.—(Can. Press.)—William Sulzer, governor of New York, was impeached by the lower house of the legislature at 5:15 o'clock this morning after an all-night session by a vote of 79 to 45 on charges of having diverted campaign contributions to his private use and having made under oath false statements as to his campaign receipts.

An eleventh hour declaration on the part of the governor's wife that she had diverted some of his campaign contributions to the purchase of stock because she felt the household needed money, failed to avert impeachment. The roll call was one of the quickest accomplished since the assembly began the consideration of impeachment proceedings. But one member rose to explain his vote.

Organization leaders who had spared for time last night in the fear that their program of impeachment would be wrecked by lack of votes, welcomed new-comers to the assembly chamber, summoned from New York during the early hours, and assured of victory by their presence started a rapid fire of legislation with the adoption of the impeachment resolution.

A roll call showed the adoption of the resolution by a vote of 79 to 32. A committee was appointed to acquaint the senate with the assembly on the findings at the meeting of the senate scheduled for 11 o'clock this morning. Majority leaders asserted their belief that with the prosecution to the senate of the articles of impeachment, William Sulzer would automatically cease to be governor and Martin H. Glynn, lieutenant-governor, would assume his office and functions as acting governor. Mr. Sulzer's lawyers entertained a different view.

With the adoption of the articles and the appointment of the two committees, the assembly called for further work. A resolution calling for the appointment of nine managers to conduct on behalf of the lower house the impeachment proceedings was adopted, and Speaker Smith announced its membership.

**Shorn of Their Terrors.**  
In the light of revelations contained in Mrs. Sulzer's declaration to Senator Palmer yesterday afternoon, Governor Sulzer's friends are inclined today to view the ordeal which confronts him with less apprehension than before his impeachment. By her assertion that she diverted part of the campaign contributions sent her husband to private purposes without his knowledge and used them to purchase stocks in Wall Street, she has shorn the articles of impeachment of many of their terrors, his friends declare.

Monday, Sept. 22, was this afternoon made a tentative selection for the date of trial. Governor Sulzer on the impeachment charges. This selection, subject to change, was reached at a conference among Senator Wagner, a president pro tem of the senate, and judges of the court of appeals.

The impeachment has raised a vital question as to whether, under the con-

stitution, the governor will vacate his office pending final adjudication of the impeachment issue by the senate and court of appeals sitting jointly as a trial court. The indications are that he will contest bitterly the theory of the opposition that he becomes automatically barred.

Lieutenant-Governor Martin H. Glynn came into Albany from his summer home at Cunar Hill during the forenoon and went to his newspaper office as usual. He declined to comment on the situation.

The fact that the various state departments and bureaus are divided in their allegiance to the executive and the Democratic organization which is seeking to depose him stimulates interest in the complicated situation. The possibility of two men endeavoring to discharge the functions of the office at the same time suggests conditions that the senate alone would have power to deal with.

**REFUSED TO SIT AT FIRE ENQUIRY**

**Controller Foster Wanted Investigation Conducted by Coroner.**

**A QUESTION OF MAINS**

**G. T. R. Refuses to Allow City to Install Hydrants on Water Front.**

When the enquiry into the charges by Ald. Burgess of inefficient fire protection was commenced by the board of control yesterday morning Controller Foster left his seat, refusing to take part, as he held that the enquiry should be made by a coroner.

"It is the duty of the fire and works departments to provide fire protection to the island," said Ald. Burgess. "Certainly," Mayor Hooker replied. "If I prove carelessness by the fire and works departments, will you admit inefficiency of fire protection?" Ald. Burgess then asked.

"Then I am ready to have my charges taken up," Ald. Burgess said.

The first charge was of carelessness in providing fire protection at the island on April 20, causing the loss of several buildings by fire.

"The time of turning on the water mains on the island each spring was haphazard, leaving an uncertainty between the works and fire departments as to when the water should be turned on," said Ald. Burgess. "It was thus easy for the water to be turned on and the fire department not know."

"In future the water is to be turned on at the island on April 1, or earlier if the weather will permit," Mayor Hooker remarked. "It is admitted that the onus of delay at the fire on April 20 is on the works department. It was also admitted that the fire on April 20 was caused by the fire alarm system on the island is not so housed as to permit operation with the weather being cold, and that the system was in operation as early as possible last spring."

"It is reasonable to expect that the works department should notify the fire department when the water is turned on at the island," said Ald. Burgess. "It had always been done informally and no record kept. That the water system and has now been rectified."

**Did Not Respond.**

That disposed of the charge of carelessness at the fire on April 20 at the island. The next charge was that the fire tug was notified of a fire on the water front at Sussex street on June 11 and did not respond. \$3000 loss was burned.

The captain of the tug saw the blaze flash up and quickly got down, and he thought it was a launch on fire, so did not go," said Chief Thompson. "He was also wrong in not going, and I told him never to repeat that error. I don't think he will."

"The cause of the charge of lack of hydrants is a fire on the water front, near Spadina avenue, on July 6. We can't have hydrants convenient there, because it is an elevated property, owned by the G.T.R. The water and hydrant chief say it is impossible to put in a main there," said Controller McCarthy.

"If a fire occurs down there we can't control it," said Deputy Chief Noble.

"The railway company should be indicted," said Ald. Burgess.

"The railway property is to be altered next year and the G.T.R. does not want to go to any expense for mains now," Commissioner Harris explained.

**Water Pressure.**

Next charge was that water pressure was insufficient at a fire on Balmuto street on Aug. 2.

"The pressure was not up to the mark, but he had plenty of engines there and got good pressure thru the hydrants," Deputy Chief Noble stated. "It was a very inflammable place, and we had to protect the surrounding property. We got there three minutes after the telephone alarm was received and found the building burning fiercely."

"So far in this enquiry there has been no evidence of lack of fire department apparatus," Controller McCarthy said. "I mention that to show that there is no need for more boxes of additional equipment, as declared by Chief Thompson in his report to the mayor. The city has only one fire department, as charged in one newspaper. The city has poured money into the department."

**Jersey Avenue Hydrant.**

The next charge was that the water supply was insufficient at a fire on Jersey avenue on Aug. 5.

"There was hardly enough water to run out of the nozzle," Deputy Chief Noble said.

"The lack of pressure there is caused by a six-inch main being fed by a three-inch main," Commissioner Harris explained. "In other parts of the city similar conditions obtain. This is the result of property owners in the older part of the city having refused to pay for more than three or four inch mains. Since I took office I ordered that nothing less than six-inch mains should be laid. We are correcting the trouble with Jersey avenue as rapidly as possible, and before the fire occurred on Jersey avenue we had the six-inch main on the ground there ready to be laid."

"Has your department full data on the pressure to be expected from each hydrant?" Controller McCarthy asked Chief Thompson.

"No," Chief Thompson answered.

"One month in the city and all are examined once a month," Commissioner Harris stated. "The works department will supply the fire department with full information upon the pressure at each hydrant."

The next charge was that there are no keys in the fire alarm boxes at Exhibition grounds, and that caused a serious delay in sending in an alarm for the fire there on Aug. 3.


