Session Report

4

It is again our duty and our privilege to review the past year of our history as a congregation, and to thank God for His continued goodness to us.

Our last annual report recorded the resignation of our late beloved pastor, the Rev. Dr. Hunter, on account of continued illhealth, and narrated what steps had been taken to secure a worthy successor. We had extended a unanimous call to the Rev. James Murray, of St. Catharines, and the date of our last annual meeting was the day previous to the meeting of the Hamilton Presbytery, at which Mr. Murray was expected to announce his decision. In our report we ventured to say that we fondly anticipated a favorable answer, so it was with great joy that the delegation from Erskine Church which attended the Presbytery meeting in Hamilton heard an affirmative from Mr. Murray's own lips. His induction to the pastorate of Erskine Church accordingly took place on the 7th of February last.

It is not necessary to enlarge on the happy results of Mr. Murray's acceptance of our call. During the past eleven months we have had ample proof of his great zeal and capacity for work, and of his power as a preacher of the Gospel of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. There has already been a large increase in the membership of the church, which had fallen off considerably during a practical vacancy of almost a year and a half. Surely we may look also for great spiritual blessings under his pastorate if we only hold up his hands in the prosecution of the work he has been called upon to do.

Our communion roll when Mr. Murray was inducted contained the names of 548 members as printed in our last annual report. During the past year 123 members have been added to the rolls, 65 on profession and 58 by certificate from other churches, making a total of 671. But from this number must be deducted eight members removed by death, and at least fifty by certificate to other churches or removal from our bounds; thus leaving a membership of 613 persons at this date, and showing a net increase of 65 members during the year.

The Session is now engaged in a rigid revision of the communion roll before it is printed in the new annual report, and some additional names may require to be taken off, but the numbers now given may be taken as approximately correct.

Our energetic pastor has made a careful personal visitation of the whole congregation, and reports that there are 225 families and 124 single persons connected with it, and that including children and adherents there are 1,273 persons under his pastoral oversight.

The members who died during the year are as follows: Mr. John K. Mitchell, Mr. Alex. Ranney, Mr. Fred. Bennett, Mrs. Quigley, Mrs. Murley, Mrs. Fraser, Miss Susan Stoddart and Miss Maggie Mason. To all the bereaved families and relatives our hearts go out in sympathy; but we make special note of the death of Mr. Mitchell, who was born and brought up in this congregation, and who was for many years an active member of the Board of Management; and of Mr. Bennett, a young student who had connected himself with our church only a few months before a sad accident ended a young life of much promise.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered four times during the year: On March 12th, to 450; on June 11th, to 460; on October 1st, to 460, and December 3rd, to 505 communicants, thus showing a large increase over the previous year. There were fifteen baptisms during the year.

Mr. John A. Paterson, who had been the efficient Superintendent of our S unday School for many years, resigned that office upon connecting himself and family with Bloor Street Church some months ago. Our pastor having expressed his willingness to undertake the office for a time, in addition to all his other duties, so as to get better acquainted with the young people of the congregation, and to do some work among them, the Session cordially agreed to the proposal. Mr. Martin continues to act as Assistant Superintendent of the school. The attendance has largely increased since Mr. Murray took charge, and more teachers are earnestly called for. The Bible Class, under Dr. McLaughlin, continues to do good work, and reports increasing attendance.

Mr. Yellowlees having resigned the Superintendency of the William Street Mission after fourteen years of faithful and fruitful work, Mr. Currie has kindly consented to occupy this position for a time. Meantime the Session will carefully consider how best to carry on the work of the Mission efficiently, and yet with due regard to economy.

By death or resignation the Session has in a few years been reduced from fifteen to only ten members. Such an addition as will bring it up to its full strength is urgently required, and the Session propose to bring the matter before the congregation at an early date.

We have been glad to welcome Mr. Hewitt back as Organist and Choirmaster. We missed him sadly the year he was away, and we have reason to believe that he also was glad to get back among his old friends.

Once more we thank God for past mercies, and take fresh courage for the future.

The Board of Management, in presenting its report for the year 1899, feels that the congregation is to be congratulated on the fairly satisfactory condition of the finances.

The advent of our new Pastor early in the year stimulated every department of the Church's work, resulting in a considerable increase in the ordinary revenue. It is a matter for regret, however, that so many still neglect to use the envelopes supplied for contribution purposes, and in view of this, the Board would repeat and emphasize its recommendation of former years "that all members secure a supply of envelopes and contribute a stated sum weekly."

Our appeal for a special collection on Nov. 12th to meet a deficit that had been accumulating for several years past, met with a liberal response, the sum of \$495 being contributed, about one-half the amount actually required,

Since the decision of the Courts, in Nov., 1898, confirming our right to the legacy bequeathed to the congregation by the late Mr. Bowman, no further objection has been raised to our claim, and the interest has been paid in full up to Nov. 7th, 1899, amounting to \$600. This amount we expect to receive annually until the legacy is paid over, which may be in the near future, as efforts are being made to that end by the Executor of the estate.

The expenditure for the year has been unusually heavy owing to improvements being made to the church property, principally in the basement, and the liquidation of a number of old accounts.

The Board has had under consideration for some time the question of necessary repairs to the church organ, which is in anything but a satisfactory condition. As the proposal is one involving considerable expense, the Board has decided to refer it to the congregation; consequently, a resolution dealing with the matter will be submitted to you later in the evening.

It will be necessary to elect, at this meeting, three Trustees of church property, for five years each, to take the place of those whose term of office has expired, such election being provided for in the Trust Deed. Those retiring are Messrs. John Bain, John Riddell and John A. Paterson.

The members of the Board desire to place on record an expression of their profound sorrow on the death of their late colleague, Mr. John K. Mitchell, which took place early in the year. A genial companion and an indefatigable worker in every department of the church in which his services could be utilized, he spared neither time nor effort on behalf of the congregation in which his whole life was spent. An active member and officer of this Board for many years, he is sadly missed and his memory will ever remain in the hearts of those who had the pleasure of associating with him in church work.

The Board appointed Mr. Jos. Hoops to serve out the unexpired portion of Mr. Mitchell's term. This appointment you will be asked to ratify, by resolution, at this meeting.

The members of the Board retiring by rotation are Messrs. Stark, McLaughlin, Hathaway, Campbell, and Young. An election will be necessary to fill these vacancies; also a vacancy caused by the withdrawal of Mr. John Malcolm.

In looking over the work of the past year we find that ten regular monthly meetings were held, with an average attendance of sixteen. Largest attendance at any meeting, thirty; smallest, ten. There were also six sewing meetings held. The sewing meeting is a new feature in our Society's work during the past year, and it has proved very successful in bringing the members closer together, and in giving better opportunities for exchanging opinions and suggestions on Missionary work.

At these six meetings there were two quilts and twenty-five hoods made for the Northwest box, and two changes of clothing for winter and summer for an Indian girl in the Northwest.

At present there is a membership of 37-21 are members of the General Society, and 16 are Auxiliary members. We have 47 subscribers to the "Missionary Tidings."

It is with feelings of regret that we record the death of Mrs. Quigley, who for years was an active member of our Society.

In April an open Missionary meeting was held, Rev. Mr. Murray giving a Missionary address, the proceeds (for Northwest fund) being \$11.42.

The Annual Thankoffering meeting was held in October, and was very profitable to all who attended. Mrs. Jeffrey, Secretary for Indian work in the Northwest and British Columbia, gave an interesting and instructive address on her work and travels in the Northwest during her recent visit there. The Thankoffering amounted to \$20.55.

In October, a box of clothing valued at \$32.80, and \$12.00 in cash were sent to the Northwest.

At the Annual Meeting held two weeks ago our Auxiliary presented Mrs. Hart with a certificate of life membership, for her faithful and devoted work in the Church and the William Street Mission. This makes our list of life members nine.

A Visiting Committee has been appointed, whose work it well be to visit all the women of the congregation with the hope of increasing our membership and deepening the interest in Foreign Mission work.

The past year may not have been as prosperous as we wished it, but it is pleasant for us, as Auxiliary workers, to remember that the Master's ever watchful and attentive eye beholds all the good we do "in His Name," and that he will use our efforts to bring nearer the time when the whole earth shall be filled with his praises.

We would like to see more names on our membership roll, and heartily invite the young women of the congregation to join our Band, and help us in our work.

We have over three hundred scholars on our roll now, having regained much of the ground lost during the vacancy of our pulpit, and with God's blessing on our work we hope soon to reach the four hundred mark.

In reviewing the events of the year just closed in connection with the Bible Class, it is a source of satisfaction to know that we have made some progress in our work. I am sure that all the members of the Class feel that the efforts of our Teacher, Dr. McLaughlin, have been blessed to us, as well as to himself.

In the membership of the Class there has been a decided increase over the previous year—we had 122 names on the roll, compared with 103 in the year 1898. Of these quite a number have taken up work in the Sabbath School and Mission, while others have removed to other districts, or have left the city, leaving the total membership at present at 74, as compared with 59 at the beginning of last year. There has been an average attendance of 48 members, besides visitors, each Sabbath throughout the year. Our work outside of the Class has been chiefly in welcoming the young people who were strangers in the Church and inviting them to the Class. In the month of September we, with the help of others, made up a box of literature, consisting of books, magazines and papers, of good, wholesome reading, and sent it to Mr. J. W. Stephen, of Knox College, then in Alexandra Mines, B. C., who had been corresponding with the Class regarding his work there. We also received interesting letters from Mr. J. A. Cormie, laboring in the Dauphin District, who was appointed by the Knox College Missionary Society to correspond with us. During the year we have been encouraged by our many friends who manifested their interest in the Class by their presence both at our Picnic in June and our At-Home in November, at which we spent enjoyable and profitable hours together.

We are also very much indebted to our organist, Mr. Geo. Hoops, for his faithful services during the year, and take this opportunity as a Class of expressing our appreciation and thanks to him.

And now as we enter this closing year of the 19th century, knowing not what it may have in store for us, but ready to go forward into it, trusting in God and carrying with us the "Sword of the Spirit," which we study Sabbath after Sabbath, under the guidance of our faithful Teacher, we hope that the Bible Class of Erskine Church will prove a great blessing to all the members, and to all who may in any way be connected with it.

In submitting the Annual Report for 1899, I may say that the work, though somewhat interrupted by my absence, was nevertheless carried forward with energy and ability by others, and too much praise cannot be given to those who took it up willingly. The financial feature of the Report is not as successful as in former years, but a contribution from the Rest Fund of the Mission Bank of \$40.00 All the meetings have been maintained covers any deficiency. except the Mothers'. This has lapsed on account of the inability of some to continue the work in which they have rendered such signal service for years. This is to be regretted. The Sunday School is in a most efficient state—as strong in its Teaching and Official Staff as it has ever been in its history. One of our Teachers, Mr. Wm. I need not say how dear the work has been to me during all these fourteen years. I leave my fellow-teachers, officers and people with the deepest regret, but a change in my duties necessitates this step. I recall with pleasure their unswerving loyalty and unwavering fidelity to me-there never has been a misunderstanding between us -and so far as I can remember, no one ever left the Mission on my account. These memories will comfort me in the years to come. Full well I know how often I have failed, but there was a voice came to me saying, "I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee." "Lo, I am with you alway." In handing my resignation to the Session, I desire to thank Mr. and Mrs. John Malcolm for the services they have rendered for the last seven years as leaders of psalmody; also the

Teachers and Officers for their genuine devotion to their duties, and those connected with the Mothers' meetings and tract distributing, and those who have made the Mission Bank what it is. And, lastly, I thank my brethren of the Session for the confidence they have exercised toward me; and now, placing my trust in their hands, I pray that God may own and bless the services rendered in His name.
