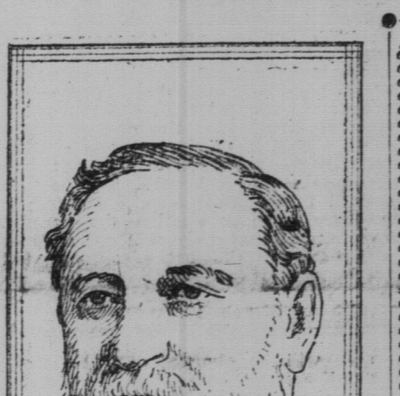

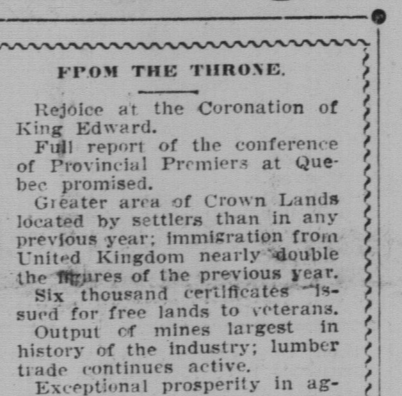

READY FOR FINISH FIGHT

Mass Meeting of Farmers at Whitevale To-Night to Discuss Rural Telephone War.

WILL-PROSECUTE BELL TO THE LAST

Whitevale, March 10.—(Special.)—Tomorrow night the farmers will hold a mass meeting here to discuss further action against the Bell Telephone Company. The committee which called on representatives of the government Ministry in reference to the matter will make their report at this meeting. In the meantime the Bell people are making the most extraordinary efforts to construct their lines through this part of Ontario and York Counties. In a few days they will have run a line down from Agincourt, Locust Hill, east and west, and hope to connect it with all the small towns in this part of the country. Bell agents are thick throughout the area and have been here for several weeks. The company only wanted time to get their wires strung through here and then they would drive the farmers' rural line to the wall, if they had to supply phone service. That they are working to this end is quite evident.

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CITY QUARRY IS EXHAUSTED

Efforts of Hamilton to Secure Another Source for Building Stone and Scraps.

Seven Per Cent. Increase All Round Granted by Commissioners.

Anti-Vice Crusade Likely to Come in the Form of a Local Option Fight.

MINISTERS ISSUE CARD TO PUBLIC Denounce "Imported" Vice and Call on City Council to Submit Proposition.

Toronto Junction, March 10.—The resident ministers of the town are united in favor of the Town Council submitting a local option by-law to the people, and have issued a circular to the contrary as follows:—

After careful consideration of Toronto Junction and its peculiar conditions as a suburb of a great city, as an attractive residential neighborhood, as a growing centre of manufacturing industries, and as an important railway point. We are of the opinion that it would be in the material, sound and wise interests of our town for our municipality to pass a local option by-law and so submit to the people the question of breaking up the existing system and safeguarding our town against imported vice.

The Public School Board, at its regular meeting to-night, adopted a resolution which provides for a local option by-law to be submitted to the people of the town of Toronto in regard to the schools there. The local option varies from \$120 for one room to \$15 for four rooms. No fee for rooms and no fee for the cleaning and general care of the schools. They are all in the city of Toronto. According to this schedule the cost of the schools in town will increase to three with a recent resolution passed by the Board.
