GIRL IS CLEARED AUTOMOBILE HITS THOMAS D. PURDIE

New Haven, Conn., Nov. 11.—Charles G. Rogers, nephew of Mrs. Ogden Mills Reid, met his death on the North-haven Turnpike last Saturday night as an end of a joy ride in a fog, when his head, which he had stuck out of the door of an automobile operated by Marjorie Schneider, came in contact with some object, probably a telephone pole, near The Pines, a small inn on the Northhaven Turnpike, according to a finding made public by Coroner Eli Mix.

a finding made public by Coroner Eli Mix. The Coroner found that much liquor was consumed by Rogers and Miss Schneider, both in this city and at Long Hill Inn, a roadhouse in Walling-ford, from which they were returning when the fatality occurred. When near The Pines the Schneider girl discovered a small piece of glass had been broken in the windshield, which brought to her attention the fact that Rogers was ly-ing in the rear of the car, bút she was so befuddled that she was not aware of just what had happened. The Coroner, however, absolved her from blame, saying that Rogers' death was not caused by any criminal act or carelessness on the part of any persons. The Coroner gave credence to the girl's statement that Rogers had attempted to embrace her in the automobile short-ly before the accident occurred, but stated that he did not believe she gave him any blow which caused his death. The report did not /discuss whether the attempted kissing of the girl led to hit a pole. It called attention to the testimonv given to the effect that al-though the windshield was partly broken no glass pieces were in the car. This has been taken to indicate that if there was a quarrel in the car and Rogers had been pushed out the glass probably would have fallen outside, whereas if the windshield had been hit by a telephone pole the glass would almost certainly have fallen inside the car.

The fact that Miss Schneider gave false testimony at the first Coroner's hearing, insisting that she was not driving the car when the accident oc-curred, complicated attempts to get to the bottom of the mystery. In this connection the report said: "I find that Miss Schneider was ill-advised by acquaintances and told to state she was not operating said car and that other advice was given 'her tending to mislead the authorities in-vestigating said occurrence; and that during my first interview with her she made statements which were untrue which necessitated a more extended in-quiry as to what had occurred in caus-ing the death of deceased than the case would otherwise have warranted." Rogers' hat was found some distance from where the car stopped. Probably at the spot where, as he leaned out, his head struck a pole or similar obstacle. Attorney General Discusses Plans for Better Law Enforcement.

Toronto, Nov. 11 .- There are rocks ahead for those who traffic in liquor in defiance of the Ontario Temperance Act, Premier Ferguson has under con-Act, Premer Ferguson has under con-sideration amendments for the tight-ening of the O. T. A., and unless something very unforseen occurs amendments to that act making it more all-embracing and enforceable than at present, will be introduced at the next session of the legislature by the government, and become law. In addition to that Attorney-General W. F. Nickle has under review the whole provincial police organization, for the purpose of, as he states, "secur-ing the maximum efficiency" in the en-forcement of the law. If changes or additions in the force are necessary to secure this goal, they will be made. No decision had yet been arrived at as to what changes or additions, if any, are needed, but it is the inten-tion of the atorney-general to secure maximum efficiency in the enforcement of the law, and he is at present going thoroughly into the needs of the pro-vincial police to discover by what means that force can be best organized and equipped to cope with the present situation in Ontario. "Along what lines will the Ontario Temperance Act be amended to make it more all-embracing?" Mr. Nickle was asked. "It is a matter of carrying out the sideration amendments for the tight-


