OCT. 24 BATTLE CONTINUES
JAPS GAINING GROUND
BEFORE DORTRESS

Nothing of importance from Shakh
River, where both sides hesitate
to assume the offensive.

Japanese official reports regarding the
siege of Port Arthur indicate that
the attack began on Oct. 24 was still
in progress on Oct. 25, the statement
being made that the fire of the be-
siegers was increasing in effective-
ness. Nothing of importance has de-
veloped on the Shakh River, where
both sides seem to hesitate to as-
sume the offensive, altho the Japa-
nese are more active in the matter
of attacks upon Russian positions.

Tokio, Nov. 1.—(9 p.m.)—Imperial
headquarters tonight published a series
of reports covering the operations
against Port Arthur during the months
of August, September and October. The
chief interest centers in the tremendous
attack which was begun Oct. 25, and
is still continuing. Hundreds of Japa-
nese guns began battering against the
northern and easterly forts on Oct. 25,
the infantry moving forward with de-
spatch, where the artillery had
prepared the way, while the pioneers
and sappers were running mines against
the Russian forts. The reports record
a series of desperate encounters at
close range and tell a dramatic story.

The reports, beginning with the at-
tack of Oct. 25, follow:
"From 8.30 a.m. the forts on Sangshu
and Tyhling Mountains, the eastern
forts on Keekwan Mountain and a fort
lying north of the latter were bombarded.
The parapet of Rihlung Mountain
was demolished and openings were
made in the fort.

Two of the most important covers on
Sangshu Mountain were destroyed.
One 15 centimeter gun was dismounted
and another damaged. One 81m on the
southern crest of East Keekwan Moun-
tain was destroyed.

From 2 p.m. other siege guns were
brought against the technical forts Sang-
sha Mountain, and a portion of our
artillery against those on Rihlung Moun-
tain and on Poshing Mountain, and took
them without heavy loss.

The enemy in the nearby forts, to-
gether with those on the forts on Wang-
shihyankow, Manto Mountain, Golden
Hill, Palyun Mountain and Laolinhua
concentrated an effective fire against the
points where our assaults were pro-
gressing.

A large mine exploded on the slope
of Rihlung Mountain without fatalities.
Shelled all night.

That night to prevent the Russians
making repairs, we shelled the forts of
Rihlung Mountain, East Keekwan
Mountain and Sangshu Mountain, to-
gether with the warships and machin-
ery buildings.

The enemy held Sangshu and Rihlung
Mountains under the protection of a
shell fire and undertook several in-
cessant night attacks against the
points where our assaults were pro-
gressing.

Our engineer corps that night was
sent against the northern part of East
Keekwan Mountain and destroyed the
outer casemate of a projected point.

The enemy tried every means to
prevent our work, and during the night
bombs, at the same time working
energetically in effecting repairs.

On Oct. 25 the night attack was
continued with good result.

A conflagration occurred in the old
and second casemate of the fort here,
which was observed near Golden Hill.

During the night on Oct. 25
a machine building near the harbor
was bombarded.

Reputed With Loss.

At dawn 100 of the enemy assaulted
our line extending toward Rihlung
fort, but were repulsed with heavy
loss.

Simultaneously a similar force of
the enemy assaulted our line projected
against Sangshu Mountain.

Our men bravely withstood the at-
tack, but were forced to lose a portion
of the mine, which, however, was re-
lieved later.

A mine directed against Rihlung
Mountain fort reached the outer limit
of the fort last night. A portion of the
outer limit of the fort was blown up.

Against the outer casemate of the
eastern point of Sangshu Mountain,
of the East Keekwan Mountain dynamite
was applied twice last night.

Wide openings and killing several
of the enemy inside the casemate.

Our bombardment is proving in-
creasingly effective.

Five Russian ships, which were
bombarded three days heavily dam-
aged and the other two were set on
fire.

FIVE MEN IN ONE RUNAWAY
AND EVERYONE IS INJURED

Team Collide With Telephone Post
and Finally Hurl Rig Thru Plate
Glass Window.

Brantford, Nov. 1.—The most remark-
able and disastrous runaway in the
recent history of Brantford occurred
shortly before 10 o'clock last night.
Five men had driven to Burford in a
two-seated covered rig drawn by a
team of horses, and were returning
via Paris-road, when the accident hap-
pened. Near the car barns on Bran-
tford-avenue a street car was encountered.
The horses shied and broke into a
run. The rig collided with a telephone
post on the side of the road, was over-
turned and the occupants thrown into
the street.

There were five men in the outfit and
all were injured. In the mix-up six
legs were broken and other wounds
of a serious nature were inflicted. All
were caught between the rig and the
posts, and bones snapped. John Syrett,
82 Dundas-street, one leg broken, one
rib fractured. William Coleman, 177
Darling-street, one leg broken. George
Walters, 99 Pearl, two legs broken.
Charles Mahler, 97 West Mill-street,
two legs broken.

All the men are maulers in the employ-
ment of the Buck Company. The am-
bulance was called out, the horses
picked up on Brant-avenue near James-
street, and were removed to the hos-
pital, where their injuries were at-
tended to.

The team of horses dashed down
the street, and finally hurled the rig
thru the plate glass window at the
corner of Coburne and Murray-streets.
The top of the rig was demolished, one
wheel was smashed and the harness
slightly damaged. The horses escaped
unhurt. The men are doing well at
the hospital to-day.

BOY FALLS DOWN ELEVATOR SHAFT
Whitford Little, Aged 14, Seriously,
But Not Fatally, Injured.

In some way Whitford Little, a boy
employed at the Canada Publishing
Co.'s establishment at 9 West Well-
ington-street, fell down the elevator
shaft, a distance of three stories, yester-
day afternoon, and was seriously injured.
Altho not unconscious the lad is in-
firmed to tell his story, but it is known
that he was on the third flat at the
time of the accident. A man on the
floor below saw him falling.

When picked up the boy was found
to have fractured his right hip, both
wrists and have cut his forehead. He
was taken in the police ambulance to
the Emergency Hospital.

He is 14 years of age and lives at
191 Hamilton-street. The doctors say his
case is serious, but have every hope of
his recovery.

WITHOUT FEAR OF A CONFLICT

WAR PANIC IN GREAT BRITAIN

Thought Leaving of Only Four Rus-
sian Officers at Vigo, Meant That
the Czar Had Broken His Agree-
ment.

London has passed thru a day of sen-
sational rumors, for which there
seems to have been no basis in fact.
The Russian ambassador was re-
ceived in audience by King Edward,
who expressed his satisfaction with
the course events have taken and
confided that the outcome will be
satisfactory to both Great Britain
and Russia. Admiral Kinnakoff of
the admiralty council will be one of
the two representatives of Russia
on the international commission,
the name of his colleague not hav-
ing been announced. The four offi-
cers detached from Rojostevsky's
squadron to tell the story of the
Dogger Bank affair are expected to
reach St. Petersburg by Friday.

GIBRALTAR, NOV. 10.—(10 p.m.)—
THE FLEETS HAVE NOT MOVED.

London, Nov. 1.—Negotiations between
Great Britain and Russia, looking to
a settlement of the North Sea affair, are
progressing favorably and there is not
the slightest danger of any friction aris-
ing between the two governments. The
constitution of the international com-
mission under the Hague convention is
on the verge of settlement.

In spite of these pacific conditions,
Great Britain to-day experienced a war
panic that can only be compared to that
which followed the sinking of the British
trawler by the fleet under the com-
mand of Vice-Admiral Rojostevsky. Not
for years have so many alarmist
reports and flaming editorials flooded
London. The most extraordinary feature
of this scare, which was serious enough
while it lasted, is that there was not
one single circumstance to justify it.
The excitement started early in the day,
when the newspapers announced the
departure of the Russian second Pacific
squadron from Vigo.

The public were not in possession of
the information cabled by The Assoc-
iated Press, that only the officers con-
cerned in the firing on the British traw-
ler would be detached, and jumped at
the conclusion that Russia had broken
faith by not detaching the vessels in-
volved in the affair. On top of this
came wild reports of Russian activity
at Gibraltar. Hour by hour the
news from Gibraltar became more seri-
ous, until last the climax was reached
with the announcement that the
British fleet had cleared for action.
Some even said the fleet had sailed.
Some reported the Russian second Pacific
squadron had cleared for action.
The British fleet has cleared for ac-
tion. No newspaper and no person
seemed able to report that the
reassuring information available in



CENTURY OF NAVAL POWER NELSON'S VICTORY PRESENT

England's Fleet of One Hundred Years Ago Compared With That of To-day.

For close upon a century Britain has enjoyed undisputed, the supremacy of the sea, won for her by Nelson's glorious victory at Trafalgar, 99 years ago, writes J. H. Wilson in The London Daily Mail.

Nothing is more remarkable than the complete revolution which naval construction and naval warfare have undergone in the intervening years. If the great admiral's fleet could be restored as it was in 1805, a single cruiser could blow it out of the water in an hour without ever coming within range of its guns.

The range and destructive power of the guns were then so small that officers and crew were often killed by rifle fire from picked shots placed in the enemy's masts, and, as all know, Nelson's own death was due to a bullet from the enemy's masts.

With the invention of armor plates, the first of which was made for the Cleopatra in 1840, the cost of warship construction has increased enormously. A 100-gun man-of-war in Nelson's time, equipped, masted and rigged, but excluding armament, cost £77,000. The King Edward VII, without its guns and ammunition, cost the immense sum of £1,385,212, or 20 times as much as Nelson's Victory.

Britain's naval predominance over other powers was much more pronounced five years after the battle of Trafalgar than it is today. It will be seen from the accompanying table that in 1810, so far as gun power is concerned, she could have made a good fight of it had all the other naval powers in the world combined against her.

X-RAY VICTIMS.

London Doctors Undergo Terrible Sufferings With It.

London, Nov. 1.—There are in London, it is estimated, a score of X-ray operators suffering from the effects of the rays, which proved fatal in the case of Clarence Daily, Mr. Edmond's assistant.

The disease, which is apparently incurable, is set up as a direct result of the manipulation of the Roentgen rays, and the hands of the operator appear to be the most vulnerable part.

A fortnight ago one well-known doctor, who is in charge of the X-ray department at one of the largest of the London hospitals, had the first two joints of the fingers of the right hand amputated, and on Thursday he was found necessary to take the amputation of the left hand.

"You can see from the fingers of the right hand how the trouble has developed," he remarked to a Weekly Dispatch reporter. "The hand seemed as if it had been severely scalded. It was red, swollen, ulcerous eruption, and the nails looked as if they had been crushed and torn to pieces."

"Have you suffered much pain during the removal of the nails?" "The doctor's face clouded over at the recollection of his patient's sufferings. "My dear sir," he said, "I have suffered the torments of the damned. From last June onward, until I had my fingers amputated, I scarcely knew what sleep was. Night after night I rolled about in agony."

"All the earlier workers," proceeded the doctor, "are suffering in greater or less degree, and this is probably the fact that we do not know what we were working with, and took no precautionary measures against possible danger."

Harry King Edward, who supplies the admiralty and the war office with X-ray apparatus, is another of the victims. He carries his left arm in a sling, as the result of his injuries.

MAYOR'S CLAIM TO CHICAGO.

London, Nov. 5.—Alderman D. H. Redhead, J.P., who will be Peterborough's next mayor, claims that if he and his rights he would be the owner of the City of Chicago.

In 1834, his parents, then a newly married couple, went to an inn where they owned the tract of land in Illinois State upon which the city was afterwards built.

"When they arrived they found that the uncle was dead. They were his only relatives, and claimed the property, but as he had left no will a tedious process at law followed them."

BIGGEST ELECTION BET.
