



ANNUAL MEETING.

Pursuant to the Act of Incorporation, the seventeenth annual meeting of the Historical and Scientific Society of Manitoba was held in the City Council Chamber, Winnipeg, on the 16th day of February, when the same was adjourned until the 21st inst.

In view of the many troublesome questions which have been a source of public discussion during the past year in Manitoba, questions indeed which are of the utmost importance from an Historical point of view, and also in view of the fact that many members of the Society have been active participants in the discussion of these questions, much of the time and energy which our members would have given to the Society's original work has been diverted into other sources. Doubtless for this reason, we have again to lament the apparent lack of original work within the Society.

The only paper read before the Society is the one to which we have listened this evening, viz.: "The Lake of the Woods, its History, Geology, Mining and Manufacturing," by Rev. Dr. Bryce, which was supplemented by remarks on the rocks and minerals of that district by Prof. Laird, who submitted numerous characteristic specimens. It is understood, however, that during the past summer Dr. Bryce spent some time in London, and while there he made voluminous extracts from the records, in the Hudson's Bay Company's House, relating to the early history of our Northwestern country. It is anticipated that at an early date, the Society will benefit by these investigations.

As the Society increases in age, death lays his heavy hand the earlier members, it is with much regret that at this, our annual meeting, we have to deplore the loss, during the

past year, of two of our oldest members, Sir John Schultz, K.C.M.G., and Donald Codd, Esq., one of the incorporators of the Society, brother of the esteemed Convener of our Finance Committee.

SIR JOHN SCHULTZ.

Sir John became a member of this Society many years ago, and at once evinced much interest in its progress and general welfare. The Society is endebted to him for many interesting and valuable historical papers, notably, "A Forgotten Fortress," "The Old Crow Wing Trail," "Some Very Old Inhabitants," "The King's Highway."

In giving a brief sketch of his life, we may state that Sir John was born in Amherstburg, County of Essex, Ontario, in 1841, and in his youth was clever, ambitious and promised a powerful physique, eapable of much endurance which certainly was fulfilled at his manhood and throughout the greater part of his life. He was of a courageous and venturesome disposition. After some experience of a sailor's life, he ventured to see the great North-west, this was in 1860. He at about this time, was studying medicine during his leisure hours. He was instrumental in building the first house in Winnipeg, and entered into the fur trade, drug business, and other enterprises. In 1860 he returned to Ontario, and in 1862 graduated as Doctor of Medicine at Queen's University, Kingston, Ontario. He then returned to Fort Garry, having great faith in its future as well as in that of the Northwest in general. In those days he had a large and extensive patronage as a physician. In 1867 he married Miss Agnes Farquarhson, youngest daughter of James Farquarhson, Esq., of British Guinea, a most devoted will during his life, and during his long illness his constant We all sympathize with companion and faithful nurse. In 1883 he was chosen as a Senator for the Dominion House, and in 1888 was appointed Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Manitoba, and continued in office until 1895. In 1894 he received the distinguished honor of Knighthood from Her Majesty. During his life in Manitoba, Sir John was always to the front not only in politics, but many important enterprises, in organizing The North-West Trading Company; The South-West Railway Company; The Great North-West Telegraph Company and other industries. As a statesman he had few his equal. Socially, he was of a warm, kind-hearted, generous disposition, and charitable to the poor and needy; there are many in this province who will miss his warm heart and benevolence. During the last few years his health became extremely poor, and it was only his indomitable pluck that enabled him to earry out his important duties. winter in Manitoba was too harsh for his weak lungs, and be visited the Southern States in hopes of relief, but it was not to be so. He died at Monterey, Mexico, April 12th, 1896, fort Garry, having to be mourned by a loving wife, and all friends who really knew him.

DONALD CODD.

year 1868, with Surveyor J. A. Snow, who under the direction of Surveyor-General Col. Dennis, entered upon the work of opening up the Dawson Route, between Lake Superior and the Red River settlement. He had to experience many hardships and trials in the commencement of the Red River Rebellion The work on the Dawson Route had to be discontinued owing to the out-cry of settlers at surveying parties entering the country before definite arrangements had been made with the Dominion Government, and the party suffered a terrible experience in having to return to Ottawa via St. Paul by dog train and with snowshoes. He shortly afterwards was appointed a draughtsman at Ottawa in the Department of Interior. In 1872 was sent to Winnipeg to adjust the half-breed land grant, and in 1873 was appointed Land Commissioner, which position he held until 1881, when his health compelled him to relinquish his responsible duties. After resigning from this position, he confined himself much to his home, and, being endowed with remarkable mechanical abilities, he occupied his time to a great extent in constructing different mechanical instruments and machines Among others, a motor plow, a postage stamping machine, a mercurial barometer, prairie fire-extinguisher, and a railway electric locomotive but none of these he could complete or patent for the want of sufficient money. He was of a quiet, reserved disposition to others, a good book reader, especially on scientific and kind religious subjects, and was a devoted christian. His deceased heart carried other complications, and after a few week eading patient suffering he passed away peaceably to his future home at the age of 52 years, leaving a widow, three children and many relations and friends to mourn his loss.

Report of Library Committee.

Your Library Committee begs to report that during the year the work of cataloguing the Society's collection of North-west and Reference Books on the Dewey system was completed under the care of Mrs. J. W. E. Darby. what detailed account of this system was given in last year's mport, and it is therefore not necessary to say anything further about it, except that its excellences have been recognized by the Public Library Board, and, that the City's Librar; as well as that belonging to the Historical Society has been arranged according to this method.

In the matter of purchasing books for the Society's Library, a new departure was made under a resolution of the Council, which authorized the Committee to buy books for the Historical Society Division although there were already opies of them in the City Library division. In this way a onsiderable number of Historical and Antiquarian volumes were added to our shelves. For the rest, the most of the books bought were current publications relating to this country, such as the works of the Rev. John McDougall, E. ectric locomotive, R Young, Dr. McLean, Gilbert Parker and publications on the tent for the want school question. The total number of bound volumes added erved disposition. the Library during the year was 117.

Hamilton, who has continued to show his interest in our work by considerably adding to his already large collection of rare coins, which have been lately placed in the public reading room, thus allowing all the advantage of seeing them. Numerous other specimens have been contributed by the same gentleman.

The Venerable Archdeacon McDonald, an honorary member of the Society, has also enriched our collections by a number of very interesting articles obtained from the Esquimaux, such as a seal-skin jacket, snowshoes, arrows fishing material, and other characteristic articles. These together with other donations from different sources, have been listed and placed on exhibit, and form an attractive addition to our collections.

Report of the Joint Library Committee, 1896-97.

The past year is the first complete year, during which the City Library has been on the new basis of a free library The library has steadily grown in public favor, and the large number of 2273 tickets issued speaks of this popular appreciation.

The classes of literature used were as follows:

During the year the City Library was rearranged, renumbered, and a new catalogue prepared. This was a very believe and difficult work, and extra assistance was obtained by the Committee. The new catalogue, arranged on the well approved Dewey Decimal System, is being sold at the same pice as the former small and poorly arranged catalogue.

The number of magazines and periodicals taken during the par has been increased for the coming year, and the contract for supplying the same was awarded, after a close competition, bo Mr. A. Taylor, bookseller. The contract for supplying books was obtained at low rates by Mr. W. D. Russell, bookseller.

The exchanges of newspapers and periodicals to the number of 230 have been given over for general use in the saling Room, and the Society has received for this the sum \$200. The City allows a grant of \$2250 for carrying on the City Library.

The Joint Library have added a number of important works of reference to the Library. These include The Century Dictionary and Cyclopædia, 10 volumes, and Library of Historic Characters, 10 volumes. The number of volumes purchased for the year was 233, at a cost of \$336.92.

The librarians, Miss E. Jackson and Miss Blyth, have continued in their positions during the year, and have done excellent service. On account of the press of work it was

found necessary to appoint in addition Miss Brown.

During the year it was considered important for the representatives of the City to have a majority of the Committee, and it was arranged that the Society have two representatives on the Joint Library Board.
