

W. A. Charlton, M.P., Fails to Substantiate Neely's Allegations.

The Toronto Star yesterday pub-lished an Ottawa despatch giving an interview with Sir Clifford Sifton in which Sir Clifford flatty denied charges made by Dr. Neely at Chat-ham that he had once promoted among certain Liberal members a

among certain Liberal members a campaign against conscription. "The facts are," he said, "that I met Dr. Neely on the street in front of my office, when he stopped and began to talk about the political situ-ation. As it was not convenient to talk on the street, I asked him to come up to my office. He came up and chatted there for some little time about the political situation with re-ference specially to the prime minis-ter's announcement of policy of con-scription.

"I said that I regretted very much there was likely to be a split on the subject of conscription, in which dif-erent portions of the country would a arrayed against each other, but at it was quite clear to me that bengtish-speaking Liberals in the use ought not to follow Sir Wilfrid arter on this question.

"Dr. Neely asked me what I thought they ought to do. I said that they ought to organize themselves, and repudiate the stand taken by Sir Winrid Laurier, and at the same time announce their intention of supporting conscription and supporting the government in its war policy. Dr. Neely expressed thanks to me for my Neely expressed thanks to her since. advice, and I have not seen him since.

advice, and I have not seen him since. If the report is correct, his statement is a complete misrepresentation of what passed between us." Perceived Difficulties. The press informed him that Mr. Charlton had said that he, Sir Clif-ford, had expressed doubts of the wis-dom of enforcing conscription to him. As to this, Sir Clifford dictated the following:

"With respect to Dr. Neely's state-ment that I expressed myself as op-posed to the conscription bill to Messrs. Power and Charlton, this tetement is also incorrect. I have Messrs. Fower and Charlton, this statement is also incorrect. I have never expressed myself as being op-josed to conscription since Sir Robt. Borden made his announcement. "It is quite true, however, that, in common with many others in favor of conscription at different times, I have, in discussing the question, re-cognized the difficulty of enforcing it, and that it would have been desirable to have got recruits by volun-tary enlistment if possible. Questioned as to the allegation that he had asked Wm. Power, M.P., to give out a statement against conscription and then sent a wire canceling it, Sir Clifford said:

"I met Mr. Power in the Chateau Laurier one afternoon. I think it was before the military service bill was introduced. Mr. Power was obviously very much exercised about the attitude of the Province of Quebec. In talking the matter over with him he expressed the opinion that the people of Ontario did not understand Quebecs attitude, I said: 'Perhaps it would be a good idea for you. in the interests of fair discussion, if you should give an interview to To-ronto papers and state your views." He said he might do so on his return from Quebec, to which he was about to go After I left him, on thinking the matter over, I concluded that no good end could be served by promoting the publication of 'such an interview, and 1 sent him a telegram tothat effect.'

Confirmed by Charlton. W. A. Charlton, member for Nor-folk, confirmed, in an interview this morning, Sir Clifford's statement, and denied the statement of Dr. Neely that the ex-minister had expressed himself as opposed to conscription. "I met Sir Clifford one day in the Chateau Laurier, and we talked over the political situation. As it was inconvenient to talk in the corridors. I went up to his room. He said he had two sons at the front, and he did not know whether he would ever see them again. He said he was a conscriptionist from the word go. He also expressed doubt as to the wisdom of enforcing it in view of the fact that there were two million French-Canadians and a half-million Germans opposed to the measure. He was afraid it would create internal strife and bring pleasure to the Germans.
