Hamilton, July 6.—(From The World's Staff Correspondent.)—The Board of Works, tonight put through a number of important measures. It overhauled City Engineer Barrow's department, both as regards the staff and salaries, and left Engineer Barrow bewailing the loss of Assistant Engineer C. H. Wallace, B. Sc., described in Mr. Barrow's late report as an expert, and one of the best men they ever had in his service.

By a vote of 4 to 3, the name of R. T. Black, electrical and mechanical engineer, was substituted, at a salary of \$1000, for the late Assistant Engineer C. H. Wallace. Mr. Black, who is a Dublin University man, was a long time in the service of the city, and had never been in the police court. Mr. Barrow, who moved the resolution, said that he knew nothing of the merits of either man, but had been prevailed upon to depose to the fact that Black's "unit" is said to be a better man than the other.

The Board will further recommend that the name of Wallace be substituted for that of Black, and that the salary of \$1500 for marking and assisting the south side of Carleton-square, was accepted, and Mr. Black's name be put on the list of those to be recommended for firing.

But what interested me more was what is known as the Arundel collection, which consists of a number of copies of very old paintings; they are mounted on gold matting and are set up in cases in such a manner that they afford ample opportunity for study, and at this fall case alone one might spend hours both interesting and profitable. These chromolithographs were published by the Arundel Society, named after Thomas Howard, Earl of Arundel, who was organized in 1828 for the purpose of copying and publishing the important works of the great masters. Among them are copies of pictures by Giotto, Fra Angelico, Van der Goes, Van Eyck, Raphael and Durer.

In the same room is a very interesting number of engravings, set up in cases in the same way as the Arundel collection, and in these I was told that Mousaigner Henry Del Val was especially interested. When he honored the galleries with a visit, his guide told me this with a great deal of pardonable pride, and I could not help but notice the famous Pappel albino, a very fine print of courtesy, for when a man of his culture and experience, whose life has been spent in the very art centres of Europe, finds a few cases of replica engravings of interest enough to comment upon them approvingly, then they must be very good indeed. But now I come to think of it, it is not so much the collection which interested the ablegate as the manner in which the old engravings had been cleaned.

COLONIAL PRIVY COUNCILORS.
In order to appreciate the compliment paid by Queen Victoria to the members of the colonial privy council attending her Jubilee, it is necessary to explain that to the vast majority of her subjects the members of the privy council appear superior to any order of knighthood, or other honor.

But a Privy Councilor is only conferred upon a Cabinet Minister or upon some person who, having rendered conspicuous services either to the Crown or to the nation at large, is considered on that particular count of the sovereign.

A Privy Councilor is bound to the monarch by a special oath of office, consisting of the following words: "To advise the Queen according to the best of his knowledge and discretion; to advise for the Queen's honor and good of the public without partiality; (2) To keep the Queen's counsel secret; (3) To avoid corruption; (4) To help and strengthen the execution of what shall be resolved, until that a good and true councilor ought to do to his sovereign lady."

The Privy Council is the most ancient administrative institution in Great Britain, having existed for more than 800 years. It is the only form of Parliament, its members being chosen by the monarch. It is the highest governing body of the nation. Of course, with the form the duties and prerogatives of the Council have become much modified. But it would require more than a lifetime to define the line where the authority of Parliament ends and that of the Privy Council begins.

Thus, the Lord President of the Council and a number of members are at the head of the entire educational system of the Dominion, all matters pertaining thereto being directed and controlled by this Council that administers that of the Privy Council.
