Loan Company Liquidator Expects to Pay Dividend of 20 Per Cent. By Midsummer—Realizing on Property.

"By next midsummer the shareholders of the York Loan Co. will have a dividend of 20c on the dollar out of the property entrusted to the National Trust Co. for management," said R. Home Smith, the official liquidator, to The World last night.

This statement was made in the This statement was made in the course of an interview in which Mr. Smith discussed the alleged offer of the Assets Realization Co. of Chicago. It was said that this company offered \$700,000 for the York Loan property. This, Mr. Smith says, is not true. The Chicago company offered \$700,000 for the property and for about \$300,000 in mortgages and sale agreements. This would bring the offer for the real estate down to \$400,000.

"We are not going to let the Chicago."

"We are not going to let the Chicago concern come in and reap where we have sown for the benefit of the York Loan Co. shareholders," said Mr.

## IARBORD ST. EXTENSION TOGO ON-COST \$115.001

Only Two Appellants at Court of Revision-Tag Day for

City's Poor.

Out of 750 property owners affected, only two appeared before the court of revision yesterday to protest against the scheme of assessment for the extension of Harbord-street from Clinton-street to Ossington-avenue, at an estimated cost of \$115,000. The assessment is now being advertised, and the last chance to appeal will be at the city council meeting next Monday.





### STEVAN SWYRYDA ON TRIAL noes FOR MURDER AT ERINDALE

Foreigner is Charged With Killing Oloeck Leutik-Charge to Grand Jury.

BRAMPTON, Nov. 17 .- (Special.)-The fall assizes opened this afternoon, Mr. Justice Riddell presiding.

His lordship, in his address to the grand jury, referred to the prevalence of perjury, saying that it was increasing, and it was his intention to do his best to put a stop to it. He did not intend to discharge the grand jury when they had reported on the bills before them, but would keep them, as it migat be the case that someone during the course of the trial would say what was untrue, and it would then be his duty to direct that an information be laid and placed before them.

The grand jury brought in a true bill against Stevan Swyrda, charged with the murder of Oloeck Leutik.

The prisoner was placed in the dock. It took an hour and a quarter to complete the jury, the following being chosen: Frederick W. Snell, A. Dobson, W. J. Jameson, Thomas Lintell, Benjamin Graham, James Armstrong, A. Goodfellow, G. H. Falconer, William Duffy, John Davidson, W. J. Sanderson and James Johnston.

Thru his counsel, Elihu G. Marris, the prisoner pleaded not guilty.

Crown Evidence Outlined.

County Crown Attorney McFadden, addressing the jury, outlined the evidence. The prisoner was living in To-The prisoner was placed in the dock.

addressing the jury, outlined the evidence. The prisoner was living in Toronto on April 14 last, at 99 Terrulay-street, a boarding house. On that date the deceased was brought to this boarding house by the prisoner. He remained there two days, and on April 16 the prisoner and the deceased left the house together. Evidence would the house together. Evidence would be forthcoming, showing that

these two men were seen on the Toronto and York Radial Railway on the night of April 17. The prisoner returned alone to the boarding house a day later and there gave different accounts as to what had become of the deceased. First he said he had left him on a form and there he said he had left him on a farm, and then he said he had gone to Hamilton. Nothing more was heard of the deceased until May 3, when two boys playing on the farm of Samuel Faskin, near Erindale, found the body in a wood, partly covered

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Struck by Blunt Instrument.

The medical examination showed that death had been caused by deceased having been struck on the head by some blunt instrument, and a club on which were found stains, supposed to be blood, was found near the body. An empty flask was also found and several other articles which were afterwards identified as the property of the deceased, among them a sutcase which had undeniably belonged to him, and the two halves of which would be pro-

The first witness called was Mrs. Adalya of 99 Teraulay-street, Toronto, where prisoner was boarding at the time of his arrest. He came to her home on March 11 last and remained until April 16. He said he had no money. She remembered the deceased coming to her house on April 14. He had been brought there by the pri-soner. He had a vallse with him and a bundle. He appeared to be a boy of good education, wrote very well and spoke more than one language. The prisoner told her that he had found the boy on the street, that he was cry-

ing and did not know where to go.

Had Money.

At this point the prisoner stood up in the dock and became somewhat excited, leaning over the bar and listening most attentively to the witness as she gave her evidence. Mrs. Adayla described the departure of the prisoner and the deceased on April 16, adding that she had never seen him alive since that date. When the prisoner re-turned on Good Friday afternoon she asked him what he had done with Leutik. He said he had got him a job on a farm at \$7 a month, but did not say where the farm was. At the same time the prisoner paid her some money from a pocketbook, and while he did so she saw the figure 5 on one of the bills which were in the book. She knew ester, who came to Toronto on April

The witness was cross-examined but her evidence was not shaken.






